OVERVIEW

BIBLE TRUTH

Jesus forgives and sends us.

BIBLE VERSE

Jesus said to him, “Feed My sheep.” John 21:17

LEARNER GOAL

I understand that Jesus forgives me and sends me out to tell the Good News to others.

LAW & GOSPEL

God demands that I love Him and none other, solely and completely.

Even though I deny Him, God forgives me and assures me of His love for Christ’s sake.

SCRIPTURE SNAPSHOT

Peter, James, John, Thomas, and a few of the other disciples fish all night on the Sea of Tiberias without catching anything. At dawn, Jesus appears on the beach and tells them to cast their nets on the right side of the boat. Immediately, the nets fill to overflowing, and John realizes Jesus is there. Peter swims ashore to see Jesus, who prepares breakfast. Addressing Peter directly, Jesus asks three times, “Do you love Me?” With each question, Peter becomes more distressed. Through these questions, the Lord restores and reinstates Peter to lead His Church.

LESSON PREP

BASIC Read **John 21:1–19** and study notes in *The Lutheran Study Bible (TLSB)*.

MORE TIME Read **John 21:20–25** with study notes in *TLSB*.

IN DEPTH In the introductory material to the Book of John in *TLSB*, read the section “Enigmatic Sayings,” page 1775.

BONUS ACTIVITY

Check the back page for the “153 Fish Crackers” activity. This might be a good alternate way to begin your lesson today. Children love a snack to start off their time together.



GUIDEBOOKS

LAUNCH

PRAY Dear Jesus, our Savior, thank You for bringing us together to be with our friends and to learn more about You. Amen.

SING “Oh, How I Love Jesus”
 “Jesus, I Believe in You”
 Music can be found in the digital resource center.

SAY Have you ever really hurt a friend and felt so guilty you were afraid to see him or her again? What kind of face do you make when you feel like that? When you feel this way, do you go running toward that person or do you try to stay away from them? Does anyone remember what Peter did when Jesus was on trial? (This might be a good time to review the events of Holy Week and Easter to bring everyone up to speed. When possible, let your students do the retelling, or you can draw the events on the board while they retell them.) **Peter denied Jesus three times, and he felt pretty terrible about it. But instead of hiding from Jesus, Peter does just the opposite. As I read this true Bible account, listen for what Peter does when he sees Jesus.**

LEARN

READ “A REVEALING RESTORATION”

Use the *Explore Bible Guidebook* to read the Bible narrative aloud to your students.

DO SOMETHING

FOR YOUNGER LEARNERS The first portion of this narrative has many good action verbs that you and your students can act out as you read. For the second part, have students count with you and hold up one, two, and three fingers to mark the three times Jesus asks Peter if he loves Him.

FOR OLDER LEARNERS Divide this section into two parts, John 21:1–14 and John 21:15–17. Before reading each section

aloud from Scripture, ask students to listen for the answers to the following questions. Who is present? What is the problem? Who provides the solution? For students who are more visual, let them draw their responses, folding a piece of paper into three sections and titling the sections “Who,” “What,” and “Who.” In each section, the students can draw or write their responses.

KEY DISCUSSION POINTS

- There is a Part 1 and a Part 2 to this narrative. The first scene revolves around the disciples and the miraculous catch of the fish. The second scene shows Jesus forgiving Peter in a manner to remind Peter of his three denials. Then Jesus gives Peter a job, to “feed My lambs.”
- Peter was a man of action, often acting impulsively. This can cause him trouble sometimes, but other times it means that he can be a man of action for the Lord.
- Jesus is in control and provides all that these men need. He will also provide all that they, and we, need to fulfill our calling to “feed [His] lambs.”
- Jesus remains faithful to Peter and to the disciples. This is a constant we can rely on.
- With Jesus there’s always more. The catch of fish is more than expected, the forgiveness is more than Peter expected, and Jesus’ love for us is more than we could ever imagine.

LIVE

EXPLORE THE CONTEXT

Before you start the discussion questions, use the *Explore Bible Guidebook* for further details about fishing and other “threes,” found on the second page of Lesson 1.

TALK ABOUT IT

Choose from the following questions. For a few helps, encourage students to look in the *Explore Bible Guidebook*.

