

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE

- 1. This is a public auction and mail bid sale held by licensed auctioneers. All lots are sold to the highest bidder without reserve. There are no restrictions on who may bid in the auction, but the auctioneer reserves the right, at his sole discretion, to refuse any bid from anyone.
- 2. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. In the event of any dispute between bidders, the auctioneer may, at his sole discretion, put the lot up for sale again. The auctioneer's decision shall be final and binding upon all bidders.
- 3. All bids are to be per lot as numbered in this catalog.
- 4. No lots can be broken.
- 5. All sales are are strictly for cash in United States funds, and are due and payable immediately upon receipt of the auction invoice and/or notes. Lots delivered in the state the auction is held are subject to all applicable state and local taxes, unless approriate permits are on file with us. Shipping, handling and insurance charges will be added to invoices shipped by mail. Overseas buyers must furnish their own insurance during shipment.
- 6. The auctioneer reserves the right to require full payment before delivery of the material. Bidder personally guarantees payment and if a corporation, officer or principal in the corporation agrees to personally guarantee payment. It is the responsibility of the buyer to provide adequate insurance coverage for the notes once they are in his possession. Risk of loss shall be borne by the buyer following shipment of the notes.
- 7. The auctioneer reserves the right to refuse to honor any bid which, in his opinion, is not submitted in good faith, or may not be supported by satisfactory references, as he in his sole discretion shall determine. Auctioneer may refuse any bid not commensurate with the value of the lot.
- 8. No buy or unlimited bids will be accepted. When there are mail bidders for a lot, the bid is submitted to the auctioneer acting on behalf of the highest mail bidder, opening bidding to the floor at an advance of from five to ten percent over the second highest bid. In the case of a single or no mail bidder on a lot, the opening bid shall be at the sole discretion of the auctioneer.
- 9. The auctioneer shall not be responsible for errors in mail bidding. When identical mail bids are submitted, preference goes to the first one received.
- 10. Bids submitted by persons under 18 years of age will not be accepted.
- 11. All notes are guaranteed genuine. Successful bidders may request certification as to the authenticity of any lot. Auctioneer, at bidder's expense will forward the lot to a recognized authority for certification. Bidder must notify auctioneer of his intention to have a lot certified prior to taking possession of it. The auction is not an approval service, and all sales are to be considered final. All lots are available for viewing before the auction.
- 12. Grading is intended to follow normal standards with a conservative approach. However grading cannot be considered a precise science, and opinions may differ from individual to individual. We guarantee our professional best efforts to properly grade and describe all lots in this auction. We place our reputation and twenty five years experience on the line with every lot.
- 13. All sales to the floor are final with no returns. All invoices are scheduled to be mailed to the mail bidders within 72 hours of the auction, and payment must be made within five (5) days of receipt of the invoice. It is the responsibility of the bidder by mail to assure such payment or provide alternative arrangements in the event of circumstances which could cause a delay. Mail bidders will have five (5) days after receipt of the material to return any lots misgraded or misdescribed. Lots must be returned intact in the original holder unmolested. No lot may be returned for any reason after thirty days from the sale date.
- 14. We intend treating our clients as we ourselves would be treated. Any dispute that may arise can be resolved by reasonable negotiation. We *want* to be fair.
- 15. A 5% buyers fee will be added to the total invoiced amount.

BIDDING BY MAIL

Each lot is sold to the highest bidder. Every lot is unique and exists at the time of the sale, unless announced to be withdrawn prior to the actual sale. There are no back up or extra lots. In bidding by mail, it is possible to purchase a note at a price less than your maximum bid. You should consider your bids in this auction to be your limit rather than your bid.

