
Pastor's Article

Break your fasts and acts of penitence - Easter heralds a new day dawning - Alleluia!

Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen, Indeed! Henceforth, the first day of each week, Sundays, are seen as "little Easter" celebrations of the resurrection and life everlasting that Jesus Christ, by conquering death has given his followers. We worship and serve a risen savior who is in the world today sharing love and hope and life through the powerful presence of the Holy Spirit. Thanks be to God for the new life that is ours in Jesus Christ our living Lord! Friends, we are Easter People who know that death has lost its sting and has no lasting hold on us as Jesus disciples. Our message and mission for those living in doubt and despair in this world is one of Faith, Hope, Love and New Beginnings with GOD who is redeeming all things and helping us day to day to live and follow and serve Jesus Christ — who is Lord of heaven and earth!

For April, I want to introduce you to **Hymn Number 502** *We Who Once Were Lost* in our GLORY TO GOD HYMNAL. This 20th – century Dutch hymn could well be understood as an expansion of the imagery of death and life in Romans 6:1-11, interpreted from a eucharistic perspective. Such short lines and exact rhymes are a challenge to maintain; the art of this text is a measure of its conviction. The text of this hymn was written by Muus Jacobse in 1961 and set to a tune composed by Rik Veelenturf in 1960. Please take some time to meditate upon each line of this powerful communion hymn. We will share this hymn on Easter prior to celebrating the Lord's Supper in worship.

- 1. We who once were dead now live, fully knowing Jesus as our head. Life is overflowing when he breaks the bread.
- 2. We were lost in night, but you sought and found us. Give us strength to fight; death is all around us. Jesus, be our light.
- 3. He became our bread; Jesus died to save us. On him we are fed, eating what he gave us, rising from the dead.
- 4. Let us share the pain you endured in dying; we shall then remain living; death defying, we shall rise again.
- 5. Jesus, you were dead, but you rose and, living, made yourself our bread, in your goodness giving life though we were dead.
- 6. This is your design; in this meal we meet you. Be our bread and wine, Jesus, we entreat you. This shall be our sign.

BOOK OF CONFESSIONS

This month's confession is on the Confession of Belhar. This is the introduction to the Confession of Belhar from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Book of Confessions, page 300.

How should the church respond when sin disrupts the church's unity, creates division among the children of God, and constructs unjust systems that steal life from God's creation? Members and leaders of the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in South Africa faced these questions under apartheid, a system of laws that separated people by race from 1948-1994.

Apartheid formed a racially stratified society. Those with the lightest skin tones were offered the greatest protection and opportunity. Non "white" persons were separated into three categories; each skin tone step away from the "white" category represented a decrease in governmental protections and opportunities. Racial separation was established by law and enforced through violence. Non white citizens lived with constant and intrusive police presence and interference in the daily functions of life. Those who protested risked punishment, imprisonment and even death.

The roots of apartheid go back in the South African culture and church for several centuries. The Dutch Reformed Church embodied racial separation when it formed three "mission" churches in the late nineteenth century, each categorized by its racial identity. The Dutch Reformed Mission Church was formed for people designated as "coloured" (bi-racial). The church's complicity with racial separation kept Christians from worshipping and coming to the Lord's Table together. The white Dutch Reformed Church (DRC) created an elaborate biblical interpretation and ideology that supported racial separation and then the formal apartheid policies.

The Dutch Reformed Church's active participation and theological defense of apartheid moved the global church to name apartheid a *status confessionis*-a conviction that the Gospel was at stake and thus the faith needed to be proclaimed. Leaders of the Dutch Reformed Mission Church wrestled with this situation theologically and practically. One outcome of their struggles was the emergence of the Confession of Belhar in the early 1980s.

The Uniting Reformed Church of Southern Africa (URCSA), the church that succeeded the Dutch Reformed Mission Church after apartheid, has offered the Confession of Belhar to the global Reformed family as a gift, believing that the themes of unity, reconciliation, and justice issue a call from God to the whole church toward holy action, transformation, and life.

The Special Committee on the Confession of Belhar recommended that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) add Belhar as part of its Constitution because it believed the clarity of Belhar's witness to unity, reconciliation, and justice might help the PC (USA) speak and act with similar clarity at a time when it faces division, racism, and injustice.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) approved the Confession of Belhar as part of the *Book of Confessions* at the 222nd General Assembly (2016).

Why I love Celebration Presbyterian Preschool

My name is Nancy Resnick and I am a member of Celebration and an Elder and the mom of a five-year-old. A lot of you know me, some do not. I was asked to write a letter for our newsletter on my experience as a preschool mom so our congregation has an idea of what this program provides. I have two grown children in addition to Riley. I have had many experiences with daycares and preschools—three in this area alone, then Riley attended Celebration Presbyterian Preschool. In all my years I have never seen a more involved and caring program. You see the reason I have had experience with three is that I could not find one that was consistent with Riley's needs. I do not expect special treatment but as a mom I do expect to get great care when someone has my child. I do not like her to be treated like she is just a fee for a business. I wanted her to grow, interact, learn, share: all the things children need to be productive little individuals. Riley received all that here. I was diagnosed with breast cancer when Riley was just two. She was in a daycare/preschool setting. I could not go beyond the front doors because of my illness. They would take Riley from me with no regard. The look on her face was heartbreaking. I pulled her out of that program because I could not work any more and they did not seem to care either way. Then, I enrolled her in Celebration Preschool and she loved it from the moment she started. The teachers could not be more understanding. And when I could not drop her off or pick her up anymore because of my illness, they found parents who would help me. Our preschool goes beyond learning; it recognizes individuals. It works with each parent and rallies around each child. They understand that they may only have the child for just a few hours a week but that the time is important. They know each and every child's need's and that is not an easy feat. I have seen how they handle special needs and the death of a parent with such kindness and grace. Susan, the director, runs a tight ship in a very excellent way. She makes sure all teacher gets what they need so each child has his or her needs met. She also makes sure we are in compliance with safety. We all know that is not easy in today's world. You always see Susan in the hall interacting with the children. Our children know her and love her and that says a lot. The teachers are always smiling when you walk in. In three years I have never seen anything other than smiles. I am sure they have bad days, but they do not bring it with them or show it to the children. They give hugs to all the kids. In a world where we are always concerned if our actions are appropriate, they recognize the importance and appropriateness of hugging our children. It is healthy to interact because the children feel safe. While these are my opinions, our program is also highly regarded in our community. Go on any message board where parents are asking for guidance about preschool choices in our community and CPP is named three-to-one every time. If I was asked if I could come up with something negative about our program, I honestly could not. If you know me, you would know if I have an opinion good or bad, I give it. Out of all the preschools my children have been a part of, Celebration Presbyterian Preschool far exceeds them all. Riley is more than ready for kindergarten, not just in learning but in how to be a good student and friend also. Celebration Presbyterian Preschool provides so much more than education and outreach. It is molding children for their future in the most productive and positive ways. When they go out into the world they will know God loves them and will have learned about goodness and respect, all because our little preschool took the time to care.