- ▶ **What does it feel like to be forgiven of something that you did wrong? Have you ever thought that you couldn't be forgiven and then someone forgave you? If not, imagine what that might feel like.**
- ▶ **Maybe we take it for granted that we will be forgiven. Why is that a problem?** (It means we don't realize what a big deal it is that Jesus died to forgive us of our sins. It makes our Savior seem smaller. This might be a question for older students.)
- ▶ **Peter and other disciples were fishermen. Jesus used their occupation, or job, to help them serve Him. What are some occupations or jobs that you know about? How do those people serve God in their occupation? How do we serve God in whatever our occupation or vocation is?** (If you have students who like to draw, give them an opportunity to draw the disciples fishing and then modern people serving God's people through their jobs.)

SAY THE BIBLE VERSE TOGETHER

Jesus said to him, “Feed My sheep.” John 21:17

KEY DISCUSSION POINT

- God sends all of us to care for His people, His sheep. We, too, are part of those sheep. God uses His people to care for us too.

CHECK FOR UNDERSTANDING

Ask students to tell you, or draw, their favorite part of this Bible narrative and why.

LEAVE

SAY Jesus forgave Peter, and He forgives us too. Jesus sent Peter out to “feed [His] sheep,” and He sends us out to do the same.

SING The Doxology, “Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow”
“The Lord's Prayer”

PRAY Dear Lord Jesus, help us to be loving and forgiving to one another, just as You love and forgive us. Help us to tell everyone about You! In Your name we pray, Jesus. Amen.

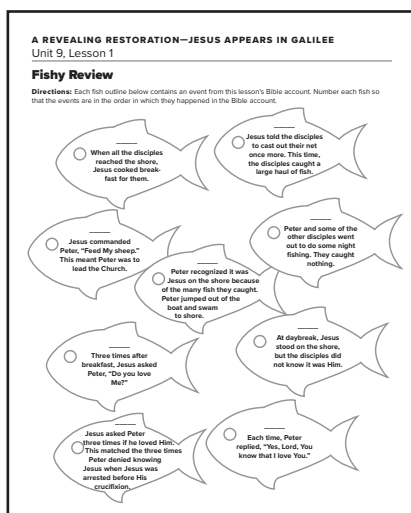

DOWNLOADABLE PAGE HELPS

Make copies of the downloadable activity page found in the digital resource center. Use helps below as a guide.

Fact order: **1.** Peter and some of the other disciples went out to do some night fishing. They caught nothing. **2.** At daybreak, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not know it was Him. **3.** Jesus told the disciples to cast out their net once more. This time, the disciples caught a large haul of fish. **4.** Peter recognized it was Jesus on the shore because of the many fish they caught. Peter jumped out of the boat and swam to shore. **5.** When all the disciples reached the shore, Jesus cooked breakfast for them. **6.** Three times after breakfast, Jesus asked Peter, “Do you love Me?” **7.** Each time, Peter replied, “Yes, Lord, You know that I love You.” **8.** Jesus asked Peter three times if he loved Him. This matched the three times Peter denied knowing Jesus when Jesus was arrested before His crucifixion. **9.** Jesus commanded Peter, “Feed My sheep.” This meant Peter was to lead the Church.

Many students may find this activity easier if the fish are cut out so they can physically arrange them in the correct order.



CONNECTING IDENTITY & CALLING

IDENTITY: WHO AM I?

God reveals Himself to me as my risen and living Savior.

CALLING: WHY AM I HERE?

I can trust God to forgive and restore me through the death and resurrection of Jesus, my Savior.

GROWING IN FAITH FOR LIFE

ADULT

I can consider how the events of the text help me better understand what it means that Jesus forgives me and sends me.

BONUS ACTIVITIES

153 FISH CRACKERS

5–10 minutes

John 21:11 says that the disciples' net was filled with 153 fish. Bring in exactly 153 fish crackers to divide among your students. Count them in groups of 10. Talk about how many that is and how much room they would take up if they were real fish. Talk about how Jesus always gives us more than we can imagine. Let students eat their fish crackers.

