

SESSION UPDATE

Holy Communion will be served October 1, 2017 Next Session Meeting is Sunday, October 15, 2017 at 12:30pm.

Following are the actions from the September Session meeting:

- Movie night was a success and another one is planned for October. This time the movie will be "War Room".
- Elder Mulligan will begin contacting the various HOA's in Carolina Forest to get permission to put items on their community bulletin boards about our church. She is also working on an article that will be circulated and church members are asked to use "Next Door" in their neighborhoods to promote the church.
- Funds were transferred from savings to checking to cover expenses during the summer months which are traditionally a time of lower offerings and the Preschool is not in session. Elder Alexander is closing watching all church spending and is optimistic that the Stewardship Campaign will help to bolster the church budget. If you've missed a few pledge payments over the summer due to missed Sundays from vacation and other activities, it is greatly appreciated if you catch your pledges up to date. Thanks!
- The Preschool Summer Camp budget had a small loss overall. The Session will review results to consider if it will be offered again.
- The Mission and Ministry Planning Group has reported results of their work during worship services during September. We hope that you have enjoyed hearing about their work.
- A celebration for the fifteen-year anniversary of CPC continues to be worked on. We are excited to host the Presbytery of New Harmony meeting on Tuesday, October 10. We will be calling for "all hands on deck" as we have approximately 175 folks attend the meeting at Celebration.
- A blood drive is planned for Wednesday, November 1, from 3-7pm.
- It's the time of year for signing up to be on a cooking team for Shepherd's Table. If you have three hours of time to give, once each quarter, please volunteer. See Cecilia Evans for details.
- Adult Sunday School has resumed and all are welcome to join in their study of the gospel of Matthew.
- Belk Charity Days coupons will be sold by the youth Sunday, October 22 and 29. Funds raised will be used to send youth to Camp Pee Dee next summer.
- The Youth are also planning a church-wide Game Night for October 20, and they have invited our friends from Kingston Presbyterian Church to join us.
- Elder Evans is participating in a task force that is examining the future viability of Camp Pee Dee. A goal of sending 60 kids from the Grand Strand area has been set by the group. Please advocate for Camp Pee Dee and share the news of this wonderful camp that can be used for family reunions, events, and of course youth camping trips. Unless usage of the facilities increases, the camp may no longer be able to be sustained. Please pray for the camp and encourage its use. A motion was passed that Celebration have a "Camp Pee Dee Day" in January.
- In lieu of Breakfast with Santa, this year the Hospitality Committee will work with the Youth to host a "Polar Express Night". It will be in the evening, and light refreshments will be served. It will include games and activities and pictures with Santa.

God's Best Blessings Be Ours as We Serve the Lord Together! Pastor Tom

The October hymn of the month is *Dona nobis pacem*, number 752 in our Glory to God Hymnal. The hymn *Dona nobis pacem* has three Latin words that form the conclusion of the *Agnus Dei*) ("Lamb of God"), a short anthem sung during the celebration of the Mass. When introduced, perhaps in the 7th century, only one wording was used, "Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi, miserere nobis" (Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.) and it was repeated multiple times. By the 9th century, the total number of repetitions was fixed at three, and the final petition became "Dona nobis pacem" (Give us peace).

The composer is Anon.; arr. Eric T. Myers (b. 1962). The origin of this music is unknown. Estimates of its age range from the 15th to the 17th centuries. The musical style, however, suggests that it probably dates from the 18th or 19th centuries.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

August total income received was \$15,559 vs total expenses of \$30,620 for a loss of \$15,061. This was covered by moving \$22,000 from our savings account into our checking account.

The first eight months (January-August) YTD total income was \$317,552 vs YTD total expenses of \$344,982 for a net loss YTD of \$27,430. These net losses should be reduced with Preschool back in session along with the elimination of Pastor Becky's salary since she has taken a position as Interim Pastor at Indiantown Presbyterian Church in Hemingway.

Reformation Sunday is October 29, 2017. Five hundred years ago, Martin Luther started the Protestant Reformation by nailing 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church. Elder Terry Pettijohn found this article in the August 2017 *Presbyterians Today*, and obtained permission of Joseph Small to reprint it in our newsletter. Dr. Small served as director of the Presbyterian Church (USA) Office of Theology and Worship from 1989-2011. He is author of many books for Presbyterians, including *Conversations on the Confessions* (2005).

Celebrating the Reformation by Joseph D. Small

In late October 1517, an obscure Augustinian monk teaching in a minor German university offered a set of propositions, inviting an academic debate. Many Presbyterians can picture Martin Luther nailing his 95 Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, but we are hard-pressed to say what the theses were about, and why they sparked a movement that both reformed and divided the church.

Luther's post was titled "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences." It condemned the use of indulgences, a practice based on the assumption that guilt is forgiven by God but punishment for sin can be reduced through prayers, good works or alms (monetary donations) as directed by a priest.

Luther's attack on indulgences began by turning to the gospel: "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent,' he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance" (thesis 1). The theses proceeded to deny that priests have power to forgive sins, and to attack the practice of selling certificates of forgiveness: "It is vain to trust in salvation by indulgence letters" (thesis 52). Instead, "The true treasure of the church is the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God" (thesis 62).

Luther's harsh critique of indulgences could not be dismissed as abstract theological quibbles, for it assaulted the ecclesiastical apparatus, denying the church's power to grant remission of sins for the purchase of a piece of paper.

This was a critique anyone could understand; the pope and bishops understood it all too well. The church responded to Luther by demanding his silence. Luther refused, the conflict escalated, and soon reached the point of no return. It was not anyone's intent to divide the church, but Luther's combativeness and the intransigence of the leadership produced a schism that has led to 500 years of continuing church divisions.

Although Luther posted his 95 Theses 500 years ago, 2017 does not mark the anniversary of the idea of reformation, and Luther was not the first reformer. There were plenty of reformers before and after Luther. Popes Leo I, Gregory the Great and Gregory VII accomplished major church reforms hundreds of years before Luther was born. Benedict, Francis, Jan Hus, John Wycliffe and many more sought church reform, some successfully, some not. Beyond Luther, distinctive church reforms were initiated by Zwingli, Calvin, Cranmer, Wesley and others. Catholic reforms undertaken in the Council of Trent continued through the 20th century's Second Vatican Council.

The enduring accomplishment of the 16th-century Protestant Reformation is the continual recall-ing of the church to its true treasure, "the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God." Its enduring heartbreak is the continual fragmentation of the church. The Reformed motto, ecclesia reformata semper reformanda secundum verbum Dei — the church reformed always to be reformed in accord with the word of God — is testimony to the continuing necessity of reformation, including reform of Protestantism's tendency toward persistent division.
