

Proportion of Children Living With at Least One Immigrant Parent in Census Tracts of the Lakeville Area, Minnesota



The map on the left presents the proportion of children living with at least one immigrant parent among Census tracts of the Lakeville Area of Minnesota. Census tracts characterized by relatively large proportions of children who live with at least one immigrant parent are shaded light green and orange. Light green Census tracts are located near the city of Lakeville and the city of Farmington. Orange Census tracts are located outside of the Lakeville area, near Burnsville and West St. Paul.


According to chart below and to the left, the majority of immigrant households in the Lakeville area contain no more than two children.

According to the graph below, roughly 70 percent of immigrants enrolled in school in the Lakeville area are between the ages of 5 and 17.


Age Distribution among Immigrants Enrolled in School in the Lakeville Area and the U.S.

Proportion of Immigrants Living in Poverty in Census Tracts of the Lakeville Area, Minnesota




The map on the left presents the proportion of immigrants living in poverty in Census tracts of the Lakeville area of Minnesota. Dark green Census tracts contain a relatively small proportion of immigrants who live in poverty. Light green and orange Census tracts contain a relatively large proportion of immigrants who live in poverty. Light green Census tracts are located near the city of Lakeville and the west of Farmington. Only one orange Census tract is located in the Lakeville area, near the city of Farmington.

According to the graph below and to the left, the immigrant population of the Lakeville area is characterized by a lower poverty rate than the national population of immigrants.

According to the chart below, English is the most common language spoken among immigrants in the Lakeville area, followed by Spanish and Vietnamese.
