



TERMS OF SALE

This sale will be a combination mail bid and floor auction sale. Late bids should be sent to us at Hyatt Cherry Hill, Rt. 7 & Cuthbert Blvd., Cherry Hill, New Jersey 08002. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by telephone, but we will not be able to handle telephone bids. Even if you plan on attending the sale, we would encourage you to bid by mail, also. You would then be covered in case you are unable to attend. Please bring your catalog along with you to the convention. We wish not to run out.

- 1. Bid will be opened on the floor at the second highest mail bid and proceed from there.
- 2. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot.
- All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders.
- 4. People wishing to participate in this auction who are not planning to attend the floor auction in Cherry Hill, must submit a signed, written mail bid, which reaches us by the closing day of the sale. If you find yourself short on time, a mailagram is acceptable.
- 5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
- 6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
- 7. Alternate bids are acceptable, but only between two lots and they must be lots that follow each other in number, such as requesting that we enter a bid on lot 225 if the bid on lot 116 was unsuccessful.
- 8. GRADING— The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary.
- 9. No return of notes is acceptable by floor bidders. If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please tell us. We are firm believers in 'Satisfaction Guaranteed', and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it.
- 10. We reserve the right to reject any bid of 60% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.
- 11. Lots will be available for viewing in Cherry Hill, New Jersey, on November 14th at 10:00 A.M., at the Hyatt Cherry Hill Hotel. Lots purchased by floor bidders cannot be returned, therefore they must be viewed before bidding. Naramore souvenir sheet of photographic copies of LegalTender and National Bank notes, \$1 to \$1000. Sold at the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia in 1876. All 18 notes mounted on one sheet as issued. The bottom 3 National photo's have edge damage as does the top \$1 Legal. \$2 National has a skinned spot. These Naramore items are always of interest to collectors of currency. We had in, our 18th sale lot 674, a set of 18 individual cards that brought \$275 - this is rarer, but condition not quite as good. We have seen really tattered sheets priced at \$250, so bid its value to you.

The letter below is written to us by Arthur L. Freidberg on July 15, 1985 in support of the following lots. The body of the letter is reprinted here. Dear Dean: This is to wish you the best of success in your auction of the original copper half tone plates from the first edition of the late Robert Friedberg's PAPER MONEY OF THE UNITED STATES, published in 1953. The notes illustrated came from the collection of Mr. Nat Heft, a resident of New York City, and one of the pioneers in the collecting of large size paper money. As you are aware, at that time, special permission was required from the United States Treasury for photographic reproduction of United States currency, and as such, these plates are historically significant in themselves. In compliance with rules established by the Secret Service and Secretary of the Treasury, great care was taken in the manufacture and safekeeping of these plates. We have carefully checked them, and can verify that they are the original plates used in the production of the book which, in its eleventh edition, remains the definitive reference in its field. Again, good luck with this interesting and exciting piece of numismatic history - a once in a lifetime opportunity for some fortunate bidder. Sincerely yours, Arthur L. Friedberg Cataloger's note: (It is interesting to note the name Nat Heft, who bought the high demoniation notes from Jim Wade's collection. They then went from Heft to Friedberg to Carter. Amon Carter aquired them from Friedhberg in a trade of uncirculated rolls after 1953. The following 11 lots were made up of the copper halftone plates so each bidder might get some different types of notes. The photo below illustrates a sample of the plates. 

Both of the notes that changed hands were in the Fine grades and they both sold in the \$30,000 area. In the Memphis sale, a \$1000 1880 Silver, lot 1189, of which a total of 4 notes are known, brought \$29,000. I expect this unique note to follow suit and sell very near \$30,000

Altogether we know of 5 notes from this bank (one overprinted in black) and one from the Illinois bank. Amon Carter owned this one and a typed memo states, 'Paid \$250. Only one other known'. We believe this note to be the finest example extant. The government undoubtedly put a stop to this practice, and probably took steps to remove them from circulation. My theory about these is that the Shoe and Leather Bank wished to draw attention to themselves, or at least to set themselves apart from the dozens of other national banks in Boston, and used this method to accomplish that end. Under the signature of the vice president, in tiny red letters, is 'pro tem', short for pro tempore, or 'for the time being'. Another item unique with this note. We don't recall one of these notes being offered for sale at public auction since the Grinnell sale 40 years ago. A great and unusual rarity in a splendid state of preservation such as this is worth whatever it costs.
