

Gulfstream Aerospace Corp. Special Missions Fact Sheet

Savannah Background:

The Savannah facility is Gulfstream's headquarters. It opened in 1967 and comprises production and completions buildings for the G500, G450, G550, G600, G650 and G650ER; a paint facility; the largest business jet service center in the world; a research and development campus; and a sales and design center.

Employees:

Approximately 10,000 employees in Savannah
Approximately 15,000 worldwide (12 major locations on four continents)

Gulfstream History:

Has produced the world's most advanced business aircraft for nearly 60 years:

- More than 2,500 Gulfstream aircraft in service around the world
- Four business jets in production, two in development
- Supporting aircraft needs of corporations, individuals, governments and militaries.

Special Missions:

Gulfstream has a 50-year history of providing special mission and government aircraft

- Worldwide Gulfstream acceptance
 - 207 aircraft in government/special mission applications
 - 39 countries
- More than 70 Gulfstream aircraft are in service with the U.S. government
 - VIP transport
 - Special missions
- Head-of-State transport
 - 27 countries use Gulfstream aircraft
 - 28 C-37 aircraft are in the U.S. government's executive fleet
