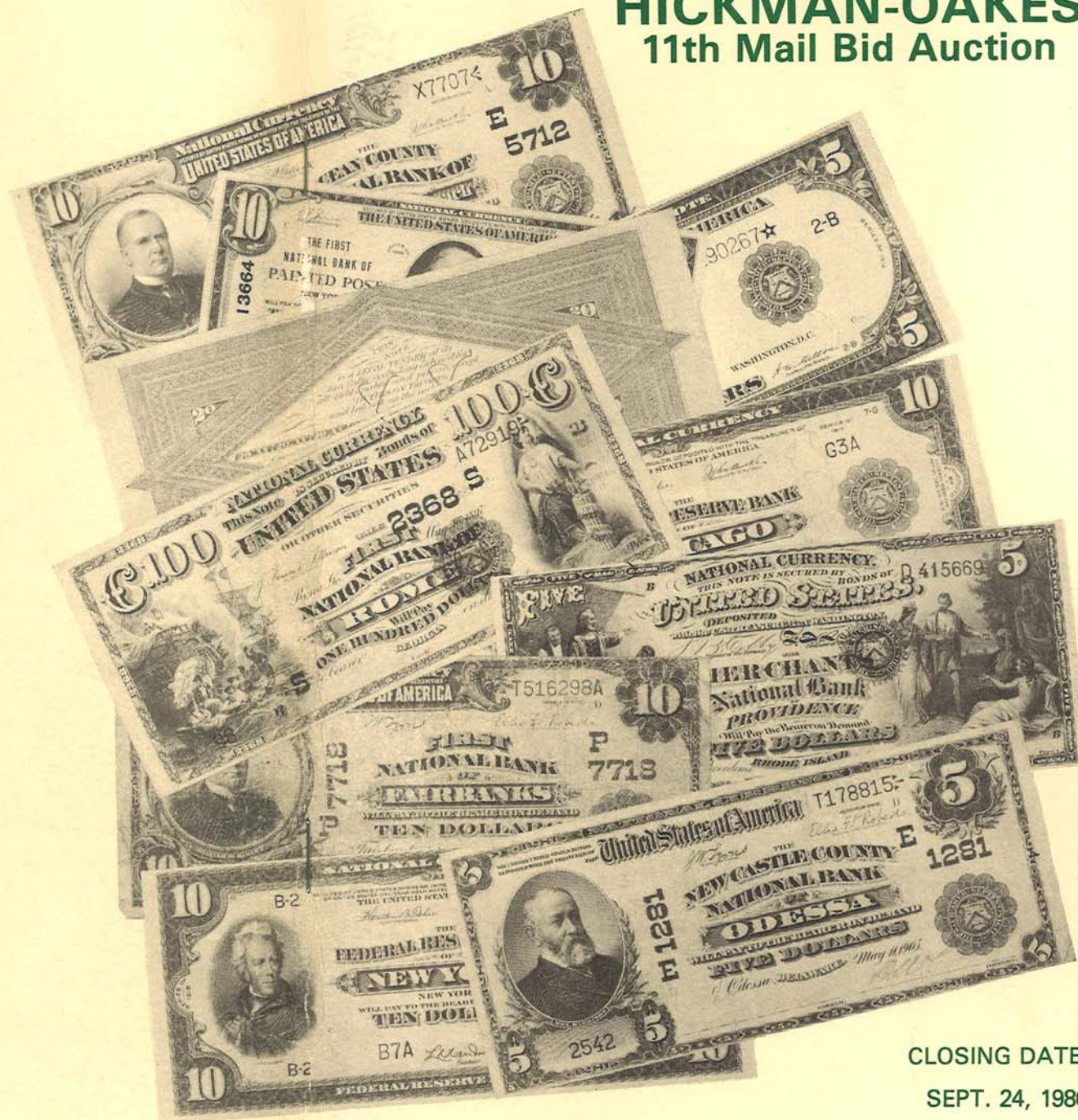

## INTRODUCTION

Welcome to our eleventh mail auction. This sale offers many opportunities seldom available to acquire scarce and rare notes. A complete collection of Third Charter ten dollar notes from all fifty of our states is included. This collection was assembled by a well known and respected collector, famous for being instrumental in adding 'In God We Trust' to our paper money.

