

This musical setting of the Beatitudes may be used in a variety of ways. The verses are easily sung by the assembly or could be sung by a cantor or choir, especially when introducing the piece. Also, the verses can be sung consecutively, perhaps in groups of two, with the Refrain coming in as desired. Liturgically, this piece works well during Communion. Other uses include All Saints, Funerals, and RCIA.