LAMB PUPPETS

10–15 minutes

Jesus told Peter to feed His sheep. God's children are His sheep. Use small paper bags to make lamb puppets, one for each child. If you have time, the children could make more for other family members. Glue cotton balls on the top for the lamb's face. On the bottom portion write today's Bible Verse.

PLAY A GAME OF GO FISH

Times may vary

This would work especially well for a small group. If you have time, use index cards to make your own deck of Go Fish cards with your students. To make it more creative, have them use Bible people as the “fish.” If you are unsure of the rules, look online. Each time a student gets a pair, the whole group can recite Psalm 100:5.

Peter and John
Heal a Man
Who Can't Walk
Acts 3:1–16; 4:5–22

OVERVIEW

BIBLE TRUTH

The Holy Spirit empowers God's people to show mercy.

BIBLE VERSE

Give thanks to the LORD! Psalm 106:1

LEARNER GOAL

I understand that the Holy Spirit helps me to show mercy to others.

LAW & GOSPEL

I show symptoms of living in a fallen world full of disability and illness.

Through His Son, God gives me forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation—the cure for all sin.

SCRIPTURE SNAPSHOT

A man who had never been able to walk lies by the Beautiful Gate and begs Peter and John for alms. Having no gold or silver to give him, they offer him something better—complete healing. Leaping for joy, the man praises God for His miraculous healing, and Peter uses the opportunity to teach about the true Savior. The Jewish Council asks Peter and John by whose power they performed this miracle, so they witness concerning the power of the risen Christ. Being warned against speaking further concerning Jesus, Peter and John assert they must continue to speak the Gospel.

LESSON PREP

BASIC Read Acts 3:1–16; 4:5–22; and study notes in *The Lutheran Study Bible (TLSB)*.

MORE TIME Read Acts 3:17–26 and study notes in *TLSB*.

IN DEPTH Read the article “The Acts of Whom?” in *TLSB*, page 1841.

LEADER NOTE

Because of the healed man's reaction of "walking and leaping and praising God," it's only natural to have your students take a moment to do the same after the reading of this narrative.



BONUS ACTIVITY

LAUNCH

PRAY Dear Lord Jesus, You give us all that we need. You forgive our sins and fill us with Your love. Help us to share this Good News with one another and everyone we meet. In Your name we pray. Amen.

SING "Oh, How I Love Jesus"
"Jesus, I Believe in You"
Music can be found in the digital resource center.

SAY What's something that you wish you could do but you can't? (Listen and respond to your students' thoughts on this. Some may be big things, others small; some eventually attainable, some never attainable.) Now imagine that because you couldn't do that one thing, you also couldn't work and earn money to live. Pretty sad, right? Now imagine that someone came along and said a word and you could do that thing that you had wanted your whole life to do. Your life would be changed in an instant! How would you feel? What would you do? Show me.

LEARN

READ "A WALKING WONDER"

Use the *Explore Bible Guidebook* to read the Bible narrative aloud to your students.

DO SOMETHING

FOR YOUNGER LEARNERS Notice that the first sentence of each paragraph of the narrative in the student book is in bold. After you read the boldface sentence, stop and ask students to predict what will happen next. Then finish the paragraph, checking to see if the students' predictions were correct. Continue this way

throughout the reading of the narrative.

FOR MIXED AGE LEARNERS Referring to the same boldface sentences and pausing as noted earlier, have students close their eyes and visualize what's happening as you read each paragraph. After each paragraph, ask students to describe what they see in their "mind's eye."

KEY DISCUSSION POINTS

- Peter and John were good friends and were an important part of growing the Early Church.
- Some versions of this narrative, including the ESV, use *lame* to describe the man who could not walk. Modern culture has given this word another use in a derogatory sense, as in, "He gave a really lame excuse." Talk about how the word *lame* is used here; make sure your learners know that it refers to the man's inability to walk.
- Once again, we see this miracle not as an end in itself but as an opportunity to point to Jesus.
- The group of leaders that put Peter and John into jail are the same group that put Jesus on trial not very long before this. They could have done the same to Peter and John. Instead of denying Jesus, this time Peter proclaims the truth of Jesus. After Pentecost, Peter became a bold preacher for Jesus. The Holy Spirit used his sermons to bring thousands of people to faith.
- Before God, we are all in the same position as the man begging at the gate. None of us can save ourselves from our sins. We are all recipients of God's mercy, His undeserved love.

