

## TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE

- 1. This is a public auction and mail bid sale held by licensed auctioneers. All lots are sold to the highest bidder without reserve. There are no restrictions on who may bid in the auction, but the auctioneer reserves the right, at his sole discretion, to refuse any bid from anyone.
- 2. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. In the event of any dispute between bidders, the auctioneer may, at his sole discretion, put the lot up for sale again. The auctioneer's decision shall be final and binding upon all bidders.
- 3. All bids are to be per lot as numbered in this catalog.
- 4. No lots can be broken.
- 5. All sales are are strictly for cash in United States funds, and are due and payable immediately upon receipt of the auction invoice and /or notes. Lots delivered in the state the auction is held are subject to all applicable state and local taxes, unless approriate permits are on file with us. Shipping, handling and insurance charges will be added to invoices shipped by mail. Overseas buyers must furnish their own insurance during shipment.
- 6. The auctioneer reserves the right to require full payment before delivery of the material. Bidder personally guarantees payment and if a corporation, officer or principal in the corporation agrees to personally guarantee payment. It is the responsibility of the buyer to provide adequate insurance coverage for the notes once they are in his possession. Risk of loss shall be borne by the buyer following shipment of the notes.
- 7. The auctioneer reserves the right to refuse to honor any bid which, in his opinion, is not submitted in good faith, or may not be supported by satisfactory references, as he in his sole discretion shall determine. Auctioneer may refuse any bid not commensurate with the value of the lot.
- 8. No buy or unlimited bids will be accepted. Whenm there are mail bidders for a lot, the bid is submitted to the auctioneer acting on behalf of the highest mail bidder, opening bidding to the floor at an advance of from five to ten percent over the second highest bid. In the case of a single or no mail bidder on a lot, the opening bid shall be at the sole discretion of the auctioneer.
- 9. The auctioneer shall not be responsible for errors in mail bidding. When identical mail bids are submitted, preference goes to the first one received.
- 10. Bids submitted by persons under 18 years of age will not be accepted.
- 11. All notes are guaranteed genuine. Successful bidders may request certification as to the authenticity of any lot. Auctioneer, at bidder's expense will forward the lot to a recognized authority for certification. Bidder must notify auctioneer of his intention have a lot certified prior to taking possession of it. The auction is not an approval service, and all sales are to be considered final. All lots are available for viewing before the auction.
- 12. Grading is intended to follow normal standards with a conservative approach. However grading cannot be considered a precise science, and opinions may differ from individual to individual. We guarantee our professional best efforts to properly grade and describe all lots in this auction. We place our reputation and twenty five years experience on the line with every lot.
- 13. All sales to the floor are final with no returns. All invoices are scheduled to be mailed to the mail bidders within 72 hours of the auction, and payment must be made within five (5) days of receipt of the invoice. It is the responsibility of the bidder by mail to assure such payment or provide alternative arrangements in the event of circumstances which could cause a delay. Mail bidders will have five (5) days after receipt of the material to return any lots misgraded or misdescribed. Lots must be returned intact in the original holder unmolested. No lot may be returned for any reason after thirty days from the sale date.
- 14. We intend treating our clients as we ourselves would be treated. Any dispute that may arise can be resolved by reasonable negotiation. We want to be fair.
- 15. A 5% buyers fee will be added to the total invoiced amount.

#### **BIDDING BY MAIL**

Each lot is sold to the highest bidder. Every lot is unique and exists at the time of the sale, unless announced to be withdrawn prior to the actual sale. There are no back up or extra lots.

In bidding by mail, it is possible to purchase a note at a price less than your maximum bid. You should consider your bids in this auction to be your limit rather than your bid.

With a floor sale scheduled, bids are recorded as they are received. At the close of the mail bidding, the highest and second highest bids are transfered to the bid book. On the floor of the auction, the bidding is opened at a five to ten percent advance over the second highest mail bid. This bid is submitted on behalf of the highest mail bidder. If the auctioneer recognizes no other bids from the floor, the highest mail bidder is awarded the lot at the opening bid regardless of the fact that his bid may be much higher. If the bidding proceeds from the floor, the auctioneer, acting as the mail bidder's agent, registers bids in standard increments over the previous bid. This process is continued until the mail bidder is awarded the lot, or until the next bid is higher than the mail bidder's maximum bid. For example: The highest mail bidder submits a bid of \$500.00: the second highest bid is \$300.00. In this case, bidding on the floor starts at \$325.00 and is bid by the auctioneer on behalf of the highest mail bidder. If no other bids are submitted by the floor, the highest mail bidder, who bid \$500.00, has purchased the lot for \$325.00. If other bids come from the floor, the auctioneer bids for the highest mail bidder in standard increments until the mail bidder's maximum bid of \$500.00 is reached. When or if the bidding from the floor has passed the mail bidder's maximum, the auctioneer will take no further action on behalf of the mail bidder retains many of the advantages of the floor bidder.

