Proclamation Life Groups; Matthew 5:21-26; Week of Sunday, March 5, 2017; Steve Thiel

Sermon Theme: Entrance into the Kingdom of Heaven requires perfect love for the brethren. Our sin and need for salvation is seen in our anger that leads to hateful actions, but by faith in Christ, the Spirit of God transforms us into people who love God, love others, and are reconciled in our relationships.

- C. What contrasts do you see between Cain and the brother in Jesus' illustration?
- D. In Matthew 5:23-24, what details highlight the urgency for reconciliation to take place?
- E. In what ways would you like to grow in prioritizing the urgency of reconciliation?

III. APPLICATION TO NOT MURDER – (Application)

- A. As you think of your own life, how can you tell when you are angry with someone?
- B. What practical things can you do in order to see sin more clearly in your life?
- C. What practical things can you do to grow in walking in righteousness?
- D. Where do you think the greatest joy is found, in forgiveness or in walking in obedience?
