

#### **TERMS OF SALE**

To give all bidders an equal opportunity, bids will not be opened until the closing date of the sale. In other words, we will not know ourselves, and therefore cannot reveal, where the high bid is until the sale is over. To help us segregate bids from our regular mail, we are providing envelopes for use only for the mail bid sale. Please mark any other envelope you may use on the outside so we can know it is a bid. Skeptics are invited to inspect the unopened bids up to the closing date.

To insure your efforts are not wasted, mail this bid early. We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by phone, but we must insist that telephone bids be confirmed in writing before the deadline. Bids will be opened June 25, 1986.

- Each lot will be sold to the highest bidder unreserved at a slight advance over the next highest bid. In the event of identical mail bids, the earliest postmark will receive the lot.
- 2. As in all legitimate auctions, the second highest bidder will set the price. Up to the \$1000 level, advances will be 10% with \$50.00 maximum. At \$1000 and over, advances will be 5%. This method will permit a bidder to make a liberal bid with the assurance that his bid will be reduced to the indicated amount above the next highest bid. In cases where only one bid is received, the estimate will be used as the underbid.
- 3. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot. Only signed, written bids are acceptable. These bids are a binding contractual offer on your part.
- 4. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice and/or lots. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful mail bidders. Lots delivered in lowa are subject to State Sales Tax of 4% unless a resale number is given. Terms are available; see your bid sheet.
- 5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.
- 6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloguer as to what the lots should bring. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.
- 7. Alternate bids are acceptable. No buy bids are acceptable.
- 8. GRADING-The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine or below, unless, in the cataloguer's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary.
- 9. If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please tell us. We are firm believers in "Satisfaction Guaranteed," and we intend for you to be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it. However If it is not our error we feel and we cannot agree, we may have to pick third parties to get a further opinion. We do not intend in any way to have our auction be an approval sale.
- 10. We reserved the right to reject any bid of 60% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.
- 11. A 5% buyers fee will be added to the total invoiced amount of each successful bidder. Lots will be available for viewing in lowa City, lowa by contacting Dean Oakes, (319) 338-1144 or by writing c/o Box 1456, lowa City, lowa 52244, until the day before the sale closes.

#### TERRITORIAL NATIONAL BANK NOTES — by Peter Huntoon

Nothing quickens the pulse of a National Bank Note buff as much as the word "Territory," 'Terr," or "Ter." on a note laid before him! Territorials have always occupied an exalted place among collectors and the mystique surrounding them has routinely been translated into record sales prices. Prices realized for the really rare territorials have exceeded \$10,000. The record is \$32,000. Obviously territorial notes have a special allure - they represent fragments of history when America was young and its frontiers beckoned the restless to discovery and opportunity.

As I look from my house across the tens of miles of unobstructed vistas which comprise the Laramie Basin of Wyoming, I can imagine the hopes of the pioneers who crossed here on the Overland Trail in the 1860's. Transportation was arduous, Indians a threat, and the unknown over the next hill a constant anxiety. Yet the adventurous pressed on. They wanted opportunity and elbow room. They found both, and they also discovered a security that only successfully living on the edge can provide. The territorial Nationals created by their dreams and labors are a small but very signigicant momument to their passing.

A total of 606 different banks issued 5,875,338 large size territorials, and 898,890 small territorials. The face value of the large notes was \$55,341,150 and that of the small notes was \$9,315,430.

Such numbers seem impressive, but sink into insignificance when placed into perspective with the nonterritorials, or even state notes from the same locations. For example, the Bank of America in San Francisce, the largest note issuing bank in the country, distributed over \$107,000,000 in small notes in the short period of 1929 to 1935. This amount is just about double the entire territorial output between 1864 and 1935! Between 1929 and 1935, the Bank of America singlehandedly distributed 5,768,082 \$5 notes which is almost equal to the entire output of large size territorial notes between 1864 and 1929.

Although the totals for the territorial issues seem large, you must realize that most of these notes were put into circulation to replace other territorials that had worn out. Territorials remain, despite the figures, one of the rarest pursuits in numismatics. They represent a drop in the bucket, and most circulated to oblivion in the romote corners of our country.

In terms of total territorial notes issued, the First National Bank of Honolulu, Hawii (5550) alone accounts for over 94 percent of the small size total. The remaining notes were spread thinly over the remaining 605 banks from unheard of places such as Bisbee, Arizona Territory; Pembina, Dakota Territory; Ravia, Indian Territory; of Sundance, Wyoming Territory.

