The Songs

Epitaph: Welsh poet Sarah Williams published her second book of poetry in 1868. These lines, from "The Old Astronomer" have become a well-known round.

When I am Silent: Subtitled "A song for the girl in Auschwitz", Joan Varner's haunting piece conveys both the innocence of youth, and the anguish and helplessness felt by those imprisoned.

<u>Danny Boy:</u> There are various suggestions as to the true meaning of "Danny Boy". Some have interpreted the song to be a message from a parent to a son going off to a war or uprising (as suggested by the reference to "pipes calling glen to glen").

<u>Fare Thee Well, Love:</u> From the 1990 album by the Rankin Family, this tender melody has become a Canadian standard.

<u>Boots:</u> With a text by Rudyard Kipling, this piece shows the frustration of soldiers faced with gruelling marches and deplorable conditions.

Hear My Voice: Calgary composer Kathryn Parotta uses jazz harmonies in this evocative piece. The speaker repeatedly pleads for his voice to be heard - in the wind, in the trees, even in Paradise.

<u>In Flanders Fields:</u> John MacCrae's eloquent poem has been set in many ways by many composers.

Johnny I Hardly Knew Ye is the story of an Irish woman who meets her former lover on the road to Athy. After their illegitimate child was born, the lover ran away and became a soldier. He was badly disfigured, losing his legs, his arms, his eyes, and in some versions, his nose, in fighting on the island of "Sulloon" or Ceylon, and will have to be put out with a bowl to beg. In spite of all this, the woman is happy to see him and will keep him on as her beau.

After the War: Sung by Sarah Slean in the movie Passchendaele, this arrangement by Canadian Mark Sirett tells the tale of a soldier yearning for home. David Keeley once commented that when Paul Gross called him and began to sing the words to this song, he handed the phone to his wife, Laura, who 'began crying immediately'.

Ubi Caritas:

Where charity and love are, God is there.
Love of Christ has gathered us into one.
Let us rejoice in Him and be glad.
Let us fear, and let us love the living God.
And from a sincere heart let us love one another.

<u>Alleluia:</u> This thoughtful and prayerful setting is by Toronto composer Stephanie Martin.

<u>Pacem:</u> BC composer Don Macdonald has borrowed Latin quotes about peace and war:

Peace not war; eternal Peace; Grant us peace; peace on Earth; War is a crime; war is the poison of the world; If you want peace agree to keep the peace.

<u>Espiritu de Dios</u> is a traditional Cuban melody, and a plea: Spirit of God,

Fill my life, my soul, my very being, And fill me with your presence, your power, your love.

We Wear Red For You: On 11 June 2007, while on a resupply mission in Kandahar, Afghanistan, Six-one Delta hit an improvised explosive device that took the life of Trooper Darryl Caswell, and injured the remaining crew members, one of which was Cpl. Wade Wick. Upon his return, Lesia met Wade and learned the true meaning behind R.E.D. (Remembering Everyone Deployed) Fridays. This song was then written to help spread awareness and the importance of wearing red on Fridays.

Nella Fantasia:

In my imagination I see a fair world,
Everyone lives in peace and in honesty there.
I dream of souls that are always free,
Like the clouds that fly,
Full of humanity in the depths of the soul.

One Song at a Time speaks of the power of togetherness and the possibility that we can change the world.

Hope is a Thing With Feathers: In this poem, Dickinson is creating a metaphor of hope through a bird. The hope that is within the speaker is much like a bird that continues to fly inside her. While we may all experience some dark times, hope can offer some encouragement.

Inscription of Hope: The Holocaust is a stunning reminder of where authoritarian rule, fueled by popular prejudice, fear and hatred of "the other", can lead and the power of hope to stand in its way. "Inscription of Hope" is based on a text reportedly found on the walls of a cellar in Cologne, Germany, where Jews were hiding from the Nazis during World War II.

