

Q: Would someone read aloud Revelation 8:1-5?

Chapter eight begins with the breaking of the seventh seal in which heaven responds in silence.

Q: Why do we see this moment of silence in

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heaven? What does this silence evoke?

We know that the believers to whom John wrote suffered for their faith. Many may have asked, "Where is God in all this?!" (cf. Ps 79; Rev 6:10). We learn here in Revelation that there will be a time when God finally rights every wrong in his final judgment. However, for us today there appears to be moments when God is silent amidst of our sufferings.

Q: How does this passage instill hope for Christians facing suffering today? How does it encourage you?

Generally, the western church can be affected by a dependence on material comforts and relative absence of high persecution.

Q: In what ways might a dependence on these hinder the western church from genuinely or fully appreciating that truth that there awaits a final judgment? Do you think you have been affected in any way?

We learned Sunday that there is a connection between high thoughts of God and godliness.¹

Q: Does your mind trend toward high thoughts of God or small thoughts of God? Explain.

New Testament scholar Richard Baukham writes during the silence, "the angel burns the incense on the alter to accompany the prayers of the saints... at the climax of history, heaven is silent so that the prayers of the saints can be heard, and the final judgment occurs in response to them."

Q: Why is prayer a privilege for Christians and not a burden?

The passages of Scripture which describe God's judgment require us to think about the ultimate

¹ "High thoughts of God" conform to the Lord's full self-revelation in Scripture. It is to meditate on how he is revealed throughout his word and not simply on a few conveniently selected attributes which tend to reduce him to an idol of our own making; a merely better version of ourselves. A low view of God will always lead to impiety, ungodliness. A God without judgment or righteous wrath may generate warm thoughts but will never inspire repentance or awe or holy devotion. Small thoughts of God undermine the gospel and strip the cross of its power. A God who is loving but possesses no anger over wickedness would be our moral inferior for his love would be sentimental rather than substantive.
