## PASTOR TOM'S ARTICLE

**First - A Note of Thanksgiving:** Here we go again starting a new cycle of the Christian Year with Advent... and here we go again as pastor and congregation, starting our seventh year of shared mission and ministry at Celebration! I Thank God for each of you and I consider myself blessed to be serving God with you. I look forward with hope and great expectations to the coming year and I can't wait to see what God has in store for us in 2018. As we go forward together, may God guide our loving, our living and our giving. May God inspire our growing generosity as we bring our lives – heart, mind, soul, strength, time, talent and money to join with Jesus in service to His Kingdom – and to God be the Glory!

Second - A bit of History on this season of Advent: "Advent" means "coming" or "arrival." During the season of Advent, we celebrate Christ's coming into the world and watch with expectant hope for his coming again. In its historical origins, the season of Advent was patterned after the season of Lent, a six-week period of penitence and preparation for Easter. Similarly, the four weeks of Advent present an opportunity for communal discernment and personal examination, as the church prepares to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord and looks with hope for Christ's return.

Between memory and hope an excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 96). In Advent we expectantly wait for the One who has already come. We anticipate the promised justice of God's new world, yet we praise God who raised the "righteous branch" to rule with justice and righteousness. We hope for the restoration of the afflicted, the tormented, and the grieving, yet we delight that healing has come in Christ. We long for the beating of swords into plowshares, yet we rejoice that the Prince of Peace has appeared. We yearn for the barren deserts of our inner cities to flourish, yet we laud the desert Rose that has bloomed. We dream of the land where lions and lambs live in harmony, yet we acclaim the child born to lead us into the promised land. Christ has come! Christ is risen! Christ will come again! In Advent, we are living between the first and the second coming of the Lord. The dialectical tension of maranatha [alternately translated "Come, our Lord!" or "Our Lord has come"] — placing us between memory and hope, past and future — may strengthen our Advent liturgies. Perhaps we need to cling to the ancient cry of maranatha! and its paradoxical meanings so we may freely embrace "the new thing" prophesied by Isaiah (Isaiah 43:19) that God is doing among us right now. The tension and paradox we find in Advent shapes our celebrations during the season. \*HAVE A BLESSED ADVENT SEASON!

Third – An Advent, Christmas, Year-End Blessing: God of love, in this Advent season you call us forth into a new day dawning. Help us work for a new day for people who need it most: the starving, the uneducated, the abusive and the abused, political tyrants, the despairing, the challenged. May your love be manifest in our presence to those in need. May your healing power move in places where there is space for it. Immanuel, God-with-us, you have prepared a path that brings hope, peace, joy and love into the world. May those who seek to know you find this path and the gifts upon it. May the hopeless, conflicted, depressed and lonely know that you have come to turn lives upside down, providing what we need in hopes that we too will provide for other's needs. Help us to prepare for and celebrate the coming Christ of Christmas. As we bring to a close 2017, we offer praise and thanks for all the many ways that God has made manifest the love of Christ in our lives and in our congregation and community. We are grateful for all our many blessings. May we know Christ's presence more fully as we follow his path of

## FINANCIAL UPDATE

The October total undesignated income was \$54,868 while total expenses were \$47,746 for a net income of \$7,122. This positive performance is mainly due to increased offerings. Thanks!

The year-to-date October undesignated income was \$433,845 while total expenses were \$440,722 for a YTD net loss of \$6,877. Although a loss is not desirable, we had budgeted a October YTD loss of \$19,503 so overall giving has been better than expected. Thanks!

As of November 15, our 2018 stewardship Estimates of Giving stand at \$140,684. Estimates of Giving received in 2016 were \$149,711. Of the 93 stewardship packages sent out, we have received 46 back so far. (This is somewhat disappointing.) If you have not yet sent in your Estimate of Giving for 2018, please do so before years end. Together with God, we can meet the mission and ministry needs of Celebration in 2018! Thanks, Joe

Elder Terry Pettijohn found an article by Cynthia Rigby that was reprinted from *Presbyterians Today* which reviews the role of Mary, mother of Jesus.

#### A New Look at Mary the "God-bearer"

Presbyterian author Kathleen Norris makes the wry observation that Protestants have a limited attention span for Mary, the mother of Jesus. We unpack her from the box at Christmastime, she says, and then pack her back up again, with our other decorations, after the holidays are over.

One reason we Protestants hold Mary at arm's length is because we associate her with our own vague discomfort about the role of saints in Christian spirituality. As Protestants we remember that Luther and Calvin criticized the Roman church of the 16th century for compromising, in their understandings of Mary, on the basic Christian conviction that Jesus Christ is the one Mediator between God and humanity.

Not wanting to make the same mistake, however, we inadvertently make another: We relegate Mary to the sidelines. But the time has come for Protestants to recognize Mary's place at the heart of the Christ event and consider what she has to offer to our theology and spirituality.

Roman Catholic and Protestant theologians alike have argued that Mary is the model Christian believer, the symbol of the church in relationship to God. Consistent with this belief, Christmas sermons often lift Mary up as one of the great cloud of witnesses who respond faithfully to what God calls them to do.

But these messages are incomplete. Certainly Mary is one among many people of faith the Scripture bears witness to and we celebrate. But she is also the only one who is identified as the "God-bearer." And it is in this distinctive vocation that she serves as a model for the church in relationship to God. She reveals what it means for us, in turn, to bear God to the world.

The idea that Mary is "God-bearer" (theotokos, in Greek) was affirmed by the church in 451, at the Council of Chalcedon. This is the Council that formulated the Christology we still confess today: that Jesus Christ is "fully human and fully divine."

To confess that the young woman named Mary is the bearer of God is consistent with this affirmation. Born to a human woman, Jesus Christ is as fully human as every baby ever born. His birth to a human woman who is uniquely God-bearer reminds us that this human son is also fully divine.

Recognizing Mary as God-bearer leads us to ask questions about the character of our relationship to God. What does it mean to say that Mary - and we - are the bearers of God?
