

BLOCKS MAIN LINE

Fast Freight Crashes Into Rear End of Local

Town to Train Globe

NONE OF CREW INJURED

Kingston, Sept. 17.—There was a freight wreck on the Canadian National Railways at Collin's Bay, seven miles west of Kingston, at 1.25 o'clock this afternoon, when freight No. 493, traveling at a good rate of speed, crashed into the rear end of a way freight, which was proceeding very slowly. The track for a distance of several hundred yards was plowed up and both sides of the line were piled high with wrecked cars. None of the train crews were injured. Eleven cars carried sheep, and the tracks for some distance were strewn with dead, dying and maimed animals. Residents of the immediate district helped in tending to the injured sheep, and put out of misery those beyond recovery. Wrecking crews were at work two hours later, and it is expected that the tracks will be cleared tonight. Late this afternoon the passengers on the International Limited were brought near to the wreck and then transferred to a train on the other side and taken west. Only a few weeks ago Collin's Bay was the scene of another train collision.
