

"That's the Pacific Ocean," said Uncle Joe. "It's the largest ocean in the world. Its water covers more of Earth than all of the land put together!"






Uncle Joe turned the plane toward land. Soon Wyeth saw something else.

■ "That is the Kern River," he said. "Its waters flow fast. People like to float down the river in kayaks."


Before long, Uncle Joe pointed to something else. "What do you think that is?"


"It's a large body of water in the middle of land," said Wyeth. "It must be a lake."


■ Uncle Joe landed the plane. Then he asked Wyeth, "What will you remember most about our trip?"
