## ★ CGI Approach

CGI employs a unique approach to catalyze results. In addition to meetings that bring leaders together to discuss issues and define solutions, CGI works year round to help participants to develop their ideas for commitments, identify partnerships, and articulate effective projects. The CGI approach includes several key features:

**PLENARY SESSIONS** ★ Plenary sessions are a central component of CGI meetings, serving to frame global challenges and actionable responses. Through interactive panel discussions, participants offer insights that compliment the working group sessions.


**WORKING GROUP SESSIONS** ★ During working sessions, small groups with knowledgeable facilitators examine root causes of challenges and identify effective responses. Each working session explores specific issues within CGI's focus areas.

**COMMITMENTS TO ACTION** ★ Through CGI, President Clinton asks each participant to take action on global challenges. Some are inspired by the ideas and solutions identified during the plenary and working sessions, while others work with CGI experts to formulate commitments before or after meetings. Many members also identify possible partners for their commitment through participation with CGI.

**FOLLOW-UP** ★ CGI provides ongoing support to commitment-makers, reviewing progress reports and, where possible, facilitating additional resources and partnerships.

**RECOGNITION** ★ CGI helps members to highlight their commitments through the CGI website, press releases, printed materials, and other media. Each meeting provides opportunities for recognition.





## What is a Commitment

Commitments to Action reflect members' efforts to transform ideas into results. Members from the corporate sector often make commitments in the form of new approaches to their businesses in order to generate social, environmental, and economic value. Some members provide in-kind support or grants to non-governmental organizations to help scale their work or take it in new directions. Many commitments reflect new partnerships between members who join together to expand their impact.

To date, CGI members have made nearly 1,000 commitments, potentially impacting more than 180 million lives in 100 countries. Members' commitments attest to the growing power CGI holds to develop a world of shared opportunity and benefits.

Education is essential for social and economic development; beyond lifting people out of poverty and strengthening the global economy, educational opportunities can dispel conflicts, create jobs, and improve health outcomes. Yet over 72 million children and another 250 million adolescents around the world remain out of school. To make sustainable progress, more young people require better access to quality education. In developing countries, attention must be given to fostering early childhood development and readiness for school, measuring the quality of education, strengthening business and entrepreneurial education, exploring the nexus between education and health outcomes, and expanding the education of the most vulnerable children. Quality educational programs for at-risk adolescents in both developing and developed countries must also be addressed.

In 2008, CGI's education working sessions will explore specific and actionable ways to enable millions of youth to gain access to quality education.

Climate change is one of the most defining challenges of our time. But with the challenge comes significant opportunity. The transition to a clean-energy economy will provide jobs and create wealth while reducing heat-trapping gases and improving the health of people around the world. This year's CGI energy & climate sessions will explore the economic opportunities in fighting global warming — from Wall Street to Main Street and around the globe. Panels will explore the carbon markets, innovations in the transportation sector, new power technologies, breakthroughs in energy efficiency, and more.




