TERMS OF SALE

This sale will be a combination mail bid and floor auction sale. Written bids must be postmarked by June 8 or, after that date, mailed to us at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, 250 N. Main St., Memphis, TN 38117. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by telephone, but we will not be able to handle telephone bids. Even if you plan on attending the sale, we would encourage you to bid by mail, also. You would then be covered in case you are unable to attend. Please bring your catalog along with you to the convention. We wish not to run out.

- 1. Bid will be opened on the floor at the second highest mail bid and proceed from there.
- 2. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot.
- 3. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders.
- 4. People wishing to participate in this auction who are not planning to attend the floor auction in Memphis, must submit a signed, written mail bid, which reaches us by the closing day of the sale. If you find yourself short on time, a mailagram is acceptable.
- 5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
- 6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
- 7. Alternate bids are acceptable, but only between two lots and they must be lots that follow each other in number, such as requesting that we enter a bid on lot 225 if the bid on lot 116 was unsuccessful.
- 8. GRADING— The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary.
- 9. No return of notes is acceptable by floor bidders. If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please tell us. We are firm believers in 'Satisfaction Guaranteed', and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it.
- 10. We reserve the right to reject any bid of 60% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.

Types are complete in all cases up through the twenties and in several cases through the thousand.

The small size types are represented by the most extensive collection of regular and star notes that we've ever had the opportunity to handle. We sincerely hope you will enjoy them as much as Stanton Kreider did.

Those of you who know us or who read these catalogs carefully will know that money is not our primary motivation in conducting these sales. We have been up to now reluctant to adopt the current practice of adding a buyer's fee. Only the practice of the strictest economy has permitted us to hold firm thus far. Leo A. Young, born April 21, 1916 in Sanford, Florida, first became interested in numismatics in 1942. His interest became more and more active as time went on, and with the help and encouragement of San Francisco coin dealer Earl Parker, Leo decided to go into the rare coin business for himself. All this time, he was actively seeking and buying coins and currency for his personal collection. Once he acquired something to add to his collection, it was not offered for sale.

Over the years, Mr. Young has given to the hobby his time, knowledge and expertise. He has spoken on the subject many times, before service clubs and organizations, including the International Association of Professional Numismatists and the American Numismatic Association, of which he is a patron member. He also served as vice president and president of the prestigious Professional Numismatists Guild.

Leo A. Young also held numismatic auctions for serval years. I attended my first Leo A. Young auction at Central States in April, 1960, almost my first experience with a large numismatic auction. With Leo's numismatic experience in mind, it is with great satisfaction to Hickman-Oakes to be selected to handle now, at auction Leo's personal type set of U.S. currency. This type set was complete in national bank notes through the \$20 and in other notes, in some cases, through the \$1000.

Stanton Kreider was born in Lawrence, Kansas, and in his National Banknote collecting he remained loyal to his home state. He later lived in New York where he developed his collecting interests. He bought from Tom Settle in particular in the early 1960's. After moving to Denver in the early 1970's, he continued his collecting interests and his interest in art and photography.

Stanton patronized all the currency dealers I know of plus some I don't in his efforts to round out his many and varied collecting projects in small size currency. He rarely let price stop him if the note was needed in the collection. This is the reason that his collection is so complete in blocks in silver certificates, stars in silvers and legals, and so varied in error notes and numbers.

It is with great deal of pride that we offer his small size collection of U.S. currency and Kansas nationals.

Stanton Krieder was a collector and researcher of small size U.S. currency. As a collector he enjoyed each note in his collection. The Acquistion of each note is recorded on a slip of paper with each note as the price he paid and from whom he bought it. Many date back into the late 1960's and up until the 1980's. It is evident that he shared his knowledge with other interested members of the overall collecting fraternity, as his notes indicate a lot of correspondence. He was interested in plate numbers, plate positions, and variations in color. The color variations he felt occured from new contracts for ink, as well as plate pressure on new issues receiving more attention at the beginning of production. Something akin to regular coins being struck from proof dies. I'm sure that he would wish the next collector that owns a note of his the pleasure he had in collecting it.

Before listing the following 2 lots, we want to present what Stanton Kreider wrote about the last of the one dollar Silver Certificates:

These two series were both delivered in 1963, there being some difference of opinion among numismatists as to which was literally the final emission. During these last weeks of the printing of the one-dollar Silver Certificate, however, it is well agreed that sheets of eighteen subjects continued to be printed by the "wet" process, while simultaneously sheets of thirty-two subjects were being printed by the newer "dry" process.

The 1957B note is further distinguished by its check numbers (face 789, back 447); according to Chuck O'Donnell's "Handbook", the 6th Edition, page 28, 789 is the high official face check number and 447 is the "highest known" back check number on any onedollar Silver Certificate from 32-subject sheets. The Bureau of Engraving and Printing is understood to have stated that the range of these back check numbers extends to 459, but to the best of my knowledge as of this writing no collectors or dealers have reported seeing any back check numbers on these Silver Certificates higher than 447.

In this connection it may be noted that the backs on 32-subject one-dollar sheets were numbered continuously regardless of whether the faces were to be imprinted as Silver Certificates or Federal Reserve Notes, and that the range of back check numbers thus involved inthe overlapping has been given as 397 to 459, inclusive.

EXOTIC SERIAL NUMBERS

Stanton Krieder had an interest in serial numbers. He was a true collector and thus enjoyed his collection a great deal. He also had goals for his collecting interest and part of these goals were to get combinations of serial numbers with the numbers one, two, four, five and eight. In doing this he also acquired radar notes (a number you can read from either direction and it is the same), solid numbers or repeating numbers and, of course, low numbers. This extensive number collection is offered here in a series of lots. Often the prices he paid are mentioned as a guide to the market price of these notes.

The valuation of the notes is usually based on how old the note is, as a Silver Certificate would be harder to find today vs. a newly issued Federal Reserve note, so age plays a part. In valuating a note with unusual numbers one takes into account how often a note of that series comes up with a low number or numbers under 100 or under 500. Of course condition and over-all appearance enter into the final price also. These numbers are interesting and a true collector's field, so help yourselves to collecting enjoyment. 
