Jacobs has been USBF president for about two months. He said he asked to address the board and answer questions because of concerns about relations between the two organizations since the USBF was created in 2001.

The businessman - Jacobs is head of one of the largest limousine companies in the U.S. - said he plans to keep the ACBL board posted on all USBF activities. "I told them I will give them a financial statement every time I get one," Jacobs said.

Jacobs also outlined the responsibilities and composition of the 15 committees of the USBF and discussed plans for conducting team trials to select U.S. representatives to world championships.
"One board member came up to me after the meeting," Jacobs said, "and told me I had torn down

Bidding the same values twice After declarer went down three in a vulnerable and doubled 3a contract, dummy apologized for putting his partner in the bad contract. "Sorry, he said. "I tried to bid according to the law of total tricks. " Declarer maintained a sense of humor about it, commenting, "That was not the law of total tricks. It was the law of no tricks.


Bridge is a partnership game, but many learners seem to lack understanding of all that this statement means. Yes, you need someone to sit on the other side of the table and bid with you and turn the dummy when you are declarer.

Some seem to forget that partner is also listening to, and presumably grasping, the implications of the bidding.

Say both sides are vulnerable and you hold
-Q 84 Q Q 1054 KJ65 65
Your left-hand opponent opens $1 \boldsymbol{*}$, your partner bids 1a, RHO makes a negative double and you give partner a raise to $2 \boldsymbol{A}$. Opener passes, as does partner, and RHO doubles for takeout. You pass and opener bids $3 \&$, which is passed around to you.

Now what?
If you even thought about bidding 3a, give yourself a demerit. You told your story with your raise to $2 \boldsymbol{A}$. Your partner heard you and, with two more chances to bid again, pulled out the pass card both times. Partner knows you might have a hand this good, and he still chose to pass.

There is nothing about your hand that was not covered by your raise to $2 \boldsymbol{A}$. You don't have extra shape, no fourth trump, no great side suit. If you bid again with that hand, you are telling the same story.

Mike Lawrence once told a great story about playing with another world-class player. Mike heard his partner open a weak $2 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, which was doubled for takeout by the next player. Mike decided to set a clever trap. Holding a decent hand with a singleton heart and four cards in each of the other suits, Mike leaped to $4 \boldsymbol{\vee}$. He hoped his left-hand opponent would think Mike was trying to "steal" from him with his preemptive action. Mike's plan, of course, was to double whatever they bid.

Sure enough, LHO bid 4a, and Mike was licking his chops. He was relying on the time-honored principle that a player who has narrowly described his hand, especially with a preemptive bid, will not voluntarily take another bid.

As you might have guessed, Mike never got to double 4a because his expert partner did the unthinkable - he bid $5 \uparrow$ ! Of course, that was doubled, so Mike and his partner not the opponents - wrote down the big minus.

This is an extreme case, of course. Most players, even newer ones, know that they should not bid again on their own after opening with a weak bid.

There are, however, many examples of players who open with minimum hands and can't restrain themselves when the opponents interfere, jumping right in at the next chance to bid as though holding

extra values.
Make an effort to remind yourself that you have a partner sitting over there with the brains to get the picture when you pass - that, too, conveys a message - and who can act if it's appropriate opposite your known minimum opener.

Of course, if you routinely bid like crazy without the "goods," partner won't know when you actually do have a hand with extras. Be a good partner - bid only when you have something to say.

## Opening lead: $\downarrow$ A.

Bidding commentary: As South, add an extra point for your five-card major facing a takeout double. Your hand is now worth at least 9 points, enough to make a jump response to a takeout double (9-11). As North, don't talk yourself into counting anything for $\vee$ U J. Even so, you have 17 support points, enough to bid game directly.

Defensive commentary: As West, begin with the $\boldsymbol{A}$ and $\vee \mathrm{K}$.

Defensive commentary \#2: As East, ruff partner's $\Psi K$ at trick two and lead a club! No, you haven't gone mad. You do see those diamonds in dummy, don't you? It is vital to take club tricks before they go off on diamonds.

