





Medical Requirements for Green Detector Dogs: What you Need to Know

There are questions that every breeder and every trainer ask before having their first dogs evaluated for working dog contracts. "What do the tests look like?" "Which toys should I make sure the dog is good with?" And one of the biggest is related to medical testing: "What medical testing has to be done and when does it need to be completed?" As breeders, we know that OFA requires dogs to be 24 months of age before they will certify the results for hips and elbows, but many of the pups being tested are under 24 months of age. So, what do we do, and when should we do it? Let's break these requirements down through different periods of the cycle of a green detection dog so you can make informed decisions on the timing of health testing.


Law Enforcement K9s: The Crucial Value of **Proper Training and Certification**

Police K9s deflect danger, protect their human partners, and detect scent in a way that is unmatched by any other law enforcement tool.

Mr. Slavik pointed out that, "Police K9s are the best mobile detection tool law enforcement can utilize. As we have learned in the past with many of our subject matter experts, 'quality education' for the handler is of the upmost importance." He emphasized the importance of experience and practice for K9 teams and noted that the demeanor of a handler and their ability to work as a team with their K9 directly impacts the dog's ability to learn and react in the field.

AKC DDTF Webinar Series - Working Dog Veterinary Care, What Makes it Different?


You are invited to join the AKC Detection Dog Task Force for our next webinar on Thursday, June 22, 2023, at 7:30 PM (ET).

Before long, the couple had a breeding program and a kennel devoted to producing Labrador Retrievers who excelled in the field. Despite their success, she felt something was missing.



answer is that you can, but it all too often leads to problems. Most people that want to throw for a reward will quickly add many rules to otherwise fun and easy play. The dog must heel or sit and wait for the throw, and then immediately return to the handler with the object and release the thing they just worked so hard for. These rules are created often for the ease and convenience of the handler/trainer and not to increase the dog's motivation. Play for young children and young dogs are defined by the lack of rules. Rules create a conflict between the dog's desire (the reward object) and the handler's desire (successful performance). For a detection dog the goal is to be obsessed with possession of the object-control can only be introduced when absolute motivation and arousal for the reward object have been achieved.

Many people ask, why can't I just throw the ball and create play? The
