The 2024 National Conference was held July 23 – 25 in Wilmington, Ohio and included 22 speakers that operate on the cutting edge of canine detection research, training, breeding and handling. We looked at the crucial role of working dogs in protecting public safety; current trends and context; and explored opportunities for breeders, researchers, industry leaders, and trainers to work together to address the shortage of U.S. bred detection canines and to improve future operations. 2024 AKC National Detection Dog Conference

Explosives detection dogs play a crucial role in U.S. safety and security at home and abroad, but unlike other vital national security tools, the United States is importing approximately 85-90% of its bomb dogs. This deficit leaves the U.S. captive to other countries for a key national security input, and begs the question, "Why aren't we relying on U.S. breeders?"

To continue addressing this question, working dog industry leaders, trainers, government representatives and AKC staff and breeders gathered in Wilmington, Ohio on July 23-25 for the 2024 AKC National Detection Dog Conference. This year's conference featured a balance of presentations from academic research and canine industry leaders that provided something for everyone in attendance.

Meet the Beagle Brigade, USDA's Detector Dogs

Those adorable <u>Beagles</u> you see at major airports throughout the United States aren't there to provide cuddles or comfort. They're part of the Beagle Brigade, a team of hard-working dogs employed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to sniff out plants and animals that have the potential to carry harmful diseases onto U.S. soil. Did You Know?

U.S. Congress – <u>HR 8467</u>, The House version of the Farm, Food and National Security Act of 2024, also known as the "Farm Bill", provides the quinquennial (once every 5 years) reauthorization for USDA funding. This massive, must-pass legislation commonly serves as a vehicle for a variety of animal and breeder related bills. This measure was approved in markup on May 23, and contained a number of programs/measures AKC has been advocating for, including import requirements from the Healthy Dog Importation Act, statutory funding for the National Detector Dog Training Center, funding for domestic violence shelters that allow victims to shelter with their pets, and more. AKC is also pleased that this version, as approved by the H. Agriculture Committee, did not contain problematic legislation opposed by AKC. The bill now goes to the House floor for consideration.

HR 1480/S 759, known as the Beagle Brigade Act, provides statutory authority for the National Detector Dog Training Center operated by USDA APHIS. The center trains dogs to inspect passenger baggage, cargo, mailed packages, and vehicles to detect foreign pests and diseases that threaten domestic agriculture and natural resources. HR 1480 passed the House in 2023; and language to advance the measure was included in the House version of the 2024 Farm Bill, HR 8467. The Senate companion measure is awaiting committee action. AKC strongly supports this goal.