Basically, you have to hope partner has the * A Q. This is your last chance to do something meaningful, so don't blow it! Switch to a club at trick three before the mice can get at partner's club tricks.

When the dummy has an imposing side suit
with a strong trump fit, it is usually right for the defense to play an attacking game. This may mean ruffing partner's trick with a worthless trump to lead a suit through declarer that partner cannot lead safely. Do it!

Third hand should make the following opening lead inferences: When dummy tables and the A-K of any side suit is not visible, third hand assumes that partner does not have both honors. The same inference, to a lesser extent, is available when the K-Q of a side suit is not visible.

## Frying pan to . . . safety!

Gary Cohler is good at getting into fixes Fortunately for him, he's also good at getting out of them. This deal from the Lebhar IMP Pairs shows him in action. Cohler was East.

South started with a low spade, taken by Cohler in hand with the ace. He played a diamond to the ace, ruffed a diamond high and played a spade to dummy's 10, South discarding. When Cohler ruffed a third diamond, South followed with the queen.

Reading the situation accurately, Cohler played a club to dummy's ace and ruffed a third diamond, establishing dummy's jack. This was the end position:


Cohler pulled the last trump, South discarding a club, then played a heart from hand. South inserted the 9 and the king held in dummy. On the play of the $\star$ J, South was squeezed. If he pitched a club, Cohler could play a club to the king and take the jack as his 12th trick. In practice, South pitched the $\mathbf{P}$ Q and was thrown into lead into the club tenace at the end.

To defeat the contract in the end position, South must play the Q when Cohler leads one from hand, and when Cohler wins the $\upharpoonright \mathrm{K}$ and cashes the $\downarrow \mathrm{J}$, South must let go of his A. North can then get in with the $\mathbf{\top}$ and push a club through to defeat the slam.

The winning plays, as you might suspect, are courtesy of Deep Finesse, which notes that the killing opening lead is one of three hearts in the South hand the queen, 3 or 2 . Only DF or someone looking at all the cards could find such a lead. After the spade lead, there are a couple of ways to make the slam, including the line chosen by Cohler.

After a club lead, declarer might put East under pressure by running spades and diamonds, but East can pitch down to a bare club honor and score a heart trick at the end.

In the other room, Glenn Milgrim and I did something different.

The 4-3 diamond fit looks a lot better than it actually is. On a spade lead, 13 tricks are easy. On a club lead, I think the best line is to win and cash the three top hearts, then ruff the fourth heart high and try to draw trumps. If the $\$ 10$ doesn't fall, take the spade finesse to try to pitch dummy's club.

But if you spot a better line (perhaps just take the spade finesse?), let me know.

Not to be outdone, Sandy Trent was on lead a few deals later. I'll show you what happened at our table first:


All Pass
On a spade lead, there are many lines available. Rightly or wrongly, I drew two rounds of trumps with the ace and queen then played on clubs. That worked fine - but here is the full deal:

Note that both Wests opened the 12-point hand with a weak two-bid.

Sandy Trent as East looked at her absence of minor-suit tricks and decided it was time for desperate measures. She led the $\mathbf{V K}$ ! Paul overtook to cash the $\mathbf{V}$ and play a third heart. Can you blame North for ruffing high and finessing against East for the $\leqslant$ ? Down one.

## New Electronic Device Policy



The electronic device policy at NABCs has been revised to allow players to bring electronic devices such as cell phones into the playing area provided that such devices are turned off.

Further, any such equipment must not be visible during the session

The policy applies to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, kibitzers and play recorders, except those designated by the ACBL and are in force throughout any actual playing session or segment of play.

A violation of the policy will result in an automatic disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense will result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team. Kibitzers violating this policy will be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

We all know that these guys can't defend a lick, but in their defense they didn't let 3NT through, they made 3 NT as East-West.

