Matthew's environmental practice includes serving as counsel to states pursuing natural resource damage claims under CERCLA, state statutes, and common law tort, such as nuisance, negligence, and trespass. He has particular experience with litigation involving pollution from industrial sites due to emerging contaminants, such as per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

Prior to joining Kelley Drye, Matthew served as a judicial intern for U.S. District Judge David Hittner, U.S. District Court, Southern District of Texas and The Honorable Julie Kocurek, 390th Judicial District Court in Austin, Texas.
