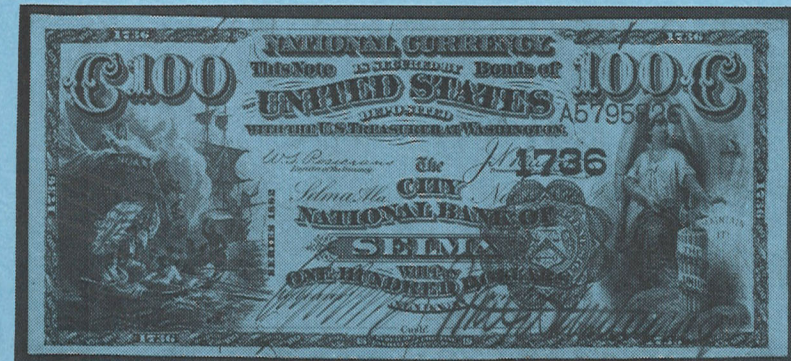
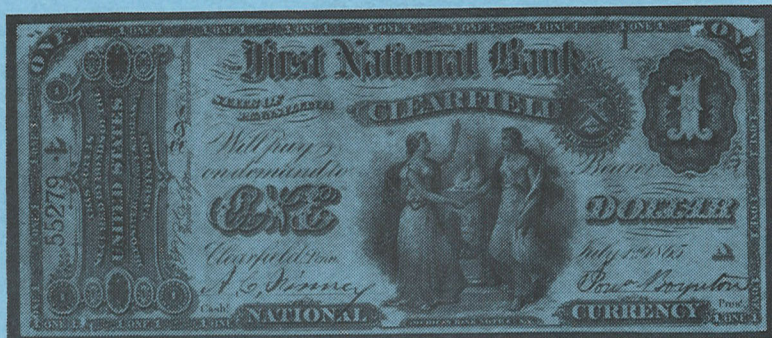

TERMS OF SALE

This sale will be a combination mail bid and floor auction sale. Late bids should be sent to us at the Radisson Saint Louis Hotel, Ninth St. & Convention Plaza Blvd., St. Louis, MO 63101 and marked, "Hold for arrival Oct. 29".

We will be pleased to discuss and further describe any of the notes by telephone. In a departure from our normal policy, you may telephone bids to (319)338-1144, but you must also submit a written bid the same day the telephone bid is made. If you plan on attending the sale, we would encourage you to bid by mail, also. You would then be covered in case you are unable to attend. Please bring your catalog along with you to the convention. We wish not to run out.

1. The bid will be opened on the floor at the second highest mail bid and proceed from there.

2. All lots are guaranteed genuine and as described. Please be sure you are bidding the correct amount on the proper lot.

3. All successful bidders must remit payment immediately upon receipt of the invoice. The cost of postage and insurance will be added to the invoices of successful bidders plus a 5% buyer's fee.

4. People wishing to participate in this auction who are not planning to attend the floor auction in St. Louis, must submit a signed, written mail bid, which reaches us by the closing day of the sale. If you find yourself short on time, a mailgram is acceptable. Telephone bids will be accepted, but must be backed up with a written mail bid sent the same day the telephone bid is made.

5. All photographs are of the actual lots being sold.

6. Prices or estimates given reflect the opinion of the cataloger as to what the lots are worth. Higher rather than lower valuations are expected to prevail.

7. Alternate bids are acceptable, but only between two lots and they must be lots that follow each other in number. We cannot handle an alternate bid among several different lots, nor will we attempt to handle an either/or bid between more than two lots.

8. **GRADING**—The standard grades are used as outlined below. An overall grade is given to take into consideration the note's appearance. A grade of F/VG means that the reverse of a note is not as nice as the face of the note. A grade of VG-F is a grade for the complete note. Such defects as margin tears, pin holes, stains, abrasions, or other appearance are not mentioned in grades of Fine and below, unless, in the cataloger's opinion, it affects the value of the note enough to make mentioning necessary.

9. **No return of notes is acceptable by floor bidders.** If you receive a note by mail that you feel you should return for any reason, you may do so, if within 3 days of receipt and you state your reason for dissatisfaction. If it is a grading problem, please tell us. We are firm believers in 'Satisfaction Guaranteed', and we intend that you be satisfied. If we make an error, we want to know about it.

10. We reserve the right to reject any bid of 60% of estimate or less, or any bid of less than 15% over face.

11. Lots will be available for viewing at the Convention Center in St. Louis, Missouri during show hours. Lots purchased by floor bidders cannot be returned, therefore they must be viewed before bidding. Lots will be available for viewing in Iowa City, Iowa, by contacting Dean Oakes, (319) 338-1144.