A five dollar Delaware Red Seal, in Fine to Very Fine condition is available for the first time at auction. This is one of the rarest of all Red Seals and should bring a record price.

A recently surfaced \$100 1882 Date Back from Georgia, presently unique and likely to remain so, is sure to attract spirited bids.

An unusually large number of 50 and 100 dollar notes, as well as the notes from the 'Mississippi wallet hoard', are included.

For the first time in many years we are able to offer an outstanding selection of Iowa notes.

Our firm has been invited to conduct the auction at the Iowa Numismatic convention, to be held at the Hilton Hotel in Sioux City, Iowa, on September 26 & 27. While this sale will consist mainly of coins from the E.M. Catich estate, we will list also the nationals in this catalog from Iowa and the contiguous states of Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin. On those states, only, mail bidders will be represented in the same manner as at our Memphis sale last year and our sale in Kansas City last November. We extend a warm invitation to any of you who are able to attend this sale, which will be held on Friday night, September 26, to participate.

We would also like to mention the open house and seminar to be held August 30 and 31 at the William R. Higgins Museum in Okoboji, Iowa. Over 2000 nationals are on display, with the most complete collection of Iowa notes ever assembled included. A numismatic show is planned for the same time at the Brook's Best Western Motel. We hope you can attend.

The notes for this sale will be on display at our table at the A.N.A. We hope it will be possible for you to stop by and look over the lots for the sale. We also will be accepting consignments for our next auction scheduled to close November 14, 1980. So bring some notes or the whole collection along. We will be happy to see you there.

## TERMS OF SALE

To give all bidders an equal opportunity, bids will not be opened until the closing date of the sale. In other words, we will not know ourselves, and therefore cannot reveal, where the high bid is until the sale is over. To help us segregate bids from our regular mail, we are providing envelopes for use only for the mail bid sale. Please mark any other envelope you may use on the outside so we can know it is a bid. Skeptics are invited to inspect the unopened bids up to the closing date.

Bids must be in writing and postmarked no later than Sept. 20, 1980. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by 'phone, but we must insist that telephone bids be confirmed in writing before the deadline. Bids will be opened Sept. 24, 1980.

1. Each lot will be sold to the highest bidder unreserved at a slight advance over the next highest bid. In the event of identical mail bids, the earliest postmarked will receive the lot.
2. As in all legitimate auctions, the second highest bidder will set the price. Up to the \$1000 level, advances will be 10% with \$50.00 maximum. At \$1000.00 and over, advances will be 5%. This method will permit a bidder to make a liberal bid with the assurance that his bid will be reduced to the indicated amount above the next highest bid.
3. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot. Only signed, written bids are acceptable.
4. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice and/or lots. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders. Lots delivered in Iowa are subject to State Sales Tax of 3% unless a resale number is given. Terms are available; see your bid sheet.
5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
7. Alternate bids are acceptable.
8. GRADING--The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary. In other words, a very valuable note will have a more complete and detailed description than a note, say, not even worth double face. In notes grading VF and above, we will try to mention, within reason, all unusual defects such as named above. As a condition to your bids you may wish to say that you do not wish any lots that might contain a pin hole or whatever.
9. If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please state the grading guide that you are using (if you are) to support your position. We are firm believers in 'Satisfaction Guaranteed', and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it.
10. We reserve the right to reject any bid of 50% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.

Dated June 30, 1927. Engraved signatures. Est: about \$50

Would be a better grade except for slight brown stains on reverse of note. Only large size issued by this late (9-28-26) bank in the capital of Alabama. V.B. Murray and M.A. Vincentelli, sigs.  
Well worth a bid of \$50 or more.

A rare and, to our best knowledge, unique type from Alaska and issued only by this bank. Pen sigs of Geo. Hutchinson and R.C. Wood are faded but visible. Large size Alaska notes are seldom available and are usually priced beyond the reach of the average collector. This specimen is worth in the \$1500 range.

Signatures are very faint, and outside of a slight (3/8") tear at top margin, note is unmolested and has much remaining body. Delaware remains a key to a large size state collection. This bank is the most common in the state and still is seldom available. Should realize about \$250 or so.

