2.0 Data Collection, Site Surveys and Interviews

The initial work will consist of gathering the necessary data and information about the proposed lumber yard site and to further investigate the operations and functions of the Electric Plant mission in serving City residents.

2.1 Inventory and Analysis

2.1.1 Proposed Land Acquisition

Inventory of adjacent privately-owned parcel of land currently being negotiated for purchase by the City to expand the Maintenance/Electric Plant Complex. The property is a former location of a hardware store and lumber yard. The site is currently zoned as industrial land use. Evaluate/analyze the impact of the land acquisition on the existing site and the adjacent land uses.

2.2 Base Map& Facility Floor Plan Preparation

Amend the current base map utilized by Baker for Phase I to include the adjacent property from which to properly revise the site and facility analysis.

2.3 Electric Plant Facility Requirements

Review existing Electric Plant buildings. Create a generalized break down of use areas by square footage. Evaluate/analyze buildings by location and function. Generally evaluate/analyze individual buildings considering specific use and functional areas.

Meet with Electric Plant officials to obtain future facility requirements. Translate future requirements into functional layouts.

4.0 Concept Plan & Report (90%)

Preparation of a Concept-level Site Master Plan in a plan graphic and narrative report that will include possible future development scenarios the City Maintenance Department and Electric Plant. The planning horizon for this effort will consider both the short-term (5 to 7 years) and long-term (10 to 20 years) potential future scenarios; or what can realistically be expected to occur with regard to funding, financing, constraints, opportunities and other factors related to plan implementation, as provided to Baker by the City of Oberlin.

The plan will consider the existing yard area, that include the recent land acquisitions. The plan will include optimum functional relationships, storage requirements, building requirements, and yard operation. The plan will include proposed building footprints with calculated needed square footage, based off of the needs assessment and proposed square yardage required for optimal yard activity areas.

Another key assumption is that Baker will develop the proposed facility requirements based on a Joint Service Center Concept, where like functions of the Street Maintenance Department and the Electric Plant would be consolidated where possible.

A generalized cost estimate will be prepared based on order-of-magnitude square foot quantities based on current Means cost data.

No additional work will be required for the Street Maintenance facility requirements, as these were developed in the first phase of work. They will just be integrated into the new plan.

It will also consider adjacent land uses and will propose recommendations to diminish the impact of the site's operations. Various means of landscaping and buffering options will be part of the plan graphic component, should it be required to alleviate potential adverse aesthetic impacts from the potential expansion of the City-owned site.

The report will consider the impact of any recommendations developed in the Plan on the Current City Master Plan and Zoning. The report will also discuss and identify the various requirements, regulations, etc. that may have to be met by the City to either expand the current site or relocate to another location.

5.0 Presentation to City Officials (95%)

Baker will conduct a presentation with appropriate visual aids to City officials, as required. The purpose of the presentation will be to achieve consensus on the intent, direction and proposed end-result of providing for the future need of the City Maintenance Department and Electric Plant.

6.0 Final Site Master Plan & Report (100%)

Applicable comments and revisions provided by the City parties will be integrated into the Final Site Master Plan and Report and will serve as the final or 100% submittal to the City.