At trick two, North shifted to the 10 , not best but surely not absurd. Pollack followed smartly with the 8 . To "clarify" the position, South overtook with the J and continued with the queen!

Pollack won, cashed the $\mathbf{V}$ and crossed to his "sure entry" of the 7 and ran the diamonds.

Easy game, bridge.

back," said Sullivan. "Finally, he gave me my own job." With one act, Johnston responded to both Sullivan's knowledge gap and NABC guests' need to know.
"He walked me to the front door of the Renaissance Hotel and handed me a Daily Bulletin and a sign that read 'Ask Me."

Johnston was an "Ask Me Boy" at the Atlanta NABC in 2005, and he knew that responding to players' many and diverse (and sometimes absurd) questions on the spot was the best possible way for Sullivan to learn. "I still maintain that was the best training program."

## New slow play regulations

A. Slow Play Regulations

Slow play, especially habitual slow play, is a violation of law and subject to penalty. Law 81 C 1 instructs the director of his duty to ensure that slow play does not disrupt the game. Law 90A and Law 90B2 specifically provide for procedural penalties to be given in cases of undue slow play, and Law 91A empowers the director at his discretion to make such penalties disciplinary and therefore not subject to being overruled by an appeal committee (same as with Zero Tolerance penalties). Further, Law 12C2 permits the director to award an artificial adjusted score when slow play prevents a board from being played.

The preceding paragraph applies to all events. The following paragraph addresses pairs-type movements specifically but applies conceptually to all events.

When a pair has fallen behind it is incumbent on them to make up the time lost as quickly as possible whether at fault or not. All players are expected to make a concerted effort to catch up when they have fallen behind, regardless of the reason for their lateness. In the absence of compelling evidence to the contrary, the director should presume that a pair finishing a round late by more than two or three minutes on more than one occasion during a session is responsible for the lateness. There is a strong expectation that the director will penalize such a pair. The size of a penalty will tend to increase for subsequent instances of slow play and for chronic or egregious slow play. While warnings typically will be given before a penalty is assessed, failure to do so in no way limits the director's authority to issue a penalty.

An appeal of an action taken by a TD with regard to time may be taken to the Director in Charge of the ournament, and no further

This regulation is not intended to override specific event conditions regarding slow play.

## B. Slow Play Appendices for

NABC+ KO Events
Appendix E (VS) and Appendix E (S\&W) are replaced with the following:

The tournament director is charged with the responsibility to ensure that each KO match segment finishes within the allotted time. While a time monitor may be employed, the lack of a monitor in no way limits the TD's authority to apply one or more of the remedies listed below. Discretion is expected, in that the TD may choose to ignore an occasional minor late finish.

Players are expected to be aware, in a general sense, of time used and remaining in a segment in which they are playing regardless of whether a clock is in use or a time announcement has been made. An excuse of "no announcement" or "no clock immediately visible" will not be considered persuasive.

The TD may remove one or more boards from a segment. According to Laws 12 and 86 the TD may award no score (when neither team is more at fault than the other), an assigned score (when a result already exists at one table which the TD wishes to preserve) or an artificial score in IMPs. Every effort should be made to remove boards before they can be played at either table, but not having done so does not preclude removing one or more later.

In consultation with the Director in Charge of the tournament, the TD may require that a particular pair not play in a specified segment, not play against a specified pair or not play together as a pair. The foregoing is expected to be applied only due to egregious circumstances or to unduly repetitious offenders.

The foregoing is intended to make clear the intent that the TD is expected and empowered to take action as deemed necessary to ensure the timely finish of KO segments (and matches).

An appeal of an action taken by a TD with regard to time may be taken to the Director in Charge of the tournament, and no further.

West led the A and another heart to the king. East shifted to a spade won by Avery. He now played five rounds of diamonds, pitching a club from dummy to reach this position with East to discard:


If East discards a spade, Avery can lead a club to the board and ruff a spade, setting up the $\mathbf{7}$. If, instead, East discards a club, declarer can play the \& A K establishing the low ones in the closed hand with a trump left as an entry.