Popular state capital note in ideal condition. Est: \$75

Only type issued by this bank, closed after a little over four years operation. Sigs: C.M. Milam and J.J. Hill. Well worth a bid of \$200 or more.
- 64 \$10 1929 The First National Bank of Elberton 9252 UNC  
From northeast Georgia's granite center. H.P. Hunter and M.E. Maxwell, sigs. Should realize in the range of \$150



- 65 \$100\*\* 1882DTS The Exchange National Bank of Rome S-2368 VF  
This note has to be the rarest Georgia note now known. Only the \$50 and \$100 Red Seal had a smaller issue with greater odds against survival. Issued by only three banks for a total of 534 notes, this great note represents a miracle of overcoming fantastic odds. The surfacing of great notes like this from time to time helps make collecting national bank notes the great hobby it is. This note was in a hoard of about \$12,000 in \$50's and \$100's, the others being types and Third Charter notes. There is a 1/2" edge tear in the upper border and a partial circular teller's stamp on the reverse. If rarity is meaningful, this great note will set a record price for a Georgia note in the range of \$3000-\$5000

This is the bottom note from a 10-10-10-10 plate. Evenly circulated and unmolested. Worth in the range of \$300



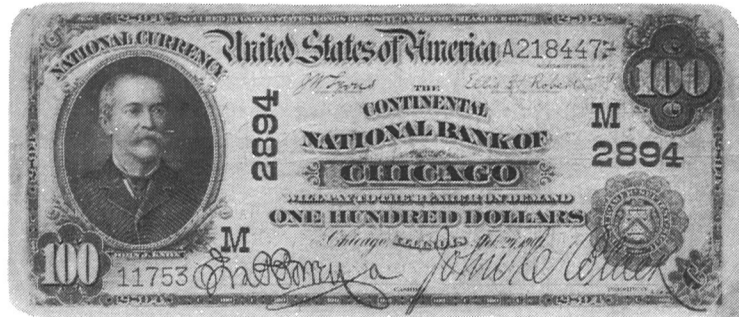

Very sharp for grade. Nice pen sig of F.D. Warn, cashier. President, A.A. Crain about 90% faded. Rare enough for a bid of \$250 or more.

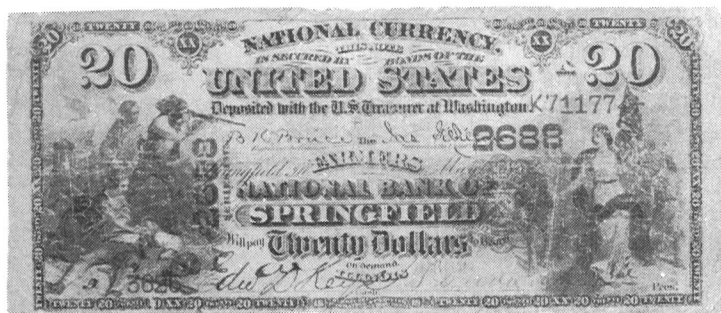

Number 126 of 158 pieces of this denomination and type. Rare enough for a bid of \$75 or more.



- 69 \$100 1902RS The Continental N.B. of Chicago M-2894 VG  
Corners are rounded on this rare type, but there is much remaining body and sigs of Ira P. Bowen, A. and John C. Black are bold and vivid. Seldom available and should exceed \$400
- 70 \$20 1902DTS The Continental & Comm. N.B. of Chicago M-2894 F  
A nice, evenly circulated note. G.M. Reynolds, president, was also the president of the American Bankers Association. Est: \$35 +
- 71 \$5\*\* 1902RS The First National Bank of Chicago M-2670 VG-F  
Another opportunity to acquire a significant note. Originally charter -8, rechartered with -2670 and redeemed it's circulation in 1916. Worth of a bid in excess of \$100

