PURPOSE

To approve an appropriation of funds received pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, in an amount not to exceed \$10,037,829.00 for public safety projects designed to assist in keeping Cobb County residents safe.

BACKGROUND

Congress enacted the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, signed into law on March 11, 2021 ("ARPA"), to provide needed relief to state, local, and Tribal governments to enable them to continue to respond to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19 and its negative economic impacts. The County has received two equal allocations of \$73,824,239.00 for a total of \$147,648,478.00.

Over the last several months, the County used a multi-step process to engage a broad range of stakeholders, analyze the needs that were identified, prioritize the resulting areas of need, and finalize investment guidance. This Investment Guidance Report was approved by the Board on April 12, 2022. The Guidance prioritizes five areas: community health, support services, economic development, county infrastructure, and public safety with twenty-one subtopics between those prioritized areas. A public application process opened on June 6, 2022 and closed on September 9, 2022. Each submitted application has been reviewed for eligibility and alignment with ARPA Regulations and the approved Investment Guidance Report.

The Public Safety Subcommittee reviewed fifteen applications and is recommending eight projects for funding that align with the County's Public Safety priority area. These fall into the Mental Health Response; Court Backlog; Public Safety Hiring, Retention, and Staffing; and First Response subtopics.

It is requested that the Board of Commissioners authorize an appropriation from the funding distributed to Cobb County under this plan, in an amount not to exceed \$10,037,829.00, to support public safety. Individual project budgets are proposed maximum awards based on information provided by the applicants; only ARPA eligible expenditures will be considered and permitted for funding reimbursements and advancements.

IMPACT STATEMENT

Findhelp.org will have an ongoing financial impact of \$5,400 per year starting in 2027. Cobb Co-Responders will have an ongoing financial impact of \$TBD should the Board choose to continue the project.

Project Summary	The project would embed co-responder units in hot spots for mental health crisis and provide case managers to support diversion services that promote alternatives to incarceration for individuals with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) and Co-Occurring Disorders (COD).
Budget	Total Recommended Funding (2 Years): \$2,741,174.00

Response: Does the proposed project align with one or more of the ARPA expenditure categories?	Yes; the proposed project will expand co-responder units to address the mental health implications caused by COVID-19.
Summary of Project Scope:	In partnership with Highland Rivers Behavioral Health (HRBH), Cobb County Department of Public Safety (CCDPS) will increase its numbers of co-responder behavioral health units by one. This will be accomplished by purchasing necessary equipment/vehicles and hiring three new police officers, five paramedics, and 12 sheriff's deputies to support the six licensed clinicians and two case managers hired by HRBH to create and manage the co-responder teams. CCDPS will provide specialized training to the co-response teams and all first responders in de-escalation techniques and methods to respond to behavioral health emergencies. The co-responder teams will partner with substance use treatment partners to provide follow-up visits with patients who have experienced an overdose to offer opportunities to speak with a peer counselor and access naloxone. Lastly, CCDPS plans to partner with a local university to study the co-responder program's effectiveness.
ARPA Alignment: Do intended project expenditures align with one or more of the SLFRF eligible expenditure categories per Treasury guidance?	Yes; per the Final Rule 1. Public Health, Behavioral Health – 1.12: Recipients may also provide services for special populations, for example, enhanced services in schools to address increased rates of behavioral health challenges for youths, mental health first responder or law enforcement mental health co-responder programs to divert individuals experiencing mental illness from the criminal justice system (See Federal Register Vol 87, No. 18, pg. 4356)
Evaluation Considerations:	Equity: The target population is impacted Cobb County residents. Program location: The project will take place in Cobb County and the organization is in Districts 1, 2, 3 and 4. Impact: This project is recommended to be partially funded. For the full program, the applicant expects an overall reduction in arrest and incarceration of individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis, a reduction in the use of force by law enforcement in incidents involving individuals in a behavioral health crisis, and a reduction of emergency room admissions and 911 utilization in incidents involving individuals in a behavioral health crisis. We will work with the applicant to address KPIs based on partial funding. Financial Continuity: The program will leverage information gathered during the program to identify other streams of funding once ARPA funding expires. The applicant notes that positions created for the program and the vehicles purchased can be re-absorbed by the partner agencies and assigned to traditional response roles.

The project will create positions for four case managers and one licensed clinician that will work to provide the necessary assessment, evaluation, and linkage to care that individuals may require.

Response: Does the proposed project align with one or more of the ARPA expenditure categories?	Yes; the COVID-19 pandemic had mental health implications and researchers are calling for services to mitigate its mental health aftereffects. This project provides services in the 911 center to address these mental health implications.
Summary of Project Scope:	The goal of the project is to provide rapid care for individuals with mental health issues who are in crisis or trying to access care. In partnership with Cobb County Department of Public Safety, a licensed mental health clinician will be placed in 911 centers to respond to calls that need mental health intervention as designated by EMS policy. Clinicians placed in 911 centers are better able to field mental health calls and potentially disengage a caller prior to arrival on the scene. The mental health clinician hired for the Cobb County 911 center will allow dispatch to send over a call concerning mental health to that staff member. The clinician will then work with the individual to get more history, see if there are any prior MH/SUD engagements with Highland Rivers Behavioral Health and work with the co-responder team/ or patrol officer to be better able to handle the complexity of the call.

Summary of Project Scope:	The project, developed by leaders from the Public Safety, Communications, and Information Services departments, will provide an online resource to citizens in need of navigating various social service organizations and find resources to help them meet their critical need. The scope of work includes implementing a County branded findhelp.org community site on cobbcounty.org and including a future interface to the 311/Customer Relationship Management System. The applicant is requesting an initial purchase of this service to go through December 31, 2026.

Financial Continuity: The project could impose ongoing costs on Cobb County beyond the requested amount of ARPA funding. Response: Does the proposed project align with one or more of the ARPA expenditure categories?	Yes; the project addresses the administrative needs exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, specifically case backlogs in Cobb County courts.
	The applicant originally requested total funding of \$3,426,616.00. After subcommittee review and taking into account the aggregate project score and available funding remaining, \$1,959,848.00 in funding was recommended.
Summary of Project Scope:	The project seeks to increase court personnel and consolidate lost revenue in order to better serve Cobb County residents. The COVID-19 pandemic impeded court functioning, resulting in court backlog and an increased workload on all court employees. The Cobb County Court System requests funds to hire temporary personnel in 3 of their 5 courts: Superior, Magistrate, and Juvenile Courts. This includes half of all juror fees over two years, senior judge pay for two years, one additional temporary full-time case manager at the Superior Court, two intake officers for the Juvenile Court, and one full-time and one part-time Judge for the Magistrate Court. The objective is to either decrease or eliminate the court backlog over the course of the project. Additionally, the funds will be used to purchase equipment and supplies to keep up with an influx of warrant requests and civil matters by having inperson, hybrid, and virtual meetings when needed.

Yes; per the Final Rule 3: Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity, General Provisions – 3.5: SLFRF funds may be used to address administrative needs of recipient governments that were caused or exacerbated by the pandemic; for example, uses of funds to address backlogs resulting from pandemic related shutdowns.