With a floor sale scheduled, bids are recorded as they are received. At the close of the mail bidding, the highest and second highest bids are transferred to the bid book. On the floor of the auction, the bidding is opened at a five to ten percent advance over the second highest mail bid. This bid is submitted on behalf of the highest mail bidder. If the auctioneer recognizes no other bids from the floor, the highest mail bidder is awarded the lot at the opening bid regardless of the fact that his bid may be much higher. If the bidding proceeds from the floor, the auctioneer, acting as the mail bidder's agent, registers bids in standard increments over the previous bid. This process is continued until the mail bidder is awarded the lot, or until the next bid is higher than the mail bidder's maximum bid. For example: The highest mail bidder submits a bid of \$500.00: the second highest bid is \$300.00. In this case, bidding on the floor starts at \$325.00 and is bid by the auctioneer on behalf of the highest mail bidder. If no other bids are submitted by the floor, the highest mail bidder, who bid \$500.00, has purchased the lot for \$325.00. If other bids come from the floor, the auctioneer bids for the highest mail bidder in standard increments until the mail bidder's maximum bid of \$500.00 is reached. When or if the bidding from the floor has passed the mail bidder's maximum, the auctioneer will take no further action on behalf of the mail bidder, and the bidding will continue on the floor until the final purchaser has been recognized by the auctioneer. Using this procedure, the mail bidder retains many of the advantages of the floor bidder.

RARITY

The rarity ratings are based on the known notes in either large or small size series notes. This project began over twenty five years ago and has been contributed to by over 350 individuals and institutions. Approximately 135,000 notes have been recorded. The rarities are constantly changing as new notes are added to the census. This is an ongoing project and we appreciate the help we continue to receive. We all benefit from accuracy. The rarity scale is as follows:

- R6 None, one or two notes known to us
- R5 three, four or five notes known to us
- R4 six to eleven notes known to us
- R3 twelve to twenty four notes known to us
- R2 twenty five to fifty notes known to us
- R1 Over fifty notes known to us.

An asterisk (4*) indicates that one or more uncut sheets are counted in the rarity for that bank.



Introduction

Welcome to the Memphis '91 Hickman auction. I am very proud to be honored for the sixth time by the Memphis Coin Club with the privilege of conducting the auction for the International Paper Money Convention. We are pleased to include the schedule of events for this 15th annual show on the opposite page. I hope you will take advantage of the meetings and entertainment they have planned and that this occasion will be a memorable event for you and your family. For this auction we have made a special effort to include a wide variety of material that should include something for every taste and purse. Some of the material is unfamiliar to your cataloger and I hope you will be charitable in your judgment of the descriptions and lack of knowledgeable estimates in some cases. Our feeling is that the material pretty much sells it's self and that our field is collector driven by very knowledgeable and astute individuals. Properly presented every lot should find it's own level of acceptance and value. The road map cover was inspired by Austin Sheheen's great headline announcing the first Memphis show in 1977. STOCKS AND BONDS

- 1 100, 500, and 5000 peso Mexican 6% Bonds, dated 1844-46. This set of three bonds are evidence of a loan raised by Antonio Lopez de Santa Ana, the provisional president of Mexico, to be repaid from a 25% surcharge on customs revenues. Lovely blue with elaborate scroll-work backs. Imprinta de J. M. Lara. This lot and the two that follow were issued and redeemed about fifty years before Mexico had a stock exchange. Few Mexicans at that time either knew or cared about government finance. VF. These are new to the United States market and should realize \$200 to \$300.
- 2 $\,$ 1000 and 10,000 peso Mexican 6% Bonds, dated 1843. This earlier set of two are also in spanish, printed by J. M. Lara in pastel brown, with separate interest coupons. The signatures and penned notations are in brown ink and are quite handsome. VF. Est: \$150 \$250.
- 3 Mexico Convention Espanola 3% Bonds 200 and 20,000 pesos. Charter Dated 1854 and 1855. Ornate frame and borders and printed with pastel apricot background. These were thirty year bonds and were redeemed in 1885. Interest coupons are included. Also included with this lot is a 10% 1859 100 peso bond with all coupons issued by the Secretaria de Estado Del Despacho de Hacienda. Violet tinted onionskin paper, printed by Lara. Measures 8 1/2 by 12 1/2. XF. Worth?
- 4 100 peso Mexican Bond, forced Spanish loan of 1815 to suppress the revolution. Four pages in two sheets with numerous royal stamps. Unpaid, since Spain lost the war and Mexico gained independence in 1823. The text explains that it was necessary to bring troops from the peninsula (Spain) and funds were required for their maintenance. This bond is VF and possibly unique and is the earliest such seen from Mexico. A significant historic document worthy of a liberal bid in the \$500.00 plus range.
- 5 United States of Mexico, Deposit receipt for \$243.00 4818 dated Feb 11, 1924. Green American Bank note Certificate with amount embossed by an F & E bond protector. This agreement is for coupons or rights to interest in arrears, (Class 'A'). The text is in very small print and is repeated in spanish on the back. XF. Looks like a potentially significant historic item, worth?
- 6 Panama Canal, Share for 500 Francs dated 1880 and with the facsimile signature of Ferd. de Lesseps, who after completing the Suez canal undertook the vast Panama project, later taken over by the United States. Printed in french in blue ink with twelve coupons and stamps attached. Interesting vignettes with list of countries affected. AU. (\$80.00+)
- 7 Tehuantepec National Railway, Set of three 5% Bonds in denominations of 20, 100 and 500 pounds sterling. Printed in spanish, german and english. Lovely purple borders with pastel background, printed in Leipzig or Berlin. The Tehuantepec peninsula was considered competitive with Panama and Nicaragua for a canal and even after the Panama canal was build enterprising individuals thought they could compete by train. This 1905 issue was the second attempt of this nature. Only 500 of the 500 pound denomination was issued. Coupons and warrants attached. VF and quite rare, probably worth \$175.00+
- 8 Canal of Corinth, Greece 500 Francs 6% bond dated 1888. Map and elevations in diagram Printed in french in green ink, with coupons. VF. (\$80.00+)
- 9 Spanish Coal Mine coupon bond, dated 1904 with super vignettes of miners. Issued by the Companiadelas Hulleras de Ujo-Mieres. Light green with 30 coupons intact. Measures sixteen inches square. XF. (\$80.00+)

