
Connecting Across Religious Lines

If you were asked to select one text from your religious tradition that can help people connect constructively across religious lines, what would it be?

In Words to Live By: Sacred Sources for Interreligious Engagement (Orbis Books, 2018) a group of distinguished scholars, educators, and activists from Muslim, Jewish, Christian, Hindu, Buddhist, Sikh, and Humanist traditions, provide their response to this pressing question.

Contributors to the anthology, co-edited by <u>Hebrew College Miller Center for Interreligious Learning & Leadership</u> Director Rabbi Or Rose with Rev. Soren Hessler and Dr. Homayra Ziad, explore sacred texts from their traditions that inspire their interreligious activities.

In reflecting on the aims of the anthology, Rabbi Rose commented, "We hope this diverse collection helps readers think carefully about their religious and interreligious commitments, and moves them to take thoughtful action to heal our beautiful, but fractured world."

You Shall Have Nothing But Joy Sukkot

Yom Kippur is the most ethereal of Jewish holidays. On the holiest day of the year, we symbolically shed the trappings of material existence. To my mind, the reason for fasting is not so much to afflict ourselves but to elevate ourselves above the earthly plane of reality. As much as humanly possible, we abstain from physical needs and urges. We don't eat; we don't bathe; we don't engage in sexual relations; if we could, we wouldn't sleep or go to the bathroom, either. On Yom Kippur, we yearn to leave our bodies behind and soar like the angels. It's the closest we ever come, this side of death, to merging with the Infinite and abiding in God's presence as pure souls.