LIVE

EXPLORE THE CONTEXT

Before you start the discussion questions, use the *Explore Bible Guidebook* for further details about this lesson, found on the second page of Lesson 2.

TALK ABOUT IT

Choose from the following questions. For a few helps, encourage students to look in the *Explore Bible Guidebook*.

- ▶ **Peter and John could heal the man only because of the name and power of Jesus. They had mercy on the man who could not walk. The Holy Spirit helps us to show mercy to people today. How do people show mercy today?** (The ability to talk in depth about this will vary depending on the maturity of your students. For younger students, talk more simply; for older students, you can talk about acts of mercy for those in need.)
- ▶ **Have you ever gotten in trouble for doing a good thing? How does that feel? Peter and John were thrown into prison for a night because they healed this man and witnessed about Jesus.**
- ▶ **Some people are uncomfortable talking about Jesus, but Jesus commanded us to tell everyone about how much He loves them and wants to save them. How can we tell everyone about Jesus in our daily lives, even if it might be uncomfortable?**
- ▶ **Jesus worked through Peter and John to heal this man and to share the Good News of salvation. What does it mean when people say that they see Jesus in us?** (Again, this might be too abstract for younger students, but try to talk about how we can serve our neighbor and be the hands and feet of Jesus in our world.)

SAY THE BIBLE VERSE TOGETHER

Give thanks to the LORD! Psalm 106:1

KEY DISCUSSION POINT

- How do we respond to Jesus' amazing gifts? We give thanks!

CHECK FOR UNDERSTANDING

Ask students to draw a picture of today's narrative; or, for older students, ask them to draw a picture to show what the word *mercy* means.

LEAVE

SAY The Holy Spirit helps us to care for others and to tell people about Jesus. We don't have to do it all on our own. We can give thanks for that!

SING The Doxology, "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow"
"The Lord's Prayer"

PRAY Dear Jesus, thank You for all the many blessings of love and forgiveness You shower upon us every day! Help us to share this Good News with everyone we meet. Help us to praise You wherever we may be. In Your name we pray, Jesus. Amen.

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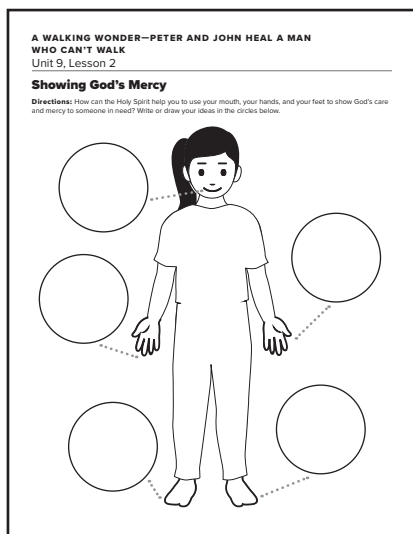
CHRIST CONNECTION

Guide students to think of caring comments they can say to share Jesus' love with a person in need. Ideas for the hands include making a caring Christ-centered card, helping with housework or yardwork, or helping to prepare a meal. Ideas for the feet include running errands, helping with chores, or actually going to visit the person.

BONUS ACTIVITIES

SCRAP PAPER COLLAGE

10–15 minutes

From scraps of construction paper, have students cut shapes to make a collage to depict a scene in this narrative. Help them use circles for faces, rectangles for bodies, and so forth. Help them cut, glue, and draw what they need to depict their scene. Have students share paper and ideas, encouraging them to talk about what they are making.

MERCY RESEARCH

Times may vary

Many hospitals include the word *mercy* in their name, as do other groups that have as their mission showing compassion or alleviating suffering. Together with students, do some online research, looking for all the places you can find with the word *mercy* in their name; then talk about what those entities do with regard to caring for others.

WALKING AND LEAPING SONG

5 minutes

You may remember learning a song when you were young about this narrative, with lyrics that included the phrase “walking and leaping and praising God.” Do an online search of that phrase to find a video or recording of this old favorite to share with your group. Then definitely add the walking and leaping as you sing!