- 10 \$1000.00 Penn Anthracite Coal Company, First Mortgage. Twenty year Gold Bond, with 39 \$25.00 interest coupons payable in gold coin. Issued in 1889 and numbered 278. Lovely Green and gold, with coal mine vignette. As New.
- 11 Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railway Company. One share of capital stock dated March 1st, 1909 in the name of A. J. Erling. Incorporated under the laws of the state of Washington and with a handsome vignette of George Washington. Par value \$100.00. Most of these certificates were owned by other railroads and only a few were held by individuals. VF. Worth?
- 12 The Cherryvale, Oklahoma and Texas Railway Company. 5% First Mortgage Gold Bonds. Set of two, \$20.00 and \$100.00. Printed and issued in Europe, and rare thus. Vivid green borders and coupons, with eagle and locomotive vignettes. These are cut with wavy borders for security purposes. The counterpiece remained with the issuing house and made tracing and verification simpler. United States Railway bonds that were not issued in the U S are rare and desirable. XF.
- 13 General Motors Corp Nine different stock certificates, recent but rare. These certificates are in eight different colors with various designs and were issued from 1950 to 1983 with the signatures of several different presidents of the corporation. Punch canceled and VF. These are new to the collector market and will likely realize \$100.00 or more.
- 14 \$500.00 Second Mortgage income bond of The New York, Pittsburg and Chicago Construction Company, dated January 7th, 1882. Only a few of these were issued when they ran out of funds. This particular bond, #189, was issued in error and was replaced by #190. A handsome locomotive and depot vignette and scrollwork border enhance this rare certificate. VF. Worth?
- 15 100 shares of The Fuel Oil Motors Corporation, New York. Dated January 20th, 1932. Three colorful stock transfer stamps are attached to this green bordered certificate. This company manufactured diesel engines for trucks etc. XF. Par value: \$10.00 now worth?

Additional Stock certificates, bonds and related material will be found throughout the catalog notably in Arizona, Illinois, Louisiana, Maine, Mississippi, Montana, and Pennsylvania.



STATE SEALS

The first lot in many of the states that follow will be a printed form, or letterhead with the impression of the official state seal usually embossed on a gold foil wafer. Most of these seals were collected in the 1880's by Governor William Larrabee of Iowa (1886-1890). They are similar to a collection assembled by General Spinner's daughter, later owned by Dr. Limpert. There are also a few modern seals collected during the 1930s in some of the states. We list these interesting items mostly without estimates. We can say, however, that they are of equal rarity to the other material in this catalog and they offer a great opportunity for specialists to acquire a centerpiece for their collection.

