The Session had a Called meeting on October 10 and a Stated meeting on October 17 and took these actions:

- The Elders Elect have been invited to attend Session meetings as part of their training, and they were welcomed to the fold.
- A Blue Christmas service for those feeling a sense of sadness or loss during the Christmas season will be held on Tuesday, November 29, at 6:00 p.m. All Are Welcome!
- The church hosted a blood drive with the American Red Cross on October 24 at CPC. It was well attended by church members and folks from the community. 23 units of blood were collected.
- Our workday with Habitat for Humanity was moved due to the storm to Friday, October 28. We helped paint a home at Hope's Crossing. Volunteers were asked to bring water and a bag lunch.
- Elder Ken Krenzer will be teaching the Adult Sunday School class at 9:15 a.m. starting an Advent Study on Sunday, November 20. Books will be available to participants for a nominal fee.
- Hospitality supports the First
 Wednesday Fellowship suppers,
 and various events by providing
 food and beverages. Join us for the
 next First Wednesday Fellowship
 potluck on November 2 at 5:30
 p.m.. We will have a guest speaker
 who has worked on the mission
 field in Syria. The potluck food for
 the evening will be your favorite
 "Tail Gate" dishes. Come share!

- The Youth Group is selling coupons for Belk Charity Days after church.
- We are collecting **Sneakers for Santa** now through Sunday,
 December 11. The sneakers should be <u>new</u> for children, youth or adults. All will be donated to the Salvation Army along with the socks we collected earlier this year.
- The Personnel Committee reported all staff evaluations are nearly complete. The Session approved an immediate salary increase for the church secretary.
- The Session approved a request from Jennifer Hammond and Laurice Ann Ward to use our church facilities for their wedding on October 12, 2016.
- The church survived Hurricane
 Matthew. Thanks to Pastor Tom
 for putting out sand bags around
 the doors, and Joe Alexander for
 checking facilities during the storm.
 Two pieces of sheet metal blew off
 of the steeple base, but were found
 on site and will be reattached soon.
 Church telephone lines were
 disrupted, but have been repaired.
- Pastor Tom requested Horry County
 Storm Water Management to have
 the County's drainage ditch at the
 back of our property cleared of
 debris. Unfortunately, with all of
 the storm damage the County is
 dealing with, it may be some time
 before the work is completed. To
 establish better drainage on our
 property, we need the County's
 drainage ditch cleared.
- The Technology committee reported that the Automated Church
 Systems software was updated to a cloud-based system called *Realm*.
 The program will give us enhanced abilities to run custom reports and

- send out emails to groups within the congregation.
- Payroll for Church and Preschool staff was outsourced to a payroll processor allowing staff to receive direct deposits starting November.
- A meeting with the Administrative Commission of New Harmony Presbytery has been set. They meet with the Session each year to talk about our church life and Presbytery's support of Celebration. 2017 will be our last year of financial support. This meeting is a time to share the accomplishments of the church and our dreams for the future.
- Pastor Tom will attend The SC
 Presbyteries Ministers & Educators
 Retreat November 14-16 at
 Montreat led by The Rev. Carol
 Howard Merritt. This will fulfill
 his required annual continuing
 education for 2016.
- The newly expanded Preschool Board met and is in the process of doing an analysis of our tuition rates and compensation rates for our teachers.
- SOS Healthcare sent us several volunteers with autism from their job-coaching program to assist with weeding our flower beds. The weather didn't cooperate, but the team plans to return and do more work.
- The Session finished final discussion of The Sailboat Church during generative time discussions.
- Please continue to pray for Pastor Tom and the Session as we approach the busy holiday season. Your love and compassion for one another really inspires us! God bless you all.



Here's one of my favorite Thanks-Giving Hymns and some background you may not have known about the history behind it. *Now Thank We All Our God* written by Martin Rinckart; translated into English by Catherine Winkworth. (It is Hymn No. 643 in our new *Glory to God* hymnal.)