Making $5 \$$ doubled scored 23 on a 25 top and helped the pair qualify for Saturday's final. Deep Finesse says that if East shifted to a club at trick three, the contract could be set. Declarer doesn't have the entries to set up the fourth spade and return to cash it.

Notrump plays only for 11 tricks, though slam is not without play. Pamela Granovetter (an apostle of sound bidding) found a way to avoid trouble; she passed the North hand! Partner Dick Katz found a way to get back in trouble. (Reader, add your own parenthesis here about bidding styles.) He opened the South hand $1 \vee$ and the auction proceeded:

Katz had gotten himself into an awkward spot, but the advantage of playing hearts as opposed to notrump was that a black loser could be ruffed in dummy. How should 6 be played on the lead? Declarer wins in hand and plays the $A$ and ruffs a diamond. East pitches a club, and now declarer needs to commit himself to the Q being with East (clearly, the odds favor this given the diamond break).

He leads a club to the queen, a low heart to the 10 , cashes the K , pitching a spade from dummy. Next comes the $\mathrm{A} K$ and a spade ruff with dummy's $\checkmark$ A. Now he ruffs another diamond to hand with the -8, and in the three-card ending, he exits with his losing spade. With the $\mathbf{V} \mathrm{J}$ left, he can claim the last two tricks. This line requires nothing more than the

Q Q onside.
At the table I was watching, I saw Giorgio Duboin and Roy Welland defending $4 \boldsymbol{\varphi}$ on the
 680 was going to be a very poor score for them, but Duboin led the $\vee 7$. Declarer made the mistake of going up with the A. (There are positions where you want to retain high trumps in hand, but this is not one of them.)

Declarer ruffed a diamond to hand and cashed the top clubs and spades, but when he led a third spade Duboin ruffed in front of dummy's $\mathbf{~} 4$ with the $\mathbf{~} 6$, and now declarer could only get 11 tricks, and that was an average result.

## ST. LOUIS SPOTLIGHT ON ROGER LORD, GRAND LIFE MASTER

No one is a more respected veteran and scholar of the game in St. Louis Bridge than Roger Lord.

Lord started playing rubber bridge in 1962, and it was love at first sight. As he describes it, "Once I was hooked, it would have been insufficient to say that I spent every free waking moment playing, discussing,

Lord had many mentors along the way including Pat Ochs, a tough-playing club proprietor, and two members of the winning 1962 Cinderella Vanderbilt team-world-class table tennis player and bridge player, Garrett Nash, and renowned bridge instructor, Jerry Levitt. Lord and Levitt went on to share their vast knowledge of the game in a daily bridge column featured in the St. Louis Globe Democrat and the Kansas City Star.

Over the years, Lord has supported St. Louis bridge players in so many ways. He has helped many new players get started and has been a willing resource for countless tough bridge questions. Most
important, he achieved his NABC title and three other close finishes all with native St. Louis players He chalked up a third-place finish in the 1972 Spingold and a second in the 1973 Grand National Teams playing with Levitt, Norbert Kremer and Ron Smith. He finished second in the 2004 Silodor Open Pairs with long-time partner, Jacqueline Sincoff. And, as the piece de resistance, Lord won his North American Championship at the 2003 NABC in Philadelphia, playing with St. Louis attorney Alan Popkin in the Silver Ribbon Pairs.

In January 2013, Lord had the ultimate satisfaction of surpassing 10,000 masterpoints to become a Grand Life Master on his own home turf at the St. Louis Winter Sectional. Unit 143 is very proud to claim Roger Lord as a favorite son!

The St Louis Bridge Center was founded as a not-for-profit organization dedicated to training and educating the bridge-playing community. To achieve this goal, the
Center offers formal training programs for students at all levels by an experienced group of teachers.

The Center also offers daily bridge games for players at all levels to continue to learn the game and master their skills. After each game, players have