SOCIETY OF PAPER MONEY COLLECTORS

HISTORY - At the 1960 A.N.A. Convention in Boston, a small group of paper money collectors met informally and agreed that a regular organization would be desirable. During the next year, an organization was formed comprising collectors of tokens, medals and obsolete paper money. At the 1961 Atlanta A.N.A. Convention, it was decided to withdraw the tokens and medals group and organize separately into the Society of Paper Money Collectors. In June 1964, the Society was incorporated as a non-profit organization under the laws of the District of Columbia.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Encourage the collecting and study of paper money.
- 2. Cultivate fraternal collector relations with the opportunities for discussion, trading, etc.
- 3. Furnish information and knowledge through experts in various fields, particularly through the Society's Paper Money Magazine.
- 4. Encourage research about paper money and publication of the resultant findings.
- 5. Promote legislation favorable to collectors, providing it is in accord with the general welfare.
- 6. Advance the prestige of the hobby of numismatics.
- 7. Promote rational and consistant classification of exhibits, and encourage participation in them.
- 8. Encourage more realistic and consistant market valuations.

MAGAZINE - The bimonthly magazine, PAPER MONEY, issued in the odd months, is sent to all members. No copies are available as samples. In addition to informative articles, it lists new members, the collecting specialty of each, and information as to whether he is a collector or dealer. All members are encouraged to submit articles to the editor for publication.

BOOKS - The Society has published books on the obsolete currency of various states. Some of these books are still available to members at reduced prices.

ANNUAL MEETING - The Society is affiliated with the American Numismatic Association and conducts a regional meeting at the annual convention.

JUNIOR MEMBERS - Applicants must be from 12 to 18 years of age and of good moral character. Their application must be signed by a parent or guardian. They will be assigned a membership number in the same sequence as Regular Members, but it will be preceded by the letter "J". This letter will be removed upon notification to the secretary that the member has reached 18 years of age. Junior members are not eligible to vote or to hold office. Anyone interested in supporting the objectives of the Society is eligible for membership. Applicants should be sponsored by an SPMC member, or the secretary will sponsor persons, if they provide suitable references such as, well known numismatic firms with whom they have done business, bank references, etc. Museums, libraries, and banks are also invited to join the Society.

DUES - The Society dues are on a calendar year basis and are \$25 per year payable in U.S. funds. Members who join the Society prior to October 1st receive the magazines already issued in the year in which they join. Members who join after October 1st will have their dues paid through December of the following year. They will also receive, as a bonus, a copy of the magazine issued in November of the year in which they join.

by John Hickman



The Memphis auction this year was more selective than ever before with better and rarely obtainable notes bringing record prices. More available material faced a great deal of resistance in holding it's own. Notes from states with a wide collector base were eagerly bid up to new levels while others, notably Georgia and North Carolina, produced generally disappointing results.

A very strong book kept the auction moving with bids on over 85 % of the lots. Few complained about the mixing of the obsolete and other local items with the nationals and there were even a few favorable comments on the layout of the catalog. Everything sold, with the exception of a couple of lots that were withdrawn because of being misdescribed, and a single small size hundred dollar national. Areas showing new strength were Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi, Colorado, Indiana, Louisiana, Montana, and North Dakota. Obsolete notes held up in almost all areas. Confederate notes did well as did the star notes and most of the better types. The Demand note, Lot 1088 realized \$2100.00 in spite of a missing corner tip and elicited several gasps when it opened at \$1837.50 with a great deal of underlying support. Numerous notes would have fared better if an aggressive underbidder had materialized. As in any legitimate auction, some of the prices were unbelievably high, while others were quite low and will be recognized as great bargains in the years to come.

Our Cherry Hill sale is shaping up nicely with consignments of several uncut sheets, numerous obsolete notes and a nice group of better nationals from the area around Philadelphia. Dr. Aspen's Collection of small size silver certificates will be similar in extent to his legal tender notes in the Memphis sale. Very little space remains but we can always squeeze in an exciting item. Act fast as we must close in July in order to get the catalog out in August.

Our next floor sale after Cherry Hill will feature a major collection and will be held at a location that is as yet undecided. The Memphis rotation precludes our participation before 1995. We may have a sealed bid auction next year.
