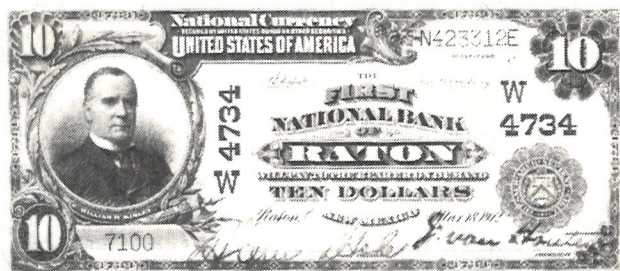

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the first auction of the International Paper Money Convention and our eighth auction sale.

Virtually all categories of United States paper money are represented in this sale, from relatively commonplace notes to notes of the highest rarity.

Among the Nationals will be found a fifty dollar First Charter with blue end paper (Massachusetts), several uncut sheets, the second note from the Laramie City, Wyoming Territory \$5 First Charter sheet, and the highlight of the sale, the \$50 1882 Value Back from New Orleans.

A truly superior collection of type notes virtually complete through the ten dollar denomination, and missing only two notes in the twenty dollar denomination, will be found in a separate section. The National Bank notes in this collection are noted by lot numbers under the individual states.

Another section is devoted to proofs and specimen notes of great appeal, including the National Gold Bank of Boston.

In fairness to the mail bidders, all bids will be held confidential and bidding on the floor will be opened below the highest mail bid.

We are honored by the confidence placed in us by the Memphis Coin Club and our consignors, and we sincerely thank them. With your cooperation, we wish to make this sale the great success it deserves to be, and set a high standard for future paper money convention auctions.

We feel that the collecting of paper money has reached a new level of maturity and sophistication, with new opportunities and challenges for us all. As always, we wish you one and all—Happy Hunting!

TERMS OF SALE

This sale will be a combination mail bid and floor auction sale. Written bids must be postmarked by June 8th, or after that date, mailed to us at the Rivermont Holiday Inn, Memphis, Tennessee. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by 'phone, but we will not be able to handle telephone bids. Mail bids will be opened and recorded just prior to the sale. Even if you plan on attending the sale, we would encourage you to bid by mail, also. You would then be covered in case you are unable to attend.

1. Bids will be opened on the floor at the second highest mail bid and proceed from there. In the event of a tie or identical bids, the auctioneer will be the final judge.
2. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot.
3. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders. Lots delivered in Iowa are subject to State Sales Tax of 3% unless a resale number is given.
4. People wishing to participate in this auction who are not planning to attend the floor auction in Memphis, must submit a signed, written mail bid, which reaches us by the closing day of the sale. If you find yourself short on time, a mailgram, is acceptable.
5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
7. Alternate bids are acceptable.
8. GRADING—The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary. In other words, a very valuable note will have a more complete and detailed description than a note, say, not even worth double face.
In notes grading VF and above we will try to mention, within reason, all unusual defects such as named above. As a condition to your bids you may say that you do not wish any lots that might contain a pin hole or whatever.
9. No return of notes is acceptable by floor bidders.
If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please state your grading guide that you are using (if you are) to support your position. We are firm believers in "Satisfaction Guaranteed", and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error we want to know about it.
10. We reserve the right to reject any bid of 50% of estimate or less or any bid of less than 15% over face.
11. Lots will be available for viewing in Memphis, Tennessee on June 15 and 16 at the Rivermont Holiday Inn. Lots purchased by floor bidders cannot be returned, therefore they must be viewed before bidding.