## **RARITY**

The rarity ratings are based on the known notes in either large or small size series notes. This project began over twenty five years ago and has been contributed to by over 350 individuals and institutions. Approximately 125,000 notes have been recorded. The rarities are constantly changing as new notes are added to the census. This is an ongoing project and we appreciate the help we continue to receive. We all benefit from accuracy. The rarity scale is as follows:

- R6 None, one or two notes known to us.
- R5 Three, four or five notes known to us.
- R4 Six to eleven notes known to us.
- R3 Twelve to twenty four notes known to us.
- R2 Twenty five to fifty notes known to us.
- R1 Over fifty notes known to us.



Philip Krakover was one of the movers and shakers of Los Angeles. A graduate of U.S.C., he worked in engineering and city planning for the city until he organized his own land planning and zoning consulting firm in 1964.

In eight years he single handedly processed or had a hand in over 3,400 planning, zoning, or land division projects.

In 1971, he became a founding partner in Engineering Technology, Inc., which grew to annual sales of over five million dollars and a staff of over 80 employees. Mr Krakover became well known for his willingness to undertake projects of great difficulty and immensity.

This trait carried over into his collecting activities. With great tenacity and resourcefulness he undertook the collection of National Bank Notes. Amazingly, he was able to acquire the largest and finest collection of California notes ever assembled in a little over four years. His premature death at 51 robbed his family of a husband and father, his community of one of its dynamic leaders, and our hobby of a very valuable and significant member.

His collection is testimony of his remarkable achievement. We are honored to have been chosen to offer it for sale.

## Introduction

Welcome to the first Hickman auction of the 1990s. I am extremely proud to begin our new venture with such a distinguished collection as the Philip Krakover collection of California national bank notes. Although I met him at Memphis, I knew Mr. Krakover mainly through his participation in the H & O auctions, and by his reputation as the leading buyer of California nationals. His activity was such that Charles Colver, one of his principal competitors, dubbed him the "Vacuum Cleaner" because he was sucking up all the available notes in the state. This was a term that Mr. Krakover got a great kick out of. Whatever one may think of the prices he paid for the notes he purchased, there's no denying that his purchases represent transactions that took place in the real world. Catalogs that list values of notes in various grades or premiums are interesting as a reference but quite often the notes do not exist in the listed grades and even when they do, they are not often available. Cataloging his collection has been a rewarding endeavor. Because of the generosity of Mrs. Ann Krakover we are permitted to reveal the prices paid for the vast majority of the notes. Those without the prices were possibly transactions involving trades or other considerations than financial. The census referred to in this catalog was compiled by W. K. Raymond of Fresno with the cooperation of the vast majority of collectors and dealers of California notes, myself included. This compilation of the known notes has undergone several revisions and is now as complete as any similar project in the country. Owners of notes not in the census are invited to participate. A clear photo copy sent to Mr. Raymond at 660 East Carmen Avenue, Fresno 93728 is the best way to add new notes to the census. The bank titles and rarities along with the data are from the Standard Catalog of National Bank Notes published by Krause Publications. In the case of the national gold banks represented in this auction, and in a couple of other cases where it is meaningful, the complete data is included. We had originally intended including the complete data on every bank represented in this collection but the space requirements would have made it impractical. This book, commonly referred to as H & O, is currently being revised with a second edition scheduled for publication this year. Participants in this auction have the opportunity to contribute to the establishment of new catalog values. Thanks to the generosity of Cliff Mishler this data was made available for inclusion in this catalog. Bidders in this auction will enjoy benefits Philip Krakover never had. He wanted to collect California notes and he was pretty much boxed in to a take it or leave it situation at the tender mercies of the owner of the notes. Also he was able to select from a limited number of notes at a time. Bidders in this auction will be able to select from the entire collection and for competition they will have only the other bidders. It is my hope that this catalog will give the collector of national bank notes more useful information that will be helpful to him in reaching a decision than any previous auction catalog. How well we have succeeded is a matter for you, the buyer to decide. You will have the information to use or not use as you see fit. The serial number of every note is with the lot for future provenance.

On a personal note this auction has been a family project for me and my three sons. Rick, the oldest, with a background in banking and finance has seen to the design of our new logo, the printing of our letterheads ect, our banking and photography ect. Matt. the second son, with a background in computer programing, and Kevin the youngest, a computer systems analyst have together selected the computer and laser printer and the software used to prepare this catalog, handle the requests for catalogs and settle the sale. They have greatly assisted their almost computer illiterate father in the formating of this catalog and through several trial runs to work out the bugs and kinks that seem to be part of a project of this kind. Those of you who are parents will understand how pleased and proud I am to have my sons associated with me in a project that has been such a large and important part of my life. As in the previous thirty eight auction catalogs I have been involved in. I hope that you will find notes that will enhance your collection, gladden your heart, and leave your purse relatively intact. I wish you all, Happy Hunting!





The new Haxby catalog issued by Krause Publications should be of great assistance and we are greatly encouraged by offers of assistance from several of the leading collectors and dealers in the field. We will be providing further information later about our plans for the future. For now, we invite your consideration of our June sale should you have material you wish to consign for auction. At this writing we have a large consignment of Illinois notes and about sixty notes from the first hundred banks chartered, with the remainder of ther sale open. We are also open to a state collection for next fall or spring to be held in the state where the notes were collected. Give us a call if you want more information.
