Getting Started:

(RL/RI9) Discovering Themes: Flip through the pages of this issue. Look at each illustration and read the story titles. Do you notice a theme? Why might this theme be appropriate for the month of March?

How many brothers did Nel have? Can you name them all?

What did Nel find?

What did she use to mark her trail back to her treasure and why couldn't she go all the way home with her trail?

(L4) Define the Following: petticoat, budge, knit, cottage, glimpse

Miro's Lucky Welsh Scones:

What country does your family originate from? Ask your parents about your great, great, great grandparents. Do you have a special family recipe? Ask your parents to help you create a treat from the country were your ancestors came. Then bring it into class and share it with the rest of the class. This

special event can be celebrated by telling your classmates about your delicious dish, where it comes from and why it is special to your family.
