#### INTRODUCTION

#### The Seal Collection

First Charter notes, and Second Charter Brown Backs, have in the left oval on the back of the note the State Seal of the state in which the note was issued. Such notes with State Seals were issued between 1863 and 1908. Notes with State Seals were issued for 45 different states and the District of Columbia. In some cases, the state seal was changed during this period and notes can be found from the same state but with different seals.

Territorial notes sometimes had Territorial Seals in the left oval, and sometimes only the U.S. eagle. Since Arizona and New Mexico did not become states until 1912, there are no notes from these two states with their State Seals on the reverse. Oklahoma became a state in 1907 but apparently no Oklahoma Brown Backs with the Oklahoma State Seal were issued before the Brown Back era came to an end in 1908.

The relative scarcity today of the various State Seal notes rather closely reflects the distribution of population and prosperity in the United States in the two decades (1865 - 1885) just after the Civil War. The money and the people were in the Northeast, Middle Atlantic and Midwest states. There were people in the South but, impoverished by the Civil War, they were poor. The West was still being opened up and had as yet few people. This reflects in the fact that the scarcest State Seal notes are those from the South and the West (excluding California). The most numerous are those from large and wealthy states in the post Civil War decades: New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. The most elusive (and unfortunately NOT represented in this collection) is Nevada.

Those states in which notes with at least two different state seals are known to have issued include the following: Alabama, District of Columbia, Iowa, Maryland, New York, North Carolina, Ohio (at least two varieties of the first seal, and a completely different second seal), Vermont, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. This collection is believed to be complete except for Nevada. (The collection is confined to State notes only and includes NO Territorial notes.)

"The Seal Collection" was formed over a period of several years by a collector originally from Little Rock, Arkansas who prefers to remain anonymous. In his opinion, the rarest note in the Seal Collection is the Little Rock, Arkansas First Charter note. This came from the famous William P. Donlon Personal Collection sold on May 22, 1971 by way of Hickman and Waters (predecessor to Hickman and Oakes). The collector regards the rarest State Seals represented in his collection as Arkansas, Idaho and Mississippi (the Mississippi Brown Back came from Hickman and Oakes' 50th "Anniversary" Sale of June, 1975).

We are sorry the collector who built this outstanding collection wishes to remain anonymous. He reflects credit on us all in the breadth of his project and the quality of the notes he assembled.

We can truthfully say that we have never dealt with a more objective and knowledgeable collector, nor a finer gentleman. We have him to thank for this sale being on a mail bid basis, although we are confident a negotiated sale could have been arrived at. He sincerely wished his notes to be offered to the collectors of National Bank notes on an equal basis, and without reserve. This sale should provide a most valuable record of what early notes from the various states are truly worth on today's market.

#### The State Capital Collection

Again, we are sorry we are not permitted to reveal the collector's name.

A more enthusiastic collector than he is would be hard to imagine. In his quest for the right notes, he spared no expense and had the whole-hearted co-operation of many suppliers. He never hesitated to upgrade or replace notes when he felt it was indicated. We can testify to the great pleasure he had in building his collection. Fortunately for all concerned, he had many other projects to sustain his well deserved retirement. In selecting notes from state capitals he considered a type collection. Therefore, there is a varied selection of over thirty-two different types and denominations to choose from.

At the last minute we received a third collection. Since it consists mainly of Series 1929 notes from banks located in state capitals, it has dovetailed beautifully into this sale, giving a more varied selection for you to choose from. The collection of state capital notes presents a rewarding challenge to the collector with many interesting notes available at modest prices. To our knowledge, this is the first time all known state capitals have been represented and available for













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ALABAMA - Two Seals - Capital: Montgomery

The first seal was devised by Alabama's first territorial governor in 1817. This seal was restored officially in 1939 through the efforts of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Both first and second charter notes show this seal.

The second seal was introduced in 1868. It appears on part of the Brown Backs issued. The motto "Here We Rest" appears on the ribbon in the eagle's beak.



since Iowa had several very early banks and the bank note companies had no seal prepared for Iowa, in the interest of time, they used the eagle. First charter notes and part of the brownbacks use the eagle seal.

The second, or official Iowa seal was adopted in 1847, the year following statehood, and appears on most of the brownbacks. The motto featured is "Our Liberties We Prize, Our Rights We Rights We Will Maintain.'



of arrows in the foreground, led them to adopt Ohio's seal the following year.

The first seal shows the wheat on the left, with five arrows on the right. Some notes show the mountain on the left very faintly, suggesting the possibility of re-engraving.

The second seal shows a bundle of 17 arrows on the left (indicating the number of states in the Union) and the sheaf of wheat on the right.