For modern American Protestant churchgoers, the hymn "Now thank we all our God," likely conjures up an image of a congregation singing in unison, a pipe organ blasting away at a stately tempo, and a church full of people thinking about the approaching feast of stuffed

turkey with cranberry sauce. In order to understand where this hymn came from, I would like to offer a very different image: A minister and his family sing this hymn before dinner to thank God for the scraps of food they have on the table in their meager home in a desolate refugee city that is afflicted with famine and disease and war. Since the earliest projected date for this hymn is 1636 and the oldest known date is 1663, this hymn was certainly written during or soon after the Thirty Years' War (1618-1648). Martin Rinckart (1586-1649) was an accomplished musician who studied at the University of Leipzig and then spent most of his career as a musician and minister in the city of Eilenburg during the Thirty Years' War. British Hymnologist J.R. Watson accounts that Martin Rinkart was a Lutheran minister who came to Eilenburg, Saxony at the beginning of the Thirty Years' War. The walled city of Eilenburg became the refuge for political and military fugitives, but the result was overcrowding, and deadly pestilence and famine. Armies overran it three times. The Rinkart home was a refuge for the victims, even though he was often hard-pressed to provide for his own family. During the height of a severe plague in 1637, Rinkart was the only surviving pastor in Eilenburg, conducting as many as 50 funerals in a day. He performed more than 4000 funerals in that year, including that of his wife. So in the midst of tragedy and hardship Martin Rinkart wrote this hymn of thanksgiving to almighty God that he originally introduced for use as a sung table grace/blessing before a meal.

The text of the first two stanzas are based on Sirach 50:22-24: "Now therefore bless ye the God of all, which only doeth wondrous things everywhere, which exalteth our days from the womb, and dealeth with us according to his mercy. He grant us joyfulness of heart, and that peace may be in our days in Israel for ever (KJV)."

The story of this great man of God, Martin Rinkart, enables me to put into perspective the day-to-day trials that I might experience. During this time of Thanksgiving, I anticipate our dinner table discussion when we will recount our thanks-giving and THANKS-LIVING for the year. Through joys or sorrows we will share the hymn, "Now Thank We All Our God" as a sung prayer of Thanks and Praise for all God's tender mercies.

- (1) Now thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things has done, in Whom this world rejoices; Who from our mothers' arms has blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.
- (2) O may this bounteous God through all our life be near us, With ever joyful hearts and blessèd peace to cheer us; And keep us in His grace, and guide us when perplexed; And free us from all ills, in this world and the next!
- (3) All praise and thanks to God the Father now be given; The Son and Him Who reigns with Them in highest Heaven; The one eternal God, whom earth and Heaven adore; For thus it was, is now, and shall be evermore.

*We will be singing verse three as our DOXOLOGY in worship on the first three Sundays in November.

2016 Thanksgiving Minute for Mission

MARLA'S STORY

Thirteen-year old Marla* knows what it feels like to be unwanted and unappreciated. Before coming to Thornwell, she spent most of her childhood being shuffled from one distant relative's doorstep to another; her meager worldly possessions constantly in tow.

From an early age, Marla understood that her very presence was an inconvenient burden in the lives of those who opened their doors to her. While her basic needs were usually met, she was made well aware that the various roofs she slept under were provided out of a prideful sense of moral obligation, not love.

As she grew older, she was treated with increasing cruelty by the various family members who took her in. Her gentle spirit and lack of resources were frequently taken advantage of. She was often forced to work long, hard hours to earn her keep, and endured violent physical and emotional abuse. She began missing a lot of school, and her ideas about her own innate value and self-worth were slowly diminished.

By the grace of God—Marla's story does not end there! Today, if you ask Marla to tell you about the happiest day of her life, she'll describe—without hesitation—the day she came to Thornwell. She'll tell you the moment she first stepped into her cottage felt like a dream come true! For the first time in her life, she felt welcome and wanted in her new home. Her Family Teachers were warm and kind. They treated her no differently than their own children, and greeted her with a genuine, unconditional love that required nothing in return.

We share Marla's story today, not to sensationalize or exploit her personal struggles, but to provide a candid illustration of the invaluable, life-changing ministry Thornwell provides—a ministry made possible through the faithful support of congregations full of individuals like you!

Children like Marla come to Thornwell every day feeling hopeless, helpless and alone—but as they are embraced and encouraged with the unconditional love of Christ, they begin to learn their true worth, value and purpose as a child of God.

When you give a charitable contribution to Thornwell, you are providing children like Marla with more than just a roof over their heads—you are acknowledging, encouraging and strengthening them in their faith as equal members in the body of Christ! Thank you for sharing *your* gifts with the children and families we serve together.

From the Scripture...

²⁰ As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you."22 On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴ whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵ that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together
