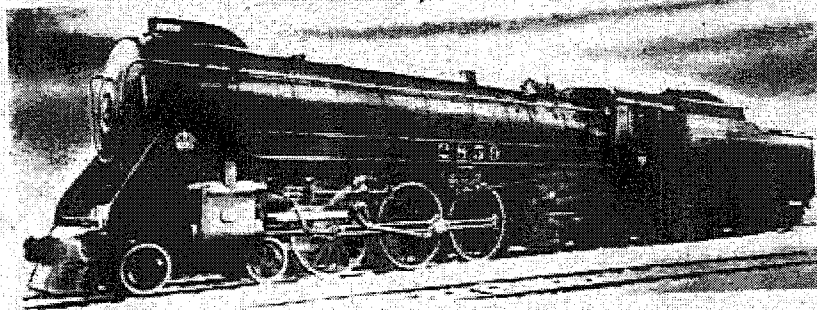

Over 19,000 Miles in One Month

With a six-month average of 17,185 miles, this C.P.R. Hudson type locomotive made a record mileage of 19,253 in one month, and mileages of 18,269 and 18,152 in two other months.

ating on the run between Toronto and Fort William, averaged 16,000 miles a month over a six-month period.

It is of interest to note that these Hudson type locomotives on the C.P.R. are now being referred to as the "Royal Hudson" class, and a crown is displayed on the running board enclosure, near the front, on each side, this being a mark of honor for all of the 2800 class locomotives in recognition of the record of locomotive no. 2850, which hauled the train of Their Majesties, the King and Queen, across Canada during their 1939 visit. The authority for the use of this crown marking was given after that memorable journey.
