Jodi graduated from St. Olaf College where she met and married the Reverend Lionel Bruce (Si) Simonson. After Jodi graduated, Si received a Fulbright scholarship, and Jodi and Si moved to Oslo, Norway for a year, with extensive travel throughout the continent during their time there.



Jodi (Jo Ann) Mattson Coney

Jodi Mattson Coney passed away Sunday, September 19, 2021 in Spokane, Washington.

Jodi was born November 16, 1932 in Aberdeen, South Dakota to Jacob and Arleen Mattson. During the years of the great depression, the family moved to eastern Washington – to Spirit Lake, and then to Opportunity, where Jake and Arleen initially made a living "doing apples" in Spokane Valley. Jake ended up working for many years for Kaiser Aluminum in Spokane, and Arleen worked for the Spokesman-Review.

The Mattson parents and their daughters Jodi and her younger sister Jean lived in Spokane in the family home on Pittsburgh and 11th for many years. Jodi excelled in school (she was placed two years ahead of her age when she started). In 1941 (at the beginning of WW2), the girls spent a year with their grandparents in Whitehall, Wisconsin.