Half of the binding of the spine is torn away but included in with the book, otherwise in good condition. Value — \$50.
- 2 United States Pattern, Trial and Experimental Pieces, By E.H. Adams & W.H. Woodin, 1913. By American Numismatic Society, 196 pages hardbound. Value — \$35.
- 3 United States Copper Cent 1816-1857, By Howard R. Newcombs, 1944, Complete with Photographic plates at the back of the book. 284 pages large-size hardbound. Value — \$50.
- 4 The Early Coins of America, By S.S. Crosby. One of 500 Copies reprinted in 1945 by R. Green. 381 pages large-size hardbound. Value — \$50.
- 5 Report of the Secretary of the Treasury on the State of the Finances for the Year 1886. Marble cover with leather quarto binding. Includes plates of U.S. Custom-House, Court-House, and Post Office of Ogdenburgh, NY; Portland, ME; Des Moines, IA; and Springfield, IL. Covers the coinage at the mint of the United States, the branch mint, Denver, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1868, Also includes fold-out graph of the progress of ship-building in the U.S. from 1817 to 1868, in the back of the book. Published under Hugh McCulloch, Sec. of Treas. Value — \$50.
- 6 The 4th Edition Blue Book and the 6th Edition Red Book, By R.S. Yeoman. These early editions are getting hard to locate. Fine condition, value — \$20.
- 7 The W.F. Dunham Collection, By B. Max Mehl, 1941. Complete Series of the United States Coinage, including the 1804 Dollar and the 1822 Half Eagle. Also including a nice selection of U.S. paper money. 286 pages paperbound. Value with prices realized — \$50.
- 8 History of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing 1862-1962, By the Treasury Dept. Well illustrated history, easy to read. 199 pages hardbound. Value - \$10.

- 9 The Standard Paper Money Catalogue, By Wayte Raymond, 1st Edition 1940. Covers Colonial, Continental, United States, Fractional, and some Confederacy and Obsolete Notes. 106 pages hardbound. Value — \$20.
- 10 The Story of American Bank Note Company, By William H. Griffiths 1958. 92 pages hardback with plastic jacket. Complete history of the company including pictures of the man who organized and ran the company. Elaborate plates showing examples of the engraving are also included. New condition. Another book just like it realized \$150. in our 7th Sealed Mail Bid Auction.
- 11 A Descriptive History of National Bank Notes 1863-1935, By William H. Dillistin, 1956. A very significant book to national bank note collectors. Paper bound and 55 pages jammed with information about printing and plates and sheet combinations. Nationals covered by types of issue. A great book and not often available. Autographed by author. Value — \$25.
- 12 United States Paper Money, by George Blake - 1908, paper cover 55 pages. A reference list of paper money, including fractional currency issued since 1861 — included a list of U.S. Coins. Just think, in 1908 a list of issues as we know them today were not even thought of then. Very complete and description by type of issue. Every collector of paper should have it. Estimate — \$40.
- 13 United States Paper Money Old Series 1861-1923, By Dr. Frank Alvin Limpert. Book No. 122 with the personal autograph of the author under his photograph on page 99, dated 8/31/48. Paperbound copy with 100 pages with plates. Value — \$30.
- 14 Two of Mr. Donlon's personal copies of his most famous sales. First his "Blue Ribbon Award Winning", November, 1956. Somewhat modified version used by Mr. Donlon at the sale, prices and comments written in. Second, his first Mail Bid Sale of his own personal collection, May 22, 1971. It is thumb-indexed and is missing the first 11 pages and has Lots 633 through 635 cut out. The corners were cut down to reveal the lots numbers and is obviously his personal copy that he used as the sale was proceeding. Prices realized included with both. Price will be set by you.
- 15 Complete set of 12 catalogs and prices realized issued by Mr. Donlon including the scarce No. 1 sale of his personal collection 5/22/71. Mr. Donlon had only two copies of his May sale of 1971 left, as a carton containing the remainders of the catalogs were inadvertently left when he moved his offices in 1973. This is one of the two sets of catalogs he had left. Several of the copies are marked office copy. Est. — \$75.

- 18 Complete set of the seven catalogues with prices and notations written in by Wm. P. Donlon. This is the lot you have all been waiting for. Mr. Donlon notes all through the seven catalogues (each of which sale he attended personally) the auction lots which he personally bought and also in most cases the initial of the bidder who bought the lot if he was in attendance. In catalogue #2 he indicates all of the people who were at the sale, which was only seven. A very significant piece of numismatic history, a researchers' delight. The new owner of this set will always be proud of this purchase. These catalogues are contained in their original sleeve. Value could easily exceed \$250.
- 19 Paper Money of the United States By Robert Friedberg, 1st Edition, 1953. 128 pages hardbound, no dust cover, Very Fine condition. Est. — \$50.

as Bill Gurney, Bill Dow, Jim Boyd, Wm. Brochway, "Old Lame Sam", "Cranky Tom", Hale, "Doctor Blake" and others. Many of the notes are mentioned that were counterfeited with a good description of the counterfeit \$50 of 1869 legal tender. Hardbound, 436 pages, published by Lalan Heath, 1872, and inside cover page is his advertisement for counterfeit detectors. Value — \$75. and up

The last three pages are printed with the rules and the regulations for the redemption of mutilated and defaced United States Notes, interest-bearing notes, and fractional currency. Complete mailing instructions are given. Very fine condition, Value — \$25.

