For more than 135 years, the American Kennel Club® (AKC) has been America's leading authority on all things dog and the premier resource for dog lovers.

The AKC is a not-for-profit, non-partisan club of clubs and breed registry dedicated to promoting responsible dog ownership, preserving purebred dogs, advancing the health and well-being of all dogs, and advocating for science-based canine policy that is reasonable, enforceable, and non-discriminatory.

Together with more than 5,000 AKC dog clubs and AKC-affiliated charitable organizations, we embrace community, canine health, responsible dog ownership, and safety. We share our passion for dogs and we bring significant positive impact to every state. We are passionate about everything related to dogs, and we celebrate the joy they bring to our lives every single day.

Members of local and breed-based dog clubs are active in their communities. AKC clubs sponsor some 22,000 family-friendly educational and competitive events that bring financial and expert resources to their community each year. Clubs offer training classes, provide expertise on canine issues, and engage in their communities. They support local police K-9s, educational programs for school children, rescue, disaster relief, and vaccination and microchip clinics.

AKC's affiliated charities are equally impressive:

- The AKC Canine Health Foundation is the world's largest funder of canine health research (\$67.5 million); focusing on all aspects of the physical, mental, and social well-being of dogs.
- AKC Reunite has reunited more than 650,000 lost dogs with their owners, donated hundreds of microchip scanners to shelters, and donated more than 90 disaster relief trailers to set up temporary shelters for communities impacted by natural disasters. The AKC Reunite Adopt a K-9 Cop Matching Grant program has awarded 464 grants to date.
- In the last year alone, more than 100 detection and law enforcement K-9s have been donated to communities needing them.
- AKC Humane Fund supports breed rescue and provides grants to house victims of domestic abuse with their pets.

Local Spending Per Participants

Surveys demonstrate that exhibitors at AKC conformation dog shows spend an average of \$982 per show weekend. This means spending by AKC dog show exhibitors for a show weekend could inject more than \$2.15 million* into the local economy. Most participants travel more than 100 miles to get to AKC events and spend at least two to three nights in the community.

The AKC sanctions more than **22,000 events across the country every year**, including dog shows, agility and obedience trials, performance events, and much more.



SUPPORTING CANINE HEALTH RESEARCH

The AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) has invested over \$75K in canine health research at Alaska institutions state—wide through the support of 2 research grants to benefit dogs at the University of Alaska, Fairbanks. This research has focused on endocrinology research in hypothyroid disease and musculoskeletal conditions and disease. There is currently 1 active grant to support the development and validation of a new body condition scoring system for use in canine athletes. CHF prioritizes a One Health and comparative medicine research approach to diagnose and treat health conditions that affect both ends of the leash while advancing canine health for all dogs.

SUPPORTING CANINE HEALTH RESEARCH

The AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) has invested over \$575K in canine health research at Alabama institutions state—wide through the support of 20 projects, research grants, and educational studies to benefit dogs. This research has spanned topics related to blood disorders, immunology and infectious disease, neurology, lung and respiratory disease, reproductive conditions and disease and oncology including mast cell tumors, oral malignant melanoma, hemangiosarcoma, lymphoma, and osteosarcoma at Auburn University and Society of Theriogenology. CHF has supported two post–graduate training programs addressing canine reproduction through the AKC/AKCCHF/TF Theriogenology Residency program. CHF prioritizes a One Health and comparative medicine research approach to diagnose and treat health conditions that affect both ends of the leash while advancing canine health for all dogs.



The AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) has invested over \$3.8M in canine health research at California institutions state-wide through the support of 105 projects, research grants, and educational studies to benefit dogs at the Advanced Veterinary Care Center, Canine Companions for Independence, San Francisco Scottish Terrier Club, Scout's House, Inc., University of California, Berkley, University of California, Davis, University of California, Los Angeles, University of California, San Francisco, University of Southern California, Veterinary Cancer Society, Veterinary Specialty Hospital of San Diego, Western University of Health Sciences, and Xalud Therapeutics, Inc. This research has spanned topics related to general canine health, behavior, blood disorders, cardiology, endocrinology, epilepsy, gastrointestinal disease, kidney and urological disease, lung and respiratory disease, musculoskeletal conditions and disease, neurology, oncology including lymphoma and osteosarcoma, ophthalmology, reproductive conditions and disease, tickborne disease and immunology and infectious disease. There are currently 5 active grants which comprise of projects such as the genetics of eye disease and canine idiopathic epilepsy. CHF prioritizes a One Health and comparative medicine research approach to diagnose and treat health conditions that affect both ends of the leash while advancing canine health for all dogs.



SUPPORTING CANINE HEALTH RESEARCH

The AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) has invested nearly \$2.5M in canine health research at Colorado institutions state—wide through the support of 38 projects, research grants, and educational studies to benefit dogs at AMC Cancer Research Center, ApopLogic Pharmaceuticals, LLC, Colorado State University, Sirius Medicine, LLC, and the University of Colorado. This research has spanned topics related to general canine health as well as specific projects focusing on cardiology, epilepsy, hepatic disease, kidney and urological disease, musculoskeletal conditions and disease, oncology including hemangiosarcoma, lymphoma and osteosarcoma and reproductive conditions and disease. There are currently 9 active grants which comprise projects focusing on osteoarthritis, immune—mediated chronic hepatitis, copper toxicosis, endometritis, a clinical trial for canine mast cell tumors and genome sequencing of canine lymphoma. CHF prioritizes a One Health and comparative medicine research approach to diagnose and treat health conditions that affect both ends of the leash while advancing canine health for all dogs.



SUPPORTING CANINE HEALTH RESEARCH

The AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) has invested over \$1.66M in canine health research at Florida institutions state—wide through the support of 46 projects, research grants, and educational studies to benefit dogs Florida State University, the University of Florida, and Florida Atlantic University. This research has spanned topics related to general canine health and behavior as well as specific projects focusing on cardiology, dermatology and allergic disease, endocrinology, epilepsy, gastrointestinal disease, kidney and urological disease, musculoskeletal conditions and disease, oncology including hemangiosarcoma and osteosarcoma, ophthalmology, reproductive conditions and disease, tick—borne disease, and immunology and infectious disease. There are currently 15 active grants which include clinical trials for canine hemangiosarcoma and atopic dermatitis, the development of anesthesia protocols to treat chronic painful conditions, potential new treatments for diabetic dogs, dogs with chronic kidney disease, and canine congestive heart failure. Additionally, CHF awarded two clinician—scientist fellowships and a residency through the AKC/AKCCHF/TF Theriogenology Residency program at the University of Florida to support research studies this year. CHF prioritizes a One Health and comparative medicine research approach to diagnose and treat health conditions that affect both ends of the leash while advancing canine health for all dogs.
