



Thanks to Dr. Glenn Jackson, who uncovered the information and revealed it to us at the Memphis Paper Money show we now know that it indicates that a new, or replacement plate was used to print the note. We had observed later issues where the check letter was advanced, and in the case of very large banks, a double check letter, or a combination of a check letter and a numeral were used. The significance of this discovery specimen is that it is evidence of the earliest use of a star on our paper money to indicate a replacement. We have information that suggests as many as 55,000 impressions were possible before a die was no longer fit to print notes. We feel this is a very high figure and was seldom achieved. The serial number of this specimen, even when added to the 15,565 sheets issued in the original series equals only 41,199. This would prove that this plate was replaced long before 55,000 impressions. A more probable figure is closer to 20 to 25,000 impressions. Very few First Charter period banks exceeded that number of sheets in any single denomination. We don't know what this note is worth, but as a First Charter Period \$5 in presentable condition, we value it about \$150. Possible double for the star might be realistic.



SEALED BID MAIL AUCTION RECAP

National Bank Notes attracted wide spread participation and keen competition among bidders in the Hickman and Oakes third sealed bid mail auction that closed November 7, 1977.

Over half of the nearly 250 bidders were successful in acquiring at least one lot in the sale.

Mr. Bob Cohen, professional numismatist from Rockville, Maryland, served as monitor and impartial observer in the sale. Tie and alternate bids were decided by Mr. Cohen. He also assisted in posting the bids and calculating the amount each lot realized. "The strength of the bidding appeared to be in top condition, CU small size westren and midwestren notes", remarked the dealer-collector.

High water mark was set by a VF+ \$100.00 Original Series note issued by the Pocasset National Bank of Fall River, Massachusetts, which realized \$5460.00.

A mismatched charter number note, widely known as "Mr. Phil's King Bee" error note, realized \$1680.00 on a \$1500-\$2000.00 estimate.

A series of number 1 notes revealed strong collector demand, led by a 1902 Red Seal note from the First National Bank of Polk County at Copperhill, Tennessee, which realized \$2400.00. A one dollar original from the Bank of New York, National Ass. realized \$710.00. The only note ever reported on the Merchants National Bank of Binghampton, N.Y., a number 1 Lazy \$2. in Extra Fine condition realized \$1250.00., resulting in a savings of over \$500.00 to the enthusiastic collector who made the successful bid.

An Uncirculated \$5. 1882 Brown Back reached \$500.00. It was issued by the Elk County National Bank of Ridgway, Pa. and signed by the President who we understand is still in office.

The note receiving the largest number of bids was a \$10. 1929 note issued by the First N. B. & Trust co. of Oklahoma City, with 29 bids, and the \$50.00 bidder with the earliest postmark won the lot.

A number of die proofs and vignettes of state seals were featured. The West Virginia Seal vignette brought \$121.00 and a die sunk partial plate proof of the left half of the third charter \$100. note brought \$550.00. These prices are indicitive of the competition from bidders to secure one or more of the lots.