Their Stories

Ruth Masters: Born and raised in the Comox Valley, Ruth Masters joined the RCAF Women's Division in June 1942, serving as an administration Sergeant and surviving the London Blitz. Although known most recently as a passionate environmental advocate, Ms. Masters' historical work has been instrumental in developing this concert. Her comprehensive scrapbook, found in the Courtenay Museum, chronicles the lives of all Comox Valley personnel killed in WWI and WWII.

Brenda Corey Dunne is an ex-military physiotherapist, author, volunteer, mom of three teens. Her fictional account of life as a military spouse--DEPENDENT--was published in 2014. She recently helped to found the Canadian Military Wives Choir Comox, and is the chairperson of the National Canadian Military Wives Choirs Board of Directors.

<u>Lancelot Rodney Warn</u> served in the 30th and 16th battalion with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces during World War One. He survived the war but died in 1919 of enteric fever. He is entitled to the British War Medal and Victory Medal.

Les Marshall: The quote in the story is from Ruth Master's book *Lest We Forget*, described as *Sandwick 1978*.

<u>Sargeant Gerry Perrin</u> served in Korea and was the only Canadian awarded the Presidential Ribbon. He was one of 45 members of the Gloucestershire regiment.

<u>Leslie Leedham</u> enlisted on Sept 1, 1939, followed by his brother John, who was only 14 at the time. Leslie didn't realize when he wrote home that his letters would be used for his memorial. His parents in Courtenay received word that Les and his unit had had dinner in a Cathedral on Christmas night 1943 and then they were bombed.

<u>Bud Mabbet</u> is 96 years old and lives in his own home at Union Bay. Raised in Port Coquitlam, he served in the Canadian army's 5th Armoured Division, New Westminster Regiment. He scouted for the "Lord Strath's", a tank regiment. He joined the regiment at 19, in July 1940 and served until severely wounded in Italy in Dec. 1944.

<u>Howard Slessor</u> was a Courtenay boy, killed in WWII, and posthumously recognized for gallantry.

<u>Private Edwin C. Everett</u> enlisted in the 102nd Battalions (stationed in Goose Spit) in Feb. 1916. Assigned to the hospital staff, he transferred to the 13th Field Ambulance

Corps and was sent to France in August. Pvt. Everett kept a personal diary about his experiences in the "Great War".

William Leslie: An immigrant from Scotland, William Leslie married his wife Maud in Vancouver and enlisted in the 72nd Scottish Highlanders, where because of his knowledge of horses, he was made "Sergeant of the Pioneers". However, the 72nd wasn't yet certified to go to Europe, so he and Maud went to Vancouver Island where he joined the 67th Scottish and trained with some of the men from Vancouver Island, commonly called THE ISLAND GIANTS due to many of them being loggers, miners, farmers...big stocky lads. He was killed on June 5, 1917.

Ramona Vanstone was born on Cortes Island and married Alfred, son of David Vanstone, a well-known businessman. She was sister-in-law to his son David, and a friend of Robert Perkins, both of whom were killed in WWII and had mountains named after them.

Riki Winter-Vogt: Forced to leave their native Czechoslovakia after WWII, the family later moved to Australia where three siblings eventually became Olympic athletes. Ms. Winter-Vogt moved to Campbell River in 1969, raising two daughters and practicing massage therapy for 36 years. She honours her parents and grandparents for getting them through those years as refugees.

Major G.A. Stoner was originally a prairie farm boy, but he hated it, and joined the army as soon as he was old enough. (Apparently boot camp was a luxury - got to sleep in till 6:00 in the morning, eat second helpings at every meal, and even get dessert on a regular occasion!) He eventually settled on the Island.

<u>Charles Ashurst</u> was a fighter pilot in WWII. He survived the war and flew food aid to those in need.

Lester B. Pearson

The only non-Island text comes from a former Prime Minister. In 1957, Pearson's remarkable diplomatic achievements in peacebuilding, and in particular in resolving the crisis of Suez through the establishment of a UN Emergency Force, was recognized and honoured with the awarding of the Nobel Peace Prize.

Note: We have no idea whose war bride memory we have quoted; it was found in the archives at the Campbell River Museum.
