"Unorthodox" podcast host to honor his Hebrew College teachers at Hebrew College "fun" raiser

Mark Oppenheimer has been an "unofficial student" at Hebrew College for more than two decades.

He learned from Hebrew College President Rabbi Sharon Cohen Anisfeld in the mid-1990s as an undergraduate at Yale, where she was his Hillel rabbi. And when he got married 14 years later, he reconnected with Rabbi Anisfeld, then Dean of the <u>Rabbinical School of Hebrew College</u>, and asked her to marry him and his fiancée.

Later, as a religion columnist for the *New York Times* from 2010 to 2016, Oppenheimer learned from other Hebrew College faculty members -- reaching out to Rabbis Dan Judson, Or Rose, Ebn Leader, and others, whenever he had a question about Judaism for his biweekly "Beliefs" column.

Oppenheimer, a journalist, academic, storyteller, and host of Tablet Magazine's podcast "Unorthodox," will honor his Hebrew College teachers, as the emcee of <u>Hebrew College Live! Stories in Honor of Our Teachers</u>, Hebrew College's spring Moth radio-style storytelling fundraiser, at Temple Beth Elohim in Wellesley, MA on May 30. Join us in 3 weeks! One of the first things that I looked for when I arrived at Boston University was a religious community. I believed that finding such a group would serve as a great way to meet other students and ease the transition into university life. However, nothing could prepare me for the sheer number of groups that presented themselves as an option. Coming to college from a town where religious expression is mostly limited to cultural and familial obligations, seeing hundreds of my peers excited to talk about their beliefs was a bit of a culture shock. A meeting with a hometown priest during winter break caused me to realize that this was not the norm. Most people find themselves struggling to find and keep faith when immersed into a college environment, yet I had found an abundance.

As a Christian, I spent the first few weeks trying to find a group that I would enjoy. I eventually found my way to Marsh Chapel's Episcopal ministry, and I have been a part of the leadership ever since then. Through that, I became aware of the <u>Boston Interfaith Leadership Initiative</u> (BILI), as several BU students active at Marsh Chapel were fellows. I had heard the name in passing but did not know much about it until I was invited to apply this fall. ### What My Neighbor Needs

Parashat Kedoshim (Leviticus 19:1-20:27)

When you live in San Francisco some of your neighbors are likely to be Catholic. From the early Spanish missionaries and settlers to later Mexican and Central American immigrants, from Irish, Italian, Filipino, and Maltese immigrants to their descendants, San Francisco is a Catholic town. This might seem to contradict San Francisco's more widely known image first as a city of libertines and later as a center for gay movements and cultures, but the two realities have long lived side by side, and often mingled with each other. Sometimes this mingling has been tense, and occasionally tragic, as when Irish Catholic Supervisor Dan White assassinated Mayor George Moscone and gay Jewish Supervisor Harvey Milk in San Francisco City Hall in 1978. Often it has been quotidian. Sometimes it has been neighborly, and occasionally truly so.

One place where these two cultures - Catholic and LGBTQ - are particularly visible as neighbors is the corner of Dolores and 16<sup>th</sup>, between the historically Latino Mission District and the famously gay Castro District (itself previously the Irish neighborhood of Eureka Valley). On one corner stands Mission Dolores Basilica, a Spanish Baroque church located next to the original Spanish mission where colonial settlement of the Bay Area began in 1776. Right across the street is Congregation Sha'ar Zahav, the City's LGBTQ synagogue, one of the first in the world, founded nearby in 1977 and now located in this brightly-painted wooden two-story building. From the sanctuary in Sha'ar Zahav you can see the cupola of Mission Dolores through the windows just beneath the ceiling. It's a lovely, if seemingly incongruous, view.
