- 2. Snap a photo of a bridge: There are hundreds of bridges in all neighborhoods, providing many opportunities for the perfect shot!
- 3. Learn a new river fact: How many bridges on the Chicago River move? Can you swim in the river? What kind of fish live in the river? There are so many questions to ask! Check out www.chicagoriver.org for lots of information about the Chicago River and also about Friends of the Chicago. Friends works to protect and improve a total of 156 miles of water in the Chicago River watershed and there are even more facts to learn than there are miles of river!
- 4. Spot a paddler: the Chicago River is safe for canoeing, kayaking, and stand-up paddle-boarding! Can you spot someone enjoying it?
- 5. Make a pollinator craft: Butterfly, bees, hummingbirds and more. Show us your favorite kind!
- 6. Share this card with a friend: the more the merrier! Let your friends know how much there is to see and do on the river!

- 20. Make a FOG Monster: Fats, oils, and grease are bad for your pipes and bad for the River. Decorate a spare jar to use as a disposal container!
- 21. Make a bouquet of fall leaves: everyone loves the colors of fall! Bring some inside with you.
- 22. Visit a FPCC site along the river: the Forest Preserves of Cook County allows you to get close to nature and the River right in our own backyard. Go see how your favorite site is doing, or check out a new one! To find a spot to visit check out: https://fpdcc.com
- 23. Snap a photo of a native plant: with so many beautiful plants along the Chicago River, it's sometimes hard to know which ones are native to this area. How many do you know? If you need help learning which are local and which are invasive we recommend using the iNaturalist app.
- 24. Pick up trash: a cleaner River is good for the people, plants, and animals who use it and live near it. Every piece you pick up is one less that could end up in the River! Whether right off a river bank or blocks away in your neighborhood it is helpful to get trash off the ground where it can be swept away by wind or rain to the river.
