We have no charges to the buyer or the seller other than this.

#### TERMS OF SALE

To give all bidders an equal opportunity, bids will not be opened until the closing date of the sale. In other words, we will not know ourselves, and therefore cannot reveal, where the high bid is until the sale is over. To help us segregate bids from our regular mail, we are providing envelopes for use only for the mail bid sale. Please mark any other envelope you may use on the outside so we can know it is a bid. Skeptics are invited to inspect the unopened bids up to the closing date.

Bids must be in writing and postmarked no later than March 6, 1981. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by 'phone, but we must insist that telephone bids be confirmed in writing before the deadline. Bids will be opened March 10, 1981.

- Each lot will be sold to the highest bidder unreserved at a slight advance over the next highest bid. In the event of identical mail bids, the earliest postmarked will receive the lot.
- 2. As in all legitimate auctions, the second highest bidder will set the price. Up to the \$1000 level, advances will be 10% with \$50.00 maximum. At \$1000.00 and over, advances will be 5%. This method will permit a bidder to make a liberal bid with the assurance that his bid will be reduced to the indicated amount above the next highest bid. In cases where only one bid is received, the estimate will be used as the underbid.
- All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot. Only signed, written bids are acceptable.
- 4. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice and/or lots. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders. Lots delivered in lowa are subject to State Sales Tax of 3% unless a resale number is given. Terms are available; see your bid sheet.
- 5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
- Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
- Alternate bids are acceptable.

- 8. GRADING--The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary. In other words, a very valuable note will have a more complete and detailed description than a note, say, not even worth double face. In notes grading VF and above, we will try to mention, within reason, all unusual defects such as named above. As a condition to your bids you may wish to say that you do not wish any lots that might contain a pin hole or whatever.
- 9. If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please state the grading guide that you are using (if you are) to support your position. We are firm believers in 'Satisfaction Guaranteed', and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it.
- We reserve the right to reject any bid of 50% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.





This selection of type notes, mostly from one collection, represents an excellent chance for you, the collector, to acquire the note or notes that you still need for your collection. If you are a true collector, who enjoys the challenge of collecting as well as the beauty of the items collected, then a currency collection is truly the field for you. The art of the engravers of paper money was at its zenith in America from the 1860's to the 1920's, when these bills offered here at auction were engraved and printed. We have used photos of the notes to help our description in as many cases as possible, also to show the detail of the fine engraving mentioned above. Remember, your bid is just as important to us as anyone's. Even if you feel your chances of having a winning bid are slim, make it anyway; who knows, you may be the winner. I know if you don't bid, there is no chance of getting the lot, so do some research if need be, and send that bid in.

## **Grading Comments -- Please Read**

Uncirculated notes, as Hessler explains in his book, *U.S. Paper Money*, page 50: 'New notes can be described as new (Unc or Uncirculated) only when they are in the same condition as when issued. There must be no folds, creases or signs of handling. Any blemish that was the result of handling by a bank teller must be mentioned when a note is described as new or uncirculated.' I basically agree with this statement and have gone into detail about any insufficiency in the note graded Unc. I grade a note Uncunless it has a full fold in any direction.

## Counting Marks -- Whose and from Where?

Counting marks, stains, marks, etc. are the result of tellers or bank examiners holding a pack on the counter, and with the right hand, particularly the thumb, counting the notes with thumb and left hand finger. This was done periodically so that the cash could be verified. The top notes often got a rather heavy fold on the right top corner, and a smudge would start showing from dirty thumbs, and I've seen some dirty top right corners on otherwise uncirculated notes.
