

## How To Create An Outline

Outlining and taking notes from your reading is an important part of content reading. Writing a correct outline can organize your reading in a way that makes it easy to read with the important events, people and places highlighted. So how do we do this? Use the following to outline a template from your lessons.

## I. Large, blue headline

- A. Subheading (If there is none, you can usually make one from the first few lines in the text)
  - 1. Important people, places or events. (Bold words or texts are good to place in here)
    - a. Explain the previous people, place or event in a few describing sentences.

Here's a sample outline from the material you've been reading.

- I. African Americans in the British New World.
  - A. Life in British New World
    - 1. Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade
      - a. The system of trade which brought Africans to the new world for slavery.
    - 2. Colonial Slavery
      - a. Bringing slaves from Africa to America to use for slave labor.
      - b. Produces goods which were shipped to Europe.
  - B. African Slave Traders
    - 1. Africans who sold other Africans
      - a. These were usually men captured in war and sold for weapons.
  - C. Middle Passage
    - 1. Horrific boat passage from Africa to the Americas
      - a. Many Africans died on this passage.
  - D. Harsh Slave Codes
    - 1. Adopted to keep the slaves obedient
  - E. Colonization brought people together
    - 1. Native Americans
    - 2. Africans
    - 3. Europeans
