I thank you more than I can express
dearest Aunt for your two interesting letters
which relieved me of much anxiety. I
regret to hear that dear Aunt Hays am
improving in health, & that she has been
mercifully supported through her sad, sad
trial. Last night in my dreams I visited
her chamber, & saw so distinctly her loved
form. That it has seemed to me that
I had actually seen her. I talked to her
face to face, for her voice still echoed in
my ears when I awoke this morning.

Received a long, sad letter from Sara Madecan
a few days since. I am sorry that the indis-
position of her children has prevented her from
seeing her dear brother. It would be a consola-
tion to both of them to be together. I wish that
dear Ellen is obliged to leave her to go
to her husband. I hope Sara will be able to

take her place - for a little, while at least if she can not be satisfied away from her family in her husband's absence. Poor dear Ellen, what strength of mind she has shown during this trying period. She has had such weight of woe to bear. Her husband's misfortunes & ill health, must have drawn her heart's thoughts to him, poor Rosa's dying wish to see her, must have strongly impelled her, to go to her, whilst her dear Brother's helpless state claimed her care more imperiously than ought else, & how nobly she sustained herself at the trying hour of her bereavement.
