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## Getting Started:

(RL/RI2) Determine a Theme

(L1) Name some of the adjectives the author used to describe the dogs that came to the dog wash.

(L4) Define the following words: bounding, plastered, mangy, bouffant, and waterlogged

(W10) Write a poem about your favorite place to go swimming. Make sure that every line rhymes.

Use an opening sentence, at least five strong details about your location, and an ending sentence. Share your story in front of the class.

(RL/RI1) Answer the following questions:

2. What was Sho's father's name?
3. Where did Sho live?
4. What was their greatest physical challenge?

**Recycled Magazine Holder:**

Follow the instructions on the page to create the magazine holder.

**The Bully and the Can Queen:**

(W2) Do you have a bully at your school? Have you ever been a bully? Imagine the President of the United States asked you to create a television commercial to prevent bullying. What would you say? Break into small groups and create a television commercial. Create a slogan and convince your fellow classmate(s) to stop bullying. If you have cameras and television available, record your commercial and play it for the class. If you don't, you can act out your commercial live in front of the class.

**Topsy-Turvy:**

Art Connection: Sign your name in the bottom right of a piece of blank, white paper. Close your eyes and think about doing your favorite outdoor activity. Now, open your eyes and turn your paper upside down. Draw a picture of yourself, doing your favorite outdoor activity UPSIDE DOWN. When you are finished, turn your picture the correct direction, and see how well you did.

(L3, SL1, W6) Break into small groups and assign each person in the group a part in the play. Practice reciting the lines with expression. After several practice attempts, take turns performing in front of the class.