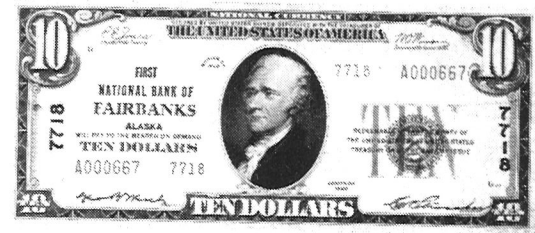

- 45 Three pieces, dated 1923: a receipt for collection on U.S. savings certificates; a check, 9/6/1923, drawn to order of Frank Lowci for \$10,000,000 marks at Frankfort, Germany, from the Union-Davenport Trust & Savings Bank (It looks like a cashier's check and was never cashed.); a receipt for purchase of a draft for 3 million marks to the same party, which he paid \$23.50 for on July 3, 1923. Three pieces — interesting history. You set the price.

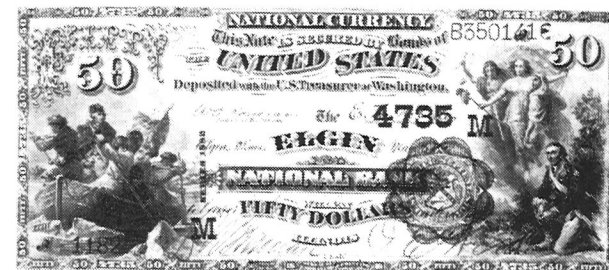

A beautiful and interesting note. This is the last type issued by the second National Bank in the United States to open for business, July 1, 1863. This specimen has the re-charter number. Number 8 was restored in 1911 and 1902 Dated Backs were issued with charter #8. Note is crisp and "ripply" as when made. Worthy of the finest collection and should exceed — \$125.

