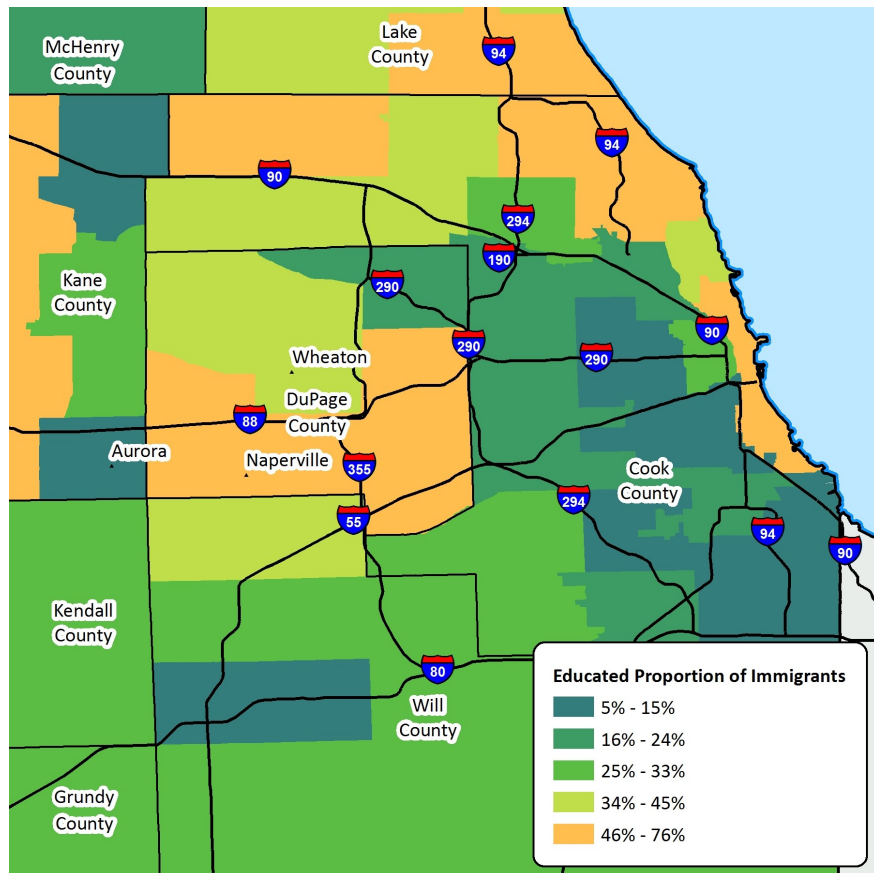

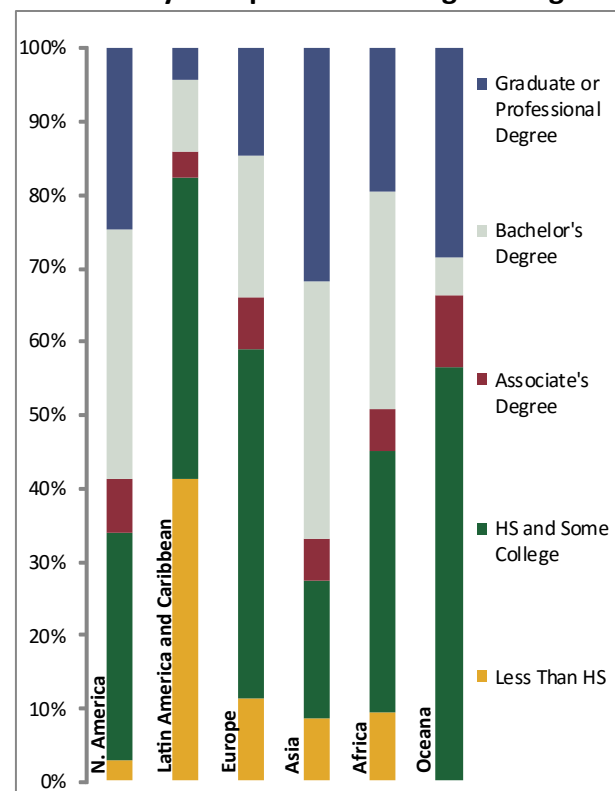

## Immigration in DuPage County, IL

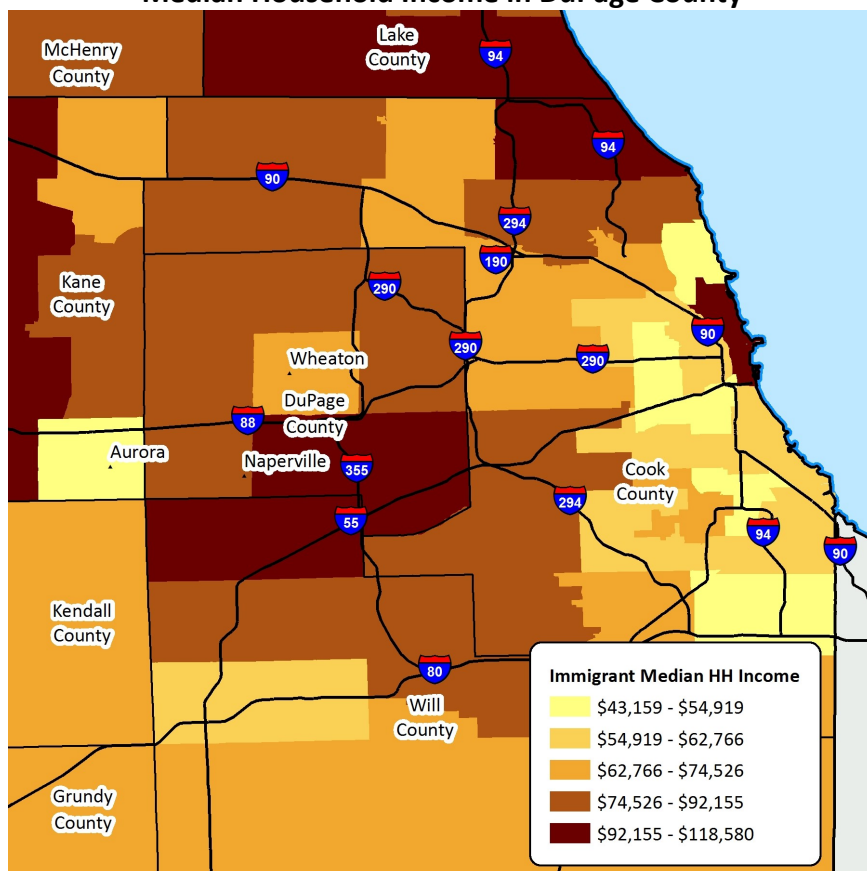
DuPage County, outside of Chicago, IL has a high proportion of educated immigrants in the southern portion of the county. As much as 60 percent of the Immigrants near Naperville have a bachelor's degree or more. Farther to the north, near Wood Dale, the proportion of educated immigrants is much lower (21 percent). The county has a very highly educated community of immigrants, many of whom come from Asian, African or European countries of birth. Whereas the dominant portion of the Latin American communities are less educated. The top occupational groups for immigrants in DuPage include a much larger share of the Healthcare group than the average for the whole state of Illinois.

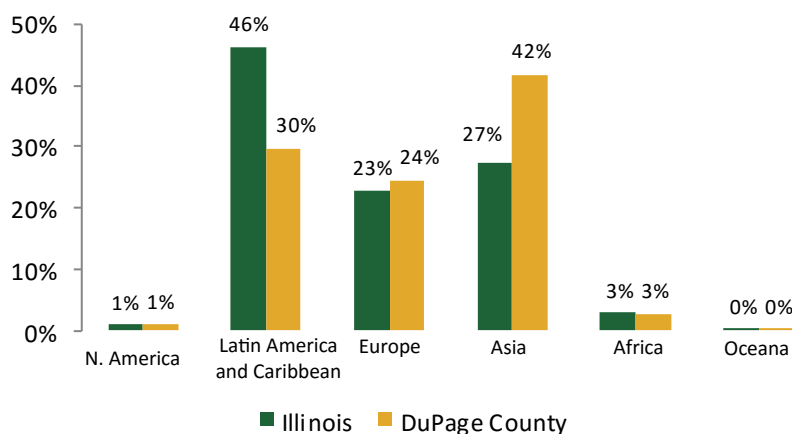
## Median Household Income in DuPage County



## Immigration in DuPage County, IL

Across Northeastern Illinois median household incomes for immigrants drop as you look closer to the urban core of Chicago. However, near Naperville, in DuPage County, there is a community of immigrant households whose incomes are some of the highest. It is notable that the dominant immigrant group in all of Illinois is Latin American and Caribbean (46 percent), but Asian communities (43 percent) hold that role for DuPage County. Fewer than one quarter of the immigrant population in Illinois have come since 2001. More than 74 percent of immigrants arrived in the U.S. between 1965 and 2001. These communities of immigrants come from mainly Latin America and the Caribbean, Asia, and Europe. Over 60 percent of the immigrants in DuPage County come from Mexico (24 percent), India (18 percent), Poland (8 percent), Philippines (6 percent) and China (4 percent).
