Joining Rabbi Rose was Roman Catholic scholar Dr. Heather Miller Rubens (above, middle). Sessions included:

- Jewish Theology & Interreligious Engagement
- Interreligious Dilemmas: A Case Studies Approach
- Sustaining Our Efforts: Personal Practices for Renewed Interreligious Engagement

"Interreligious dialogue is a nuanced and complex endeavor. With Rabbi Or Rose's guidance, our community explored the challenges and opportunities in interfaith efforts. He presented Jewish theological underpinnings through classical Jewish texts and cofacilitated a case study with Dr. Rubens," said Sara Shalva, Chief Program Officer of Jewish Life and Learning at the Edlavitch DCJCC.

Participants were also led through a conversation about interreligious spiritual practice. According to Shalva, "They left with concepts and tools to continue to move forward on building relationships and continuing conversations with people of other faiths, and those without faith."

Self-care and Leading the Way to Freedom Parshat Yitro, Exodus 18:1-20:23

I closed the bathroom door behind me — as if the bathroom, with its full complement of dirty diapers and small piles of unwashed clothes, was some kind of haven from the rest of the house's chaos. I was on the verge of tears and wondering, as I know many new parents do, just what the hell I had gotten myself into. A silent wail rose in my mind, "How am I ever going to manage?!?"



And then a different inner voice piped up, a voice I hear only rarely, a voice whose origins I have given up on discerning. "You won't," said that other voice flatly, the one I have learned that it's dangerous for me to disregard. "You won't ever completely 'manage.' You are actually going to have to lead."

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
