Interrelationship of building and surroundings:

The Boxcar Children Museum is a historic boxcar, located on a short section of track installed in a lawn area between active railroad tracks and South Main Street north of the historic Putnam Railroad Station. The museum sits on an area of public right-of-way of South Main Street, owned by the municipality, and has an assigned street address of 55 Main Street (although it is accessed at approximately 10 South Main Street). A parking lot to the south is also town-owned and serves both the museum.

Other notable features of building or site:

The freight boxcar that forms the museum is a c. 1929 10' x 40' outside braced wood boxcar. This was a standard type constructed and utilized for transporting freight by rail from the early 1900s through the 1950s. The steel frame consists of L- and Z-channels and is exposed on the exterior. The wood enclosure consists of horizontal planks secured on the interior. Sliding doors at the center of each of the two long sides provide access for loading. The standard two-truck (each with two axles) under carriage supports the boxcar frame and the entire car sits on a short length of track installed purposely for it. The car is painted a traditional dark red. A small deck and steps installed at the east side doorway provide public access. An entry door and sidelight are installed within the east side door for visitor access to the museum. The interior has been fitted with exhibits and memorabilia relating to the 'Boxcar Children' books written by Gertrude Chandler Warner, in which the fictional main characters lived temporarily in a boxcar.

Historical or Architectural importance:

Gertrude Chandler Warner (1890-1979) grew up on South Main Street observing the rail traffic and the new (now historic) railroad station. She taught the children of Putnam at the Israel Putnam School for 32 years, walking to work at the new (now historic) Israel Putnam School. She wrote the Boxcar Children stories initially to provide stimulating reading material for the students she taught.

The choice by the Aspinock Historical Society to re-purpose an actual period boxcar for the museum, dramatizes the literature that is its

subject matter, while preserving an artifact of the area's early 20th-century history.
