

Care For People Applicant FAQs

Q: How does a Home Care Registry differ from other providers?

A: As a Registry, Care For People's caregivers do not qualify for benefits to include but not be limited to: Health Insurance, Unemployment Compensation, or Worker's Compensation. This helps to keep the cost down for the elderly.

Q: What are the responsibilities of an Independent Contractor?

A: Submit proper documentation, Maintain personal files, Pay personal Federal, State and local Income Tax including Social Security, and agree upon hours worked with client.

Q: What are the required clearances for Care For People applicants?

A: State Police Criminal Background Check, FBI Report, & Two-Step TB Test.

Q: What in-home services do you provide to older adults?

A: Hourly, Over-night, 24/7 Live-In, and Respite Care services are provided by Care For People.

Q: Who will pay me?

A: The client is responsible for paying each caregiver.

Q: Does Care For People have a minimum number of hours their Caregivers must work?

A: No. This is dependent upon the caregiver's proximity to the client and the agreement worked out between these individual.

Q: Who is responsible if there is an accident when I am working?

A: The individual caregivers are responsible. As Independent Contractor they release Care For People from any and all liability due to injury, damage or loss in connection with the delivery of in-home services. The Homeowner's insurance policy is responsible when an accident is a result of the homeowner's negligence.
