Read Deuteronomy 7:6-9, Psalm 119:90, then briefly consider the questions below.

This week in Children's Worship, the kids are learning that God is faithful. He always does what He says He will do. The Old Testament is full of examples of God choosing to keep His promises despite the actions of His people. Time and time again He proves Himself faithful and continues to do so today. I'm sure we all can agree, this is a timeless truth your students will continue learning and experiencing for the rest of their lives.

- As you reflect on this past week, how have you seen God's faithfulness?
- Take a moment to write/speak a prayer of thanksgiving over the faithfulness you have experienced this week.

There is such power and encouragement when we share testimonies of God's faithfulness with other believers.
