- Help you validate your idea with real users or customers
- Guide you through federal grant applications or local pitch competitions
- Connect you to experienced founders, advisors, and investors
- Offer accelerator programs or founder residencies
- Provide visibility and feedback from the community

- **Customer Validation Programs** (e.g., I-Corps, Launchpad): Focused on testing your idea in the market
- Accelerators (e.g., 434 Accelerator): Structured, time-bound programs to help you build and scale
- **Funding Sources** (e.g., CAV Angels, SBIR/STTR): From local angel groups to federal research dollars
- Entrepreneurship Support Organizations (e.g., CBIC, CIC, The Hub CVA): Great for networking, workshops, and pitch nights
- University Units (e.g., i.Lab, Batten, LVG): UVA-led programs and organizations
 offering capital, coaching, and community