- 72 \$10\*\* 1902DTS The First National Bank of Chicago M-8 XF-AU  
A beautiful example with the restored original charter number. Bright and barely handled. Bids on this beauty likely to approach or exceed \$200
- 73 \$10 1929 The Jefferson Park N.B. of Chicago 10108 VG+  
Very scarce Chicago neighborhood note. Rodney D. Andrews and Fred H. Esdohr, sigs. Worth in the area of \$50
- 74 \$10\*\*-\* 1882VB The First N.B. of Chillicothe M-5584 VG  
A rare and unusual note. Both signatures are purple stamped in block type. We have only seen two others with this type of signature and in both cases only one officer used it. Soiled, mostly on reverse, but none the less desirable. Should exceed \$250
- 75 \$100 1902 First N.B. in East St. Louis 11596 VG  
A very scarce note, number 4278 of 6467 pieces. Only \$50 and \$100 notes were issued by this bank. Sigs are somewhat faint, but the note is whole and unimpaired. Est: \$200 +
- 76 \$10\*\* 1902 The Southern Ill. N.B. of E. St. Louis 5070 CU  
Not as rare, but a cream puff, crisp and bright. Cut a bit close at top with faint sigs, but otherwise a Gem and sure to please. Est: \$250 +

A better denomination with bold and attractive sigs and no problems. Est:\$75

From Thornton Township, Cook County, near Chicago Heights. This is the earliest and best condition note we've seen. Handsome pen sig of William D. Rogers, Vice. David Wiedemann, Cashier is rubber stamped. Scarce enough for a bid of \$100 +

From the northeast corner of Illinois on Lake Michigan. Wm. H. Harding and Frank W. Read, sigs. Est: \$35 +

Heavily soiled, but pen signed by J.W. Bailey and R.F. McLean. More and more collectors are showing preference for pen signed notes in lower grades over higher grades with stamped or missing sigs. Est: \$50

From Platt County seat in central Illinois. Sigs are missing, but note is unmolested. Est: \$50 +

Bright for grade and unimpaired. Henry H.J. Ricker and Edward Sohms, sigs. Should realize \$100+

From the only national bank to issue notes in Newton County, northwest Indiana. Faint sigs of C.B. Harms and Mort Kilgore. Est: \$50

## Interest Bearing Note



- 421 F197 \$20 One year 5% Interest Bearing note of April 15, 1864. The obverse design is similar to F191, as evident from the photo above. I want to call attention to the reverse of this note, however, because it states it's ability as a circulating medium of exchange. The reverse is dominated by the large green diamond design of geometric lathe work. In the middle, are two light x's representing the face value and a row of 20's and xx's are across the middle of the note with the counterfeiting phrase on the lower half. The inscription reads: 'This note is legal tender at it's face value excluding interest, for all debts public and private, except duties on imports and interest on the public debt.' This certainly states that it is in all ways a circulating note. It was worth \$21 upon redemption after one year from date.

Approximately 17 notes are known to be outstanding, in all conditions, according to Walter Breen, with this note tied with two others for top condition. Only a bare half dozen of this type note has shown up in auctions over the past 35 years, starting with the Grinnell in 1944. Neither the George Walton nor the William Donlon collections contained one.

This note was first offered in the Jan., 1963 F.U.N. sale, lot 304, described as 'extra rare' and About Uncirculated. It next appeared in the 1964 A.N.A. convention sale, lot 3561, Extra Fine condition, realizing a record price for that time of \$2950. We have no hesitation to believe that this rare Extra Fine type note will bring \$12,500 and may go as high as \$15,000

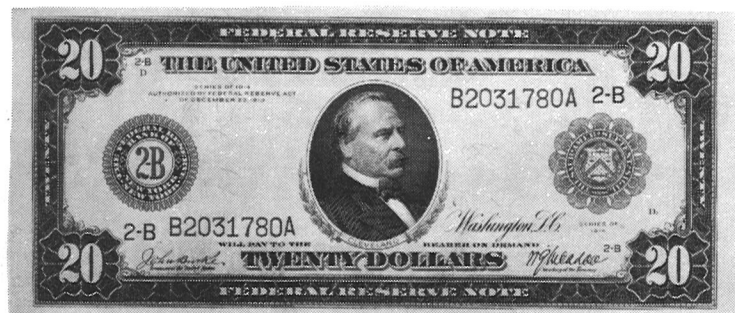
