

Median Income among Employed Immigrants in Connecticut




The map on the left presents the median personal income among full-time employed immigrants in the Hartford, CT metropolitan area. Immigrants living in the Hartford, CT metropolitan area (especially in the north east corridor) reported higher median incomes (\$47,370) compared to immigrants in the state of Connecticut (\$43,307), and immigrants in the U.S. population (\$33,685).

When compared to the national immigrant population, a larger proportion of immigrants in the Hartford, CT metropolitan area are 55 years of age or older.

The majority of immigrant households in the Hartford, CT metropolitan area either have zero children residing in



Proportion of Immigrants Living in Connecticut who are Minorities



The map on the left illustrates the proportion of minority immigrants living in Connecticut. The greatest percentage of minority immigrants reside in and around the cities of Bridgeport, New Haven, Norwich and Hartford.

With regard to occupational groups, immigrant workers in the Hartford, CT metropolitan area were more likely to be employed in production; office and administrative support; management, business, science and the arts; and computer and mathematical occupations.
