

Children Living with Immigrant Parents in the Los Angeles Metropolitan Area



The map on the left presents the proportion of children living with at least one immigrant parent in Census tracts of the Los Angeles metropolitan area.

In the orange Census tracts, a majority of children live with at least one immigrant parent. Orange Census tracts are clustered together to the east and southeast of the city of Los Angeles, as well as north of the city.


Note that roughly 63 percent of immigrant households in the Los Angeles metropolitan area contain one child or no children (see bottom left).

Also, note that the most common place of birth among immigrant householders was Mexico (35 percent). The Philippines was the second most common place of birth, followed by El Salvador and Vietnam (see bottom right).



The table on the left presents the top ten most commonly spoken languages among immigrant households in the Los Angeles metropolitan area. Spanish is the most common language spoken, followed by English, Filipino/Tagalog, Korean, Chinese, and Vietnamese. All other languages are spoken at a rate of less than 5 percent.

The chart to the bottom left shows that a majority of immigrant householders in the Los Angeles metropolitan do not have a college degree.

Also, note approximately 53 percent of immigrant households are characterized by annual incomes that are less than \$75,000. Conversely, nearly half of all immigrant households are characterized by annual incomes greater than or equal to \$75,000 (see bottom right).