On February 1, 1967, I added my first territorial to my budding collection. The note was a \$20 Red Seal on the Citizens National Bank of Almagordo, Territory of New Mexico, that grades a full XF or some would call it AU. I reached for that one, paying some \$175 for it, and it represented the culmination of my fondest numismatic dream. To say the least, I was excited. I sincerely hope that you will experience the thrill of a comparable discovery - in numismatics of elsewhere. Such luck makes life worth living!

—the Territory of Idaho issued 76,524 notes from 8 banks, of which only 4 are known to survive today.

—the Territory of Nebraska issued 152,276 notes from only 3 banks, and 5 notes are known today.

—the Territory of Washington issued 244,654 notes from 40 banks, and there are 8 notes known from 7 different banks.

—the Territory of Wyoming issued 97,848 notes from 11 banks, and 10 notes are known today from 4 banks.

- -Utah Territory issued 221,208 notes of which 29 are known today from 5 of the 17 banks issuing.
- -Montana Territory has 33 known notes from 10 of 25 banks issuing a total of 280,764 notes.
- —Territory of Colorado issued 450,806 notes of which 54 survive from 9 different banks.
- —Territory of New Mexico had 902,352 notes issued from 55 banks and 108 notes survive from 27 different banks.

Average survival is 1 note per 8345 notes issued. However, on Nebraska and Washington, the survival is 1 note per 30,500 notes issued.

We asked Peter Huntoon for his comments on territorials as regards this auction and he referred us to his article in **Paper Money**, issue 109, pages 15-17. He also supplied the updated information on the above listed territories. More complete information can be found in the above mentioned article and the book mentioned below. We thank Peter for this help.

#### **INTRODUCTION**

Welcome to our 31st sealed bid auction. This sale marks the beginning of our eleventh year in conducting these auctions. This sale is missing a few of the states and contains fewer notes than has been the case recently. To more than offset this, however, we have recieved three very significant consignments. A group of notes from the great Amon Carter collection includes several of his very best notes, notably the Lazy Two from Nebraska Territory, a ten dollar brown back from Washington Territory and the only twenty dollar 1875 note from Wyoming Territory. We also have available his Wisconsin black charter note and his Jeffries and Spinner note from Minnesota.

À second consignment of nearly twenty one dollar notes from 18 states, including several of the rarest ones, should give collectors an opportunity to add one or more of this difficult type to their collections.

The currency estate of a midwestern collector who passed away over twenty years ago has been consigned to us by Wayne Skiles. The outstanding note contained therein is the twenty dollar Red Seal note from Apalachicola, Florida. This exciting note is the first opportunity for Florida collectors to acquire a new town in many years. Second only to the Apalachicola note is a beautiful Third Charter note from Shelbina, Missouri, the first ever seen by modern collectors. Numerous other previously unknown types and denominations were also included and we feel that serious collectors are sure to find notes of interest.

All of these notes, as well as many others, will be on display at the Memphis International Paper Money Convention and a special effort to view these notes is well justified.

We wish to thank the hundreds of bidders, consignors and boosters who have made the last ten years of successful sales possible. We look forward to many more. As always, we wish you all—Happy Hunting!!



#### U.S. TYPE NOTES

The Wayne Skiles consignment to this auction and our November auction contains a wide range of large size U.S. type notes. These notes had been off the market for at least 25 years. Most of the notes had small typewritten card inserts that stated the grade, price and either the Friedberg number or, in some cases, the catalog number of George Blake from his 1908 pamphlet on U.S. Paper Money. Prices like \$5 for 237 \$1 1923 in UNC and \$2 F.48, new at \$55 are examples.

In going over this consignment, it becomes evident that some of the notes were improved. That seems to be the least offensive term to use. It is a well known fact that several people (ie. dealers and collectors alike) washed notes and pressed them to improve their looks, making the note appear new or closer to it. This practice was supported by the general fraternity and the ANA published an article on "How to Wash or Improve Paper Money" sometime in the late 1950's. I bring this up because a lot of the grading on this currency used the word new and the actual grade ranges from VF to CU. We still have this problem with us and it may be a problem the P.C.D.A. will want to address, but to me, a note that was washed and pressed and is offered at its real grade of VF, XF or AU has not been hurt nor will the note hurt anyone else. If the note is offered uncirculated when a previous owner improved it from XF, then we have another case altogether. If a note was a dirty, folded Fine and it was washed to remove the grime and dirt and in so doing the worn folds become white lines or the ink and fibers of the paper are washed out, then that note deserves the term "washed out" or "washed and pressed," and that note has to be valued at less than its dirty counterpart. The notes that were pressed out in this collection are few and far between but it was interesting to look at two or three that carried the "new" grade and find the note to be (and we graded it) much lower. This 31st sale and our 32nd November, '86 sale both will have some very interesting type notes, so send in your bids; we can't do it without you!