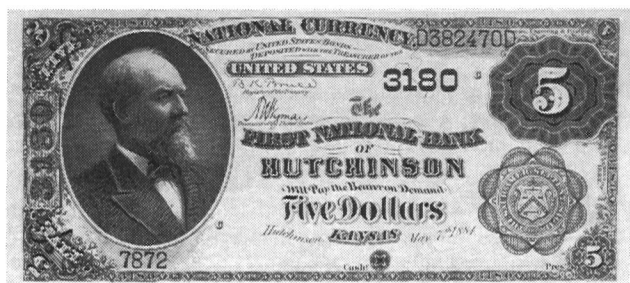

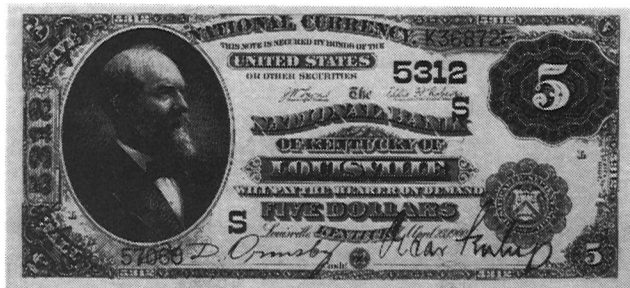

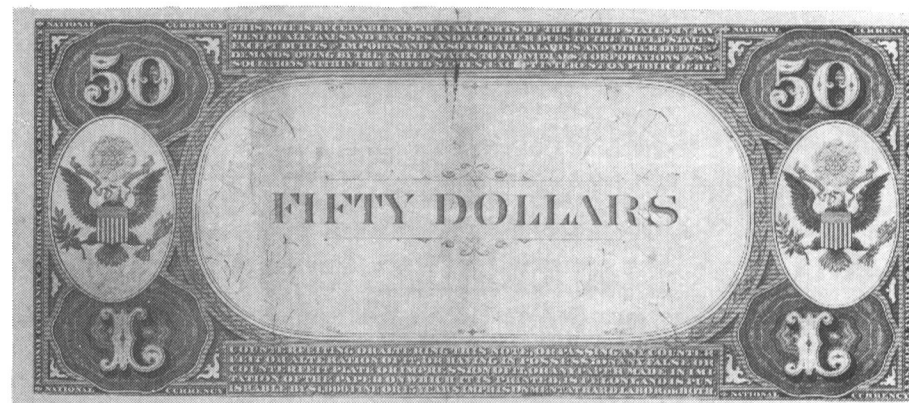

The highlight of the sale. One of the very rarest types of United States paper money. In his prize winning article published in "Paper Money" (vol. 10, number 2, 1971), Peter Huntoon documented three specimens from this bank and from the only other bank to issue the \$50 Value Back, the Winters N.B. of Dayton, Ohio. In the eight years since his article no new specimens have appeared. Dozens of lesser rarities, unknown at that time, have surfaced under the pressure of increased popularity and high prices. The Dayton, Ohio specimen, held by the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, has in all probability, been destroyed. Whether it has or not, we know of only three specimens in private hands, theoretically available to collectors. This means that only three collectors can complete a type set of U.S. paper money up to the \$50 denomination. This type remains the only type of U.S. paper money with the words "Fifty Dollars" spelled out on the reverse.

This note is well centered with no major folds. We downgrade it for weak stamped sigs and a light stain on the reverse, as evident in the picture. If not for these two small detractors it would be graded AU. It is a note that had little circulation but was probably carried, hence the stain. Very good contrast and bright color on both observe and reverse. Printed from a well inked plate. Of the three known notes in collectors hands this is a close tie for top condition.

This note was in the personal collection of Robert Friedberg, author of United States Paper Money, and upon his death, was sold with his collection at public auction in New York by Kreisberg and Schulman, March 11, 12, 13, 1965. This note was Lot 967. It was acquired then by Dewitt Prather. The note next appeared in an offering in "Coin World" by Morey Perlmutter, and was purchased by dealer, Lou Werner, and sold to a collector of long standing, J.T. Wright. The Wright collection was bought by Ivey and Knight and the note was sold by them at the A.N.A. convention of 1977. We are now pleased to be able to offer this note to you and feel the bidding will reach \$20,000.

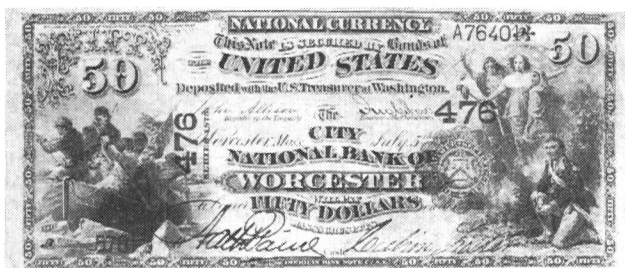

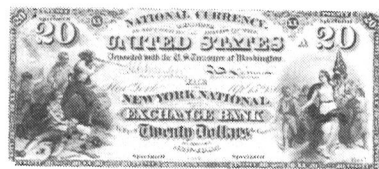

In 1870, the two partners organized the Kidder National Gold Bank of Boston with capital of \$300,000. 50 sheets of \$50 & \$100 notes were printed, as well as 75 sheets of \$500 & \$1000 notes. There is considerable doubt that these notes ever left the Treasury. In any event, the record shows that all notes were returned and destroyed. Whatever existence the bank had was in the offices of Kidder, Peabody and Co. at 40 State Street. The bank was voluntarily liquidated on November 8, 1872. Dilliston says that the economic conditions of the time were not favorable to the success of a bank operating under the restrictions of the National Gold Bank regulations. The existence of this bank has always held great fascination for collectors and until the recent discovery of the two specimens offered here, not even an illustration of these notes had ever been published. We feel proud and privileged to bring these great rarities to the attention of paper money collectors, and to the numismatic market place. We have no point of reference in estimating the value of this item, but we are confident that it will realize an important price, possibly in the range of — \$10,000 to \$12,000.
