

How Will the Story End?
Parashat Vayigash (Genesis 44:18-47:27)

"Hinei mah tov u'ma na'im shevet achim gam yachad."

"Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers sit all together." — Psalm 133:1

I first learned these words and several musical renditions of this textual snippet as a child, long before I could even translate the psalmist's words into English. Years later, having learned the literal meaning of this verse, I



began to contemplate its meaning more deeply, knowing how difficult it can be to experience such unity within one's family, community, or beyond.

The words of psalmist rang in my ears as I read this week's Torah portion, Vayigash.

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
